Gift of TIME

In the parable of the Good Samaritan, we do not know where the Samaritan is going other than to Jericho. It could have been to an important function like a family event or a business meeting. It is vital to note that we do not know because the point is that it does not matter. He encounters a man who was robbed, then beaten, and left for dead on the side of the road. The Samaritan saw a need and responded. Jesus tells us of two previous men, a Levite and a priest, who passed by and chose not to stop. We don't know where they were going either, but they did not take the time to stop.

Those listening to Jesus' words, would not have picked the Samaritan to stop because Samaritans were reviled by the Jews and seen as anything but good. However, it is the one least likely to stop who does. The Samaritan does not question whether he should stop. He gives of his time without a concern for the cost to himself.

Sometimes we act like we must guard our time to the point that it limits our ability to be generous with it. We can also get so caught up in all the obligations of life that we mistakenly believe we have no more time to give to anyone. However, mature disciples steward their time knowing that it is always God's time, and when the call is before them, they feel no other option but to respond.

Gift of TALENT

Sometimes we think of talent only as those very special traits that few exhibit, like athleticism or artistic ability. However, everyone has talents that come in all varieties, shapes, and sizes. We certainly cannot say the Samaritan was a doctor or nurse, but he had to have to had some knowledge of how to care for the man left in such bad shape. Many famous paintings throughout history depict this roadside meeting. Most have the Samaritan placing the man on his animal so they can ride into town. But a few, like that of the 17th century artist Francesco Bassano, show the Samaritan bandaging the man's wounds. If the man was in such bad shape, certainly some care needed to be given so he could survive the journey into town. Jesus speaks of the Samaritan's using bandages with oil and wine.

The Samaritan gave of his talent. He did not question if his talent was enough for the task at hand. He did not question if he had enough supplies to do the job. He gave what he could because that is all he had to offer. We can fool ourselves into thinking we do not have what is needed to make a difference in another's life or in the world around us. We see talent as belonging to other people, not to us. On the contrary, when God calls us, we must believe that we have been given all that is needed to say "yes." Good stewards see the great abundance of gifts that have been given to them, whether they be great or small gifts.

Gift of TREASURE

The Samaritan then brings the man into town and puts him up at an inn. He pays the innkeeper so the man can stay there and recuperate. The situation required the Samaritan to use his treasure. He could have acted like he had no money and chosen his wallet over the man. However, like any good steward, he offered his treasure because he needed to answer the call.

In the parable, the Samaritan had given of his time, talent, and treasure, and that might seem a good enough illustration of living as a good steward. But that is not enough. Stewardship is not about checking off boxes on a commitment card. It is about more than giving enough to meet a demand. It is about giving generously with no concern for the cost. The Samaritan exemplifies the message in the U.S. Bishops' pastoral letter with his final action: Upon leaving, he tells the innkeeper that when he returns to town, he will reimburse the innkeeper for any additional expenses. Could the innkeeper now boost his rates to take advantage of the Samaritan? Possibly. That is of no concern to the Samaritan. The Samaritan is willing to give whatever is asked of him. This is the true spirit of stewardship.

Stewardship can mistakenly be seen as responding to the requirements or expectations within a parish. True stewardship requires nothing of us because true stewardship is all about giving of oneself freely. Were those who passed by the man on the road required to stop? Are you and I required to respond to the daily call of Jesus Christ? No. We respond with a free and generous heart because we have a maturity of faith that leads us to do such things. The key is that we stay "willing" to give of ourselves without counting any costs. If Our Lord asks for all our time, all our talent, and all our treasure, then He shall have it, for we realize that in the end, we are only stewards of these great gifts. Like the Good Samaritan, we must be willing to respond at any and all times, even if we are uncertain how much it will cost us.
