“When I prove my holiness among you, I will gather you from all the foreign lands, and I will pour clean water upon you and cleanse you from all your impurities, and I will give you a new spirit, says the Lord.”

-Entrance Antiphon 3rd Sunday of Lent



Back in 1969, Joni Mitchell hit the airwaves with a great folk song on the guitar that was simply called *Both Sides Now*. It became a great hit in the summer of '69, and if everything goes as planned, I intend to play it for you at the start of my sermon on Sunday. Unlike so many songs today, the words of this 1969 song have a strong philosophical and spiritual message about LIFE and LOVE. At one point in the song, Mitchell sings: **“...I've looked at love from both sides now, from give and take and still somehow; it's love's illusions I recall. I really don't know love at all.”**

Too often today we tend to think we know what love is as we often believe that love is more about *taking* and less about *giving*. For example, we might say, “I am no longer friends with this person because it was **not a life-giving relationship for me** any longer.” Spiritually speaking, many are saying today that they no longer go to church because, **“I wasn't getting anything out of it.”** But the immature individual defines love most often as something that we *get*, rather than something we need to *give*. So, when we hear the First Reading from the Book Exodus about the Ten Commandments, or the Gospel from St. John on Christ cleansing the Temple, we think these two passages are **ALL ABOUT LAWS, AND LITTLE OR NOTHING TO DO ABOUT LOVE**. Yet, recall Christ's words elsewhere in St. John's Gospel when Jesus says to His followers: (John 14:15) **“...If you LOVE me, you will keep My COMMANDMENTS!”** *****It seems that both LAW and LOVE do go together if we believe that LOVE is not just GETTING but also GIVING.***** **One of the greatest acts of LOVE or OBLATION to the Almighty is when we are OBEDIENT to the LORD and the LAWS that He gave to us.**

Maybe we should stop seeing LAWS in such a HARSH way as something I ABSOLUTELY have to do, but rather in a more HOLY way, as a kind of ADVICE I want to follow, since it is given to me in LOVE by my God to LIVE a *whole* life in

this world and one day a *holy* life in the world to come.

So, with pastoral love, can I give you a little spiritual advice or some rules or laws to live by that I have been using myself these past years? The following is a famous and very wise reflection called *Desiderata*, that was written back in 1927. It is believed to have been written by man by the name of Max Ehrmann, from Terra Haute, Indiana. A copy of this reflection was even purchased by St. Pope John Paul II when he visited the United States, and hung in the papal living room for the remainder of his pontificate. The saintly Holy Father was so impressed with this writing, hopefully you might not only be *impressed*, but more so be *inspired* in the midst of Lent 2021! Happy Lent!

Desiderata

Go placidly amid the noise and the haste, and remember what peace there may be in silence. As far as possible, without surrender, be on good terms with all persons.

Speak your truth quietly and clearly; and listen to others, even to the dull and the ignorant; they too have their story.

Avoid loud and aggressive persons; they are vexatious to the spirit. If you compare yourself with others, you may become vain or bitter, for always there will be greater and lesser persons than yourself.

Enjoy your achievements as well as your plans. Keep interested in your own career, however humble; it is a real possession in the changing fortunes of time.

Exercise caution in your business affairs, for the world is full of trickery. But let this not blind you to what virtue there is; many persons strive for high ideals, and everywhere life is full of heroism.

Be yourself. Especially do not feign affection. Neither be cynical about love; for in the face of all aridity and disenchantment, it is as perennial as the grass.

Take kindly the counsel of the years, gracefully surrendering the things of youth.

Nurture strength of spirit to shield you in sudden misfortune. But do not distress yourself with dark imaginings.

Many fears are born of fatigue and loneliness. Beyond a wholesome discipline, be gentle with yourself.

You are a child of the universe no less than the trees and the stars; you have a right to be here.



And whether or not it is clear to you, no doubt the universe is unfolding as it should.


Therefore be at peace with God, whatever you conceive Him to be. And whatever your labors and aspirations, in the noisy confusion of life, keep peace in your soul.

With all its sham, drudgery and broken dreams, it is still a beautiful world. Be cheerful. Strive to be happy.





If you recall, last week we paid forward \$40,000.00 to WEB Construction, as we are concluding both the structural work as well as the stewardship for the major exterior church project. In the last few days, the exterior lights have been replaced with new size-appropriate lights, as well as frosted glass was installed in the street light fixtures on the west side (*main entrance*) of the church. The exterior lights that were original to the church were in bad shape and were recycled. The metal in these 70-year-old fixtures brought in a modest amount of \$150.00 that will be applied to our present church project. As I stated last week, we have pretty well completed the entire exterior of the church at the cost of around \$650,000. We still will need to address the new planters this spring with the planting of some low-maintenance foliage. The Worship Committee has a good idea for this area. We also might try and address the asphalt on the alley (south side) of the church later this spring or early summer if we are able to find someone to do this small area.

Again, this week we paid down another \$5,000.00 towards our new air-conditioning upgrades. This brings us over the \$25,000 mark and past the 25% mark as well to 26%! This is wonderful stewardship in a short span of time, given the fact that less than two months ago, we had only paid forward a little less than 7% of this stewardship area. With the conclusion of the Diocesan and Catholic School stewardship goals completed for this Fiscal Year of 2020-2021, it is amazing how quickly we are advancing on our own personal stewardship needs. And as always, THANK YOU FOR YOUR GIFTS!!!

Renovation Report



Some of you commented to me after Mass that you liked the color on the front wall in church. Thank you for the positive feedback. A couple of people commented to me that it is not a color that they would put in their house, yet the color seems to fit in the house of God. It certainly does bring out the reds of the main mural as well as the copper color of the original candlesticks on the altar, the

sanctuary stand, and the pinkish hues from the High Altar.

On Monday, I met with the two men who will be working on the two canvas side murals as well as the four smaller canvases that will be behind the four statues in the four corners of the church. All four of the designs of the murals in the shrines, as well as the two side murals will be imitating exactly parts of the seven-decade old mural that has adorned our sanctuary of Holy Rosary.

I spent a bit of time with these two men working on the sizes and details of the murals. They will now be working on this artwork full time in their studio and they hope to have all six art pieces completed and installed in about two weeks. They are having a targeted date of completion on or before the 5th Sunday of Lent or around the 21st of March, about a week before the start of Holy Week. I know how things go, but it would be wonderful to have all the work done in time for Palm Sunday, the Sacred Triduum and of course Easter itself. I shared with the two artists, *"I want to have the person who has never been to Holy Rosary to walk into the church and presume that all of the additional art has been in the church for 70 years."* The men assured me that they will match the colors so that the new murals will have that vintage old world look. I have great confidence in these men, as I believe they are the best in the state if not in the upper Midwest. It is for this reason that we have been waiting for nearly two years for this project to take place from when it was first proposed. I feel these artists did an outstanding job on the main mural a few years back. When this project is all completed, then we can all take a stewardship sigh and rest up for the plans for the summer of 2022. Thank you for your support and stewardship that is allowing these improvements to take place outside and inside our church.



Palm Sunday - Eucharistic Adoration

Over the past 12 months, we have not held any Eucharistic adoration time before the Blessed Sacrament due to the pandemic. But now, as more and more people are receiving the vaccine, and as more and more things are opening up, I would like to return to the devotion for the faithful of exposing the Blessed Sacrament. There are many graces and blessings that come to those who spend time in prayer before our Blessed Lord in the Holy Eucharist! **I would like to have a special exposition and time of adoration beginning at the close of the 10:00 A.M. Palm Sunday Mass on March 28th, until 5:00 P.M.**

At the main entrance of the church, we will have sign-up sheets so that someone is always present in church when the Blessed Sacrament is exposed. Our intention for this devotional time will be: *****"For all the members of Holy Rosary, baptized boys and girls, teenagers, as well as all adults, all those who have been confirmed in the faith to return to the sacraments, especially the Holy Eucharist as we celebrate the Sacred Triduum of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday (Vigil of the Resurrection).***"**

I will also make myself available during the Exposition of the Holy Eucharist for individual confessions in the cry-room area. The time of exposition will close at 5:00 P.M., with evening prayer and a formal Benediction. The schedule for Palm Sunday will be as follows:
