
Hope for Life in 2022

"2021 was the worst year for abortion rights since 1973," claimed a recent social media post from a huge abortion group. Despite all the difficult news of the past year, *this* news is a consolation that there has been some good happening for unborn lives. While we currently have the most pro-abortion administration in US history and the most permissive abortion practices in the world, here is a quick look at why 2021 was devastating for the abortion industry, and the hope for a continued momentum for life in 2022.

Texas leads the charge for life with its Heartbeat Act, the Act standing despite numerous challenges. This law protects unborn children once a heartbeat can be detected, at 6 weeks gestation. This law is both saving lives daily and educating people that a heartbeat is present at such an early stage in development.

More pro-life legislation has passed on the state level in 2021 than ever before in our nation's history. A total of 108 pro-life bills were passed, in comparison to the previous record of 89.

More babies have been saved on the streets through peaceful presence in front of abortion clinics than ever before. For example, 40 Days for Life reported that 2,505+ babies were saved during this year of prayer vigils. This number is double the previous record of 1,181 lives saved. Grassroots efforts like this are truly making a difference. Enthusiasm for the pro-life effort is growing wider and younger!



All eyes were on Virginia during the election in 2021. The abortion agenda fell flat! Additionally, Congress failed to pass harmful legislation. There are many pro-life candidates who are the favorites for 2022.

Thanks to amazing medical advancements, we now have pre-term babies who can survive and are viable at 20 weeks gestation. Nearly 50 years ago in 1973, during Roe v Wade, babies were only considered viable at 28 weeks. During 2021, baby Richard Hutchinson defied all the odds of surviving and now holds the record for youngest known person to survive at 20 weeks old and weighing only 11 ounces.

What a great blessing to have a conservative super majority on the Supreme Court, a dream that has finally come true! The Supreme Court is expected to issue a decision in spring/ summer this year on the Dobbs v. Jackson case. Whatever the court decides, the consequences will be *enormous*. If the Mississippi law, which bans abortion before viability, is upheld, this could lead to overturning *Roe v Wade*.

Abortion law would then be left up to each individual state. There are predictions that up to 26 states would likely ban abortion as a result. Under Roe v. Wade and Planned Parenthood v. Casey, "pre-viability" abortion laws have been blocked for decades by federal courts. The outcome of this case could lead to extensive protections for the unborn without federal court interference.

Another great example of a pro-life victory from the Supreme Court happened in Philadelphia. Faith-based adoption through Catholic Social Services is finally restored and protected. The high court found that "the refusal of Philadelphia to contract with CSS for the provision of foster care services unless CSS agrees to certify same-sex couples as foster parents violates the Free Exercise Clause of the First Amendment."

With this healthy dose of hope, take one step further. We need you in this fight. THE epic battle of our times! Abortion and contraceptive mentality have left our society and culture in ruins.

Consider attending the Prayer Service for Life on January 22 at 10:30am at St Paul Cathedral. Gather at 12:30pm in front of the Capitol to hear pro-life legislators give talks on important pro-life work.

Mass Roots – The Profession of Faith

We've listened attentively to the Scripture readings and homily, and it's time to profess our faith! This most often takes the form of the Nicene Creed. As "profession of faith" suggests, a creed is simply a set of beliefs. From where we stand in history, it's easy to take for granted the well-developed doctrines and explanations of our beloved Catholic faith. If you lived in the few hundred years following Jesus' time on earth, however, things were a bit different!

Fundamental questions about who Jesus is and his relationship to the Father were hot topics among the early Christian community. Was he human in body, but divine in mind? (Apollinarianism) Perhaps he was completely divine and only *appeared* to have a human body. (Docetism) Was he *created* by God, therefore the Son of God, but not truly God himself? (Arianism) These were all real theories, and since we have proven them untrue we now call them *heresies*, or false beliefs.

With all these ideas floating around, it was a confusing time for everyday Christians! Arianism was gaining substantial traction, so the Church stepped in and cleared things up. In May of 325, the First Council of Nicaea gathered and developed, you guessed it, the Nicene Creed! In it, the relationship of the Trinity was clarified. Jesus is *"begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made."* Jesus is both God's uncreated Son and God Himself – the mystery of the Trinity.

It's incredible how much depth these words have; how much debating and philosophizing it took to get them just right! Yet how often do we simply ramble off this powerful profession of faith out of mindless habit? Bring the Nicene Creed to prayer with you this week, and strive to truly *profess* it next time you're at Sunday Mass!
