


Parish Mission Statement

Court recently congratulated the bride and groom during a wedding reception with a pertinent piece of advice: "See that you never convert your family into a courtroom; instead, let it be a confessional. If the husband and wife start arguing like attorneys, in an attempt to justify their behavior, their family becomes a court of law, and nobody wins. On the other hand, if the husband and the wife - as in a confessional - are ready to admit their faults and try to correct them, the family becomes a heavenly one." They teach their children by example: "Do as we do, not as we say."

Long Training: A mother goes to her pastor and explains that her son seems very interested in becoming a priest. She would like to know what this would require. So, the priest begins to explain: "If he wants to become a diocesan priest, he'll have to study for eight years. If he wants to become a Benedictine, he'll have to study for ten years. If he wants to become a Jesuit, he'll have to study for fourteen years." (*This joke originated back when young men entered seminaries right after high school.*) The mother listens carefully, and as the priest concludes, her eyes brighten. "Sign him up for that last one, Father - he's a little slow!" Let us encourage our children to respond to God's call to serve others, especially in the ministry of Priesthood

or religious life. Vocations to Priesthood and religious life begin in the home by the example and encouragement of parents and grandparents. Let us pray for priestly and religious vocations in our parish and families.

Dear Parishioners,

On the last Sunday of the year, we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family. We are offering our own families and all their members on the altar for God's blessing on this feast day. The first reading from the book of Samuel describes how Elkanah and Hannah presented their child Samuel in the temple, consecrated him to the service of the Lord as a perpetual Nazarite, and left him in the Temple under the care of Eli, the priest. In the second reading, John reminds us that, as children of God the Father, we are members of God's own family, and as such, we are expected to obey the greatest commandment of God: "Love one another" so that we may remain united to God in the Holy Spirit. In today's Gospel, Luke concludes his detailed story of Christ's infancy, with the details of Jesus' first visit to the Temple of Jerusalem to become "a son of the Law" and to take up the obligations of the Law when he was twelve years old. Jesus lingered behind in the Temple, attending the Sanhedrin classes on religious and theological questions, as an eager student of Mosaic Law. Finally, when Mary and Joseph found him in the Temple after three days of anxiously searching, Jesus explained to them that he was in his Father's house as if he had had a blaze of realization about his Divine Sonship. The gospel summarizes the next 18 years of Jesus' life, stating that he grew up at Nazareth like any other child, obeying his parents, faithfully discharging all his duties to God, to his parents, and the community, and "advancing in wisdom and age and favor before God and man.

What does the Holy Family teach us?

- We need to learn lessons from the Holy Family. 1. The Church encourages all Christian families to look to the Holy Family for inspiration, example, and encouragement. It was a model family in which both parents worked hard, helped each other, understood and accepted each other as God's gifts, and raised their child in human and divine wisdom. The Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds parents that *they have a grave responsi*bility to give a good example to their children as the Holy family did, by creating a home where tenderness, forgiveness, respect, fidelity, and disinterested service are the *rule (2223).* Let us pray for the grace of caring for one another in our own families, for each parish family member, and all families of the universal Church.
