

JANUARY 'SOUPER BOWL' DONATION MONTH During all of January we will be collecting food, personal care items and household items (NOT just soup) to be donated to the Johnson County Food Center. All donations will be delivered after the upcoming Super Bowl which is scheduled to be played Feb. 13, 2022. The Food Center is especially in need of CANNED CHILI BEANS, PORK AND BEANS, PASTA SAUGE (e.g. Ragu), CANNED MEATS (e.g. chicken, ravioli, spaghetti with meat), CANNED FRUIT, CANNED VEGETABLES (e.g. beets, potatoes, mixed vegetables, spinach, carrots, etc.). Please NO canned green beans or corn as there is another source for those.

Personal care items are always needed such as SHAMPOO, CONDITIONER, TOOTHBRUSHES, TOOTHPASTE, DE-ODORANT. .

Household items needed include DISH SOAP, LAUNDRY DETERGENT, TOILET PAPER.

Homeless clients always need TUNA OR CHICKEN IN A POUCH, NUTRIGRAIN BARS, POP TARTS, SINGLE SERVE FRUIT JUICE, INSTANT COFFEE. Remember to buy pop-top lid items if possible as many clients have no can openers.



History of the Rosary

What is the history of the rosary? Where did this prayer come from?

Although a longstanding tradition attributed the rosary to Saint Dominic and the Dominican Order, the practice of using beads to count prayers predates the Dominicans by a few hundred years. In fact, it seems that what we now think of as the rosary (which means "garland of roses") was first developed by illiterate peasants and religious brothers and sisters as a way of offering 150 "Our Fathers" to replace the praying of the 150 psalms in the Divine Office.

The practice of reciting 150 Hail Marys (which was later subdivided

into 15 decades of 10 Hail Marys) arose during the late Middle Ages. Devotion to the rosary began to flourish in the nineteenth century, especially as new devotions to Mary began to spread throughout Europe and the New World. An annual liturgical celebration of Our Lady of the Rosary was introduced into the Church calendar in 1573 and it has been observed on the date of October 7 since 1913.

In the apostolic letter On the Most Holy Rosary, Pope Saint John Paul II not only added five new mysteries to the traditional fifteen, but he also reminded Catholics that the rosary is, at its core, an opportunity to go deeper into the life of Jesus: "The rosary, though clearly Marian in character, is at heart a Christocentric prayer ... It has all the depth of the Gospel message in its entirety, of which it can be said to be a compendium. It is an echo of Mary's prayer, her perennial Magnificat ... With the rosary, the Christian people sit at the school of Mary and are led to contemplate the beauty of the face of Christ and to experience the depths of his love" (no. 1). _{©LPi}

The Mysteries of the Rosary

Have you ever wanted to explore the life of Jesus and Mary in a deeper way? Each decade highlights a sacred episode:

Joyful Mysteries: Through the Annunciation (1) and Visitation (2), we get a glimpse at Mary's joyful yes to God. She gives birth to Jesus in the Nativity (3). Mary and Joseph present their son at the temple (4) and bring him there again when he is a teenager (5).

Luminous Mysteries: Jesus is baptized in the Jordan River (1) before Mary gives him a nudge to his first miracle at Cana (2). Jesus proclaims the Gospel (3), is transfigured on Mount Tabor (4), and institutes the Eucharist (5). The light is shining!

Sorrowful Mysteries: Jesus prays in agony in Gethsemane (1), knowing his hour of suffering has come. After his betrayal and arrest, Jesus is scourged (2) and crowned with thorns (3). He carries his cross (4), and Mary stands at the foot of the cross as he is crucified (5).

Glorious Mysteries: Christ is risen in glory (1)! After appearing to those he loves, he ascends into heaven (2). Jesus' followers receive the Holy Spirit at Pentecost (3). Mary, unaffected by original sin, is assumed body and soul into heaven (4), where she is crowned queen, humble mother of Christ the King (5).

For Faith Focus we talked about the Epiphany. We made crowns, visited the nativity, and talked about what we would bring baby Jesus if we were one of the three Wise Men.










Epiphany Baby Shower
