In this week's Gospel, Jesus teaches that doing good with the expectation of receiving good is not the sacrifice he is asking of us. He asks that we give the hardest of all loves - loving thy enemy - without the expectation of anything in return. When we think of "enemy" we initially envision a military foe or someone we believe is truly evil. But really this translates into anyone in our life whom we may not see eye to eye with - from family and friends to neighbors or strangers. It makes interacting with others who don't share our opinions, interests, politics or religion a real and challenging thing. With the influence of social media and biased news that seems intent on creating chaos and anger, it is a challenge to love period.

It is so important that we as adults give our children the tools to stand for what is good and right as well as learn respect for differing opinions. It is easy to fall prey to our emotions and react in the heat of the moment. Current times have certainly drained our patience with life and each other. This is where Christ's love saves us and shows us that we are forgiven. But with that gift we are also required to give forgiveness and love to others.

In the past eighteen months, St. Dominic School students have been learning the skills needed to calm initial negative responses in a challenging situation. They know to stop, breathe, calm themselves and then find a meaningful and Christ-like response to scary and unnerving instances. We call this Social

Emotional Learning. Olympic athletes train for the unexpected so that they are ready to overcome any barrier that may present itself in competition. Isn't it our responsibility as church adults to give our youth the skills needed to avoid pitfalls and behavioral regrets? Isn't it our responsibility to demonstrate the actions that Christ asks of us?

Daily, we are reminded of all the good that St. Dominic school students receive from our Church. On behalf of the School Board, I want to thank you for your prayers and support. The students see you at their Masses on Wednesday mornings and know they belong to a dedicated and loving community. Many benefit from your donations to our Annual Fund in the form of scholarship. You even demonstrate that Catholics can have a great time together at our biggest event of the season, Saints Night Out (SNO).

This year's theme is Kentucky Derby and takes place at the school on March 26th. Chair, Jennifer Kluzak, and the SNO committee have been hard at work in an effort to provide a great time for all. Of course, an important part of the night is the drawing for the Cool Cash Raffle! Who will be the big winners this year? It's our students! Hope to see you there.

PARISH OFFICE CLOSED



A Note from Fr. Gregory

Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving

As we head into Lent one of the practices that the Church encourages is prayer, fasting and almsgiving. In the February 19 and 20^{th} homily I shared some suggestions in this regard. I share it here for your consideration.

PRAYER—Wouldn't it be GR888 if we could "pray together" at a given time each day as a parish? How about this? During Lent let's make noon (or thereabouts as our schedule allows) our "parish prayer time." At noon each day let's try to "STOP (what we're doing), DROP (to our knees, or simply lower our heads), and PRAY." We could pray however we like. But here's a suggestion that's short and hopefully meaningful.

- Pray slowly one Hail Mary—Mary said "yes" to God and so made God real in the world in the Person of Jesus, our Savior. How has God invited me to say "yes" to Him today and so make Jesus real in the world?
- Thank God for 2 blessings of the current day so far. Hopefully this will help us to see God's goodness to us and to develop an attitude of gratitude.

FASTING—The Church asks us to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday and to abstain from meat on Lenten Fridays. In addition to this here are some suggestions: fast by decreasing your time online or watching TV; eat leftovers if you don't like them; drink water for one meal if you normally have milk, pop, juice or coffee; consciously eat smaller meal portions; go without that spicy sauce you love with your meal.

ALMSGIVING—As a parish we are participating in Catholic Relief Service's Rice Bowl. Through this project we can learn about how our sisters and brothers across the globe overcome hardships like hunger and malnutrition, and how through Lenten alms, we have the power to make the world a better place for all (see www.crsricebowl.org).


