From the Pastor's Desk

This past week we marked the anniversary of the tragic Roe v. Wade decision that legalized abortion and has brought about the loss of life of more than 60 million children in the United States. In the light of this massive number, it struck me that we can so easily lose sight of the most important aspect of the whole situation – the individual child, mother and father. It's easy to get caught up in the political battles and sometimes we can even place undue hope or experience undue despair at the ups and downs on the political front. In the face of this, I have always been convinced that the way in which we will bring about an end to abortion has to begin with the conversion of hearts, both our own and those caught in tragic and difficult circumstances where abortion seems like the only choice. This battle is for the hearts and souls of each and every one of us, a battle to love. Any successes achieved on the political front will be in vain if we don't win the battle of love. I offer you the following saints as those whom you can call upon to bring an ever deeper conversion to the Culture of Life. I pray they will accompany you on this journey.

St. Gianna Molla, who as a mother and doctor sacrificed her own life for that of her child and who is patroness of unborn children, mothers, and physicians, pray for us and the vulnerable, especially those who are pregnant with health complications. **St. Gerard Majella**, who is sought after for miracles such as the ones from his lifetime and the young girl whose life and the life of her baby were saved through his handkerchief after his death and who is patron of expectant mothers and saint, pray for us and the vulnerable, especially those in extreme pain and in need of miracles to live.

History Glimpse

One hundred years ago, the people of St. Patrick parish no doubt looked back on their previous four years with some relief. Just as we have had to endure a pandemic and its variants, they, too, had had to endure the deadly 1918 flu and its resulting health restrictions and fearsome outcomes. St. Patrick School had been closed from Oct. 7 to Nov ember 4, and then again December 20 due to an outbreak of the flu and smallpox. There was much sickness among the faculty. There were just four nuns who manned the school those years. They were Dominican Sisters of St. Catharine, Kentucky, and they found that illness made life extra difficult. Fortunately, the parishioners were very considerate and helped the Sisters out. The nuns had no convent yet, and made their home in the unused classrooms above the church. By 1922, they may have found life considerably improved. A convent had finally been built for them after a strike interfered with the delivery of needed goods, and on Jan. 24, 1921, they moved in to their new home. Now those Sisters are part of St. Patrick's history as is the church building and convent, but some things do remain the same, don't they?
