

### EVERY DAY STEWARDSHIP

#### Submission as Stewardship

We aren't comfortable with the idea of submission. Our society champions equality, and rightly so — but it's a mistake to think that submission is at odds with equality. To submit ourselves fully, we must first be free. We must first be our own masters. God has granted us that freedom with the salvation He offers. We are no longer the slaves of sin. Now He asks us to be subordinate to one another, in the name of Christ.

What a completely uncomfortable task! What He's asking is for us to be subordinate to the person who irritates us the most. The person we really can't stand. The person who doesn't respect us or appreciate what we have to offer. The person we think we're smarter than, more talented than. The person we envy.

That's the real challenge of stewardship, isn't it? Subordination. Inconveniencing myself by giving of time, of money, of relationship. Putting the needs or wants of another above my own when they haven't done anything special to earn it.

I invite you to consider the cross — the most radical expression of submission, and of stewardship, that ever existed. If there was ever someone who deserved superiority, isn't it the God who let Himself be nailed to a tree, who gave so freely of His life, His body, His blood, His everything?

To look at him in his agony is to truly understand the beauty of submission — of laying down what you have for the good of the other. ~Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS

### WHY SHOULD YOU CHOOSE A CATHOLIC CEMETERY?

The concept of "sacred place" is central to Catholic practice. We build churches as places in which to gather to worship God and celebrate the sacraments. We build shrines and monuments as places to honor the saints and to foster devotion to them as our heroes of faith.

Even in death, we seek the comfort of God's precinct through the Catholic cemetery. The Church, from the age of the early martyrs and her worship on the cemetery is more than just a place to bury Catholics who have died. It is a place that has been consecrated to receive that which is uniquely holy: the bodies of those who have been baptized who have received the anointing of the Holy Spirit through Confirmation and who have eaten the bread of life in the Holy Eucharist. As these persons were once physically gathered together in our parish congregations, so, too, are they now gathered together bodily as they await the resurrection of the body, even as their bodies return to the earth.

Catholic cemetery is a congregation of the deceased and a fellowship of those who have placed their trust in the Lord of Life.

It's time to return to in person Religious Ed. Classes for children in grades K-8!

Children preparing for First Reconciliation and First Communion (in grade 2 or older) must be enrolled in Catholic School or in Religious Ed. Classes and must meet, with their parents, several times in addition to regular classes. A parent meeting for First Reconciliation will take place Sunday, September 26th, 9:30-10:45am in the Glowacki Room.

Student preparing for Confirmation (in grade 8 or older) must be enrolled in Catholic School or Religious Ed. All attend, with their parents, an informational meeting Sunday, November 21st, noon-1:00pm in the Religious Ed Room. Regular preparation meetings are held in the Religious Ed Room noon-2:00pm Sundays, November 28, 2021 until Confirmation in the Spring.

All families begin the year on Sunday August 29th with a breakfast celebration in Kelly Hall, 9:30-10:45am. Regular classes for grades K-7 continue on Sundays, 9:30-10:45 from September 12, 2021, to May 1, 2022.

It is always amazing to me how quickly summer flies by. Here at JP II, we have been preparing for the return of students since June! I hope that you found time to relax and enjoy the ease of summer break.

Things have been very exciting at school. James and our cleaning company have been working overtime to clean the building so that it is ready for the first day. Also, we completed a few projects like installing internet fiber and we will be adding new water fountains with water bottle fillers around the building later this summer or early next fall. The fiber will hopefully help with connectivity issues we have experienced in the past and support the new technology coming into the building from our EANS grant. When you are dealing with a building that was built in 1944 technology is always going to be an issue but hopefully, this will make things much smoother.

### GOSPEL MEDITATION-

#### ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

August 22, 2021~21st Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Far be it from us to forsake the Lord for the service of other gods." We struggle with our gods. They appear in the forms of things like money, power, prestige, popularity, privilege, and self-fulfillment. We like these "gods" because they make us feel good and ask very little of us in return. When we worship them, we worship ourselves. How can you go wrong with that? We buy into the illusion that if something can give us a comfortable life, free of want and need, then it is worth setting other things aside to pursue it. In essence, we sell our souls. Our struggle with "who is God" and to whom do we belong is a real one and one that can easily find us empty and experiencing disillusionment.

The devil tempted Jesus in the desert and promised him more. We are promised "more." But in pursuing the more and the satisfying we lose track of the cost, and the cost is great. We sacrifice our very life in pursuit of something disguised as life. We sacrifice truth for something that only "feels" true. While the true and real God certainly promises us many things, many things are also required. It is not about the warm and secure feelings and self-absorption the world wants to provide, but of giving back. There can be no lukewarm stance with regard to faith. If we are in, then faith in Jesus Christ asks us to do some difficult things: work in service of God's kingdom (not our own), love our enemies, offer no resistance to injury, that we must die to ourselves in order to find ourselves, and trust that Jesus truly gives us his flesh and blood to eat and drink. These are hard things to accept and even harder to put into practice. It is no wonder that many, who may be attracted to Jesus at first, walk away in pursuit of the more self-satisfying gods.

But truth is truth. If we cannot accept it from the lips of Jesus Christ, then where else will we find it? To whom can we go? There is only one source of truth and life, Jesus Christ. Jesus has the words of eternal life and if we do not go to him, then where else will we find this gift? But we must be faithful and buy into the whole package deal that requires sacrifice and fidelity. When we do, we find ourselves, through the Body and Blood of Christ, connected to the Source of all life and then intimately bound with our brothers and sisters. We all have to decide whether we want to stay or go and if we can accept what Jesus has to say. It's a choice we all have to make.



Pope Pius X, born Giuseppe Melchiorre Sarto, was the first Pope elected in the 20th century. He came to the papal office in 1903 and died 11 years later in 1914, just as World War I was beginning.

He was born in 1835 at Riese, near Venice, and was one of eight children. His family was poor. He felt a calling to be a priest at a young age and was ordained in 1858. After 26 years, he was named bishop of Mantua, Italy, and in 1893, he became patriarch of Venice.

As Pope, he issued decrees making the age of First Holy Communion earlier (at the age of 7) and advocated frequent and even daily reception of the Eucharist. He promoted the reading of the Bible among laypeople, reformed the liturgy, promoted clear and simple homilies, and brought back Gregorian chant. He revised the Breviary, reorganized the curia, and initiated the codification of canon law.

He died in 1914 of natural causes reportedly aggravated by worries over the beginning of World War I. Pope Pius X was canonized by Pope Pius XII in 1954.
