## Message from the Pastor

#### YOUR LIGHT HAS COME

Happy New Year to all!

The beginning of each new year is both a time of hope and a time of challenge. The hope is that we will find new ways of looking at the old challenges and problems which we face as individuals, as families, as a community, a church, a nation, a world, and bring renewed faith and vigor into

our efforts at reconciliation, charity and peace. The challenge is not to fall into old ruts and repeat the same mistakes. Among everyone's hopes again this new year is an end to the pandemic and a return to more normality.

Today we celebrate the third and final solemnity of the Christmas season, the Epiphany of the Lord. The symbol which characterizes this solemnity is light. It is first of all Christ who is our light. As Word made flesh, he is the fullness of God's self-revelation humanity. By the light of faith, through which we have been enlightened in baptism, we are made capable of accepting this revelation. It is this light, which draws us to Jesus and enables us to profess our faith in him as the Christ, which is symbolized by the star in today's Gospel.

The Magi in today's Gospel represent the whole of humanity, for God's plan of salvation is universal in scope. The people of the Old Covenant, Israel, understood that all nations would someday acknowledge and worship their God as the one true God, symbolized by those from throughout the known world streaming to Jerusalem. (Cf. First Reading and Responsorial Psalm) This has come to pass in the Christian era, since "the Gentiles are coheirs, members of the same body, and copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel." (Second Reading)

Now we are called to bear the light of Christ, in word and deed, into a world still too full of darkness. In Matthew's gospel Jesus says: "You are the light of the world...your light must shine before men so that they may see goodness in your acts and give praise to your heavenly Father." (5:14a, 16)

The liturgical season of Christmas ends next Sunday, January 9, with the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. As narrated in the Gospel for the feast, God the Father himself attests that he whose birth we have been celebrating is in fact God the Son become man. This truth was announced by angels to shepherds, signified to the Magi by a star and heralded by John the Baptist.

I am sure many of us are mindful of the people who have experienced devastation due to recent storms, such as the tornado in Stanley and the derecho that impacted thousands from Arkansas to Kentucky. The best way to help is by monetary donations to agencies such as the American Red Cross and Catholic Charities. We will take up a special collection later this month, with proceeds going to Catholic Charities of the Diocese of La Crosse for Stanley, and Catholic Charities USA for victims of the derecho. Thank you for your generosity to past disaster-relief efforts.

Pray the rosary this week for our Holy Father's intention for true human fraternity: "We pray for all those suffering from religious discrimination and persecution; may their own rights and dignity be recognized, which originate from being brothers and sisters in the human family."

May God bless his people with peace. Monsignor Gorman





On the surface, it appears that this new

year will offer little relief from the craziness that has defined the last several. As we watch the center of culture continue to deteriorate, both locally, nationally, and worldwide, there is

a lot at stake. In recent weeks we've seen a national TikTok threat close our schools. Gender identity debates continue and the gap between the political right and left widens. These are just a few examples, but we can all think of dozens more. Anyone who has spent an hour online gets the sense that the world has lost nearly all sense of meaning. So, many of us will make our New Year's resolutions, try to do better in the few areas of our lives that we might still have some control over, and fight down the suspicion that it's all futile.

Raising children in this time is nothing short of terrifying. We adults remember a time when we could count on our cultural institutions, be they the evening news or the promise of a Friday fish fry. We knew what it was like to be alone when not in the immediate presence of another person. We believed the world had a story.

Our children, largely, do not have these assurances. We at least had the illusion of solid ground, and some of it actually was sturdy. The world they inhabit, the only world they've ever known, is chaotic and tumultuous. The end of the world seems to be looming around every corner. Those of us who grew up during the Cold War and the threat of nuclear annihilation remember fearing one thing that might end in catastrophe. And then it didn't. Take that fear and extend it to nearly everything in life and we might get a sense of the fear - and the nihilism it calls us to ("Eat, drink, and be merry for tomorrow we die") - that our children are forced to call "normal".

However, we are seeing the seeds of hope spring up all around us, if we know what to look for. Last week I suggested that we think of this cultural moment as a field that has been tilled. Tilling a field is profoundly destructive act. It destroys root systems and insect ecology. It literally destroys the field. But it's necessary for new seeds to be planted and take root. A wise man once said that, "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit." What the world is looking for is transcendence - to experience a world that is larger than us, our ideas, and our identities, and that gives meaning to our lives. This New Year, I pray that through our catechetical and sacramental programs, through family life, through our communal parish life, our children will discover the tradition that has been lost in culture. I pray that Logos, the Word of God that is at once our beginning, end, meaning and reason, will find solid root in good soil that has nowhere else to turn for hope but back to its source and summit. I pray that this generation rediscovers this in the Mass and the sacramental life that reunites heaven and earth. So here's to a Happy New Year full of hard-fought goodness, truth, and beauty.

#### The Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord

Epiphany means "manifestation." The first Epiphany was the visit of the Magi to adore the Christ Child. The Magi, who were actually scholars and scientists, came to be associated with kings. Their gifts reveal this holy Child's identity; gold for Christ's Kingship, incense for His divinity, and myrrh for His sacrifice on the Cross.

The Feast of Epiphany is traditionally celebrated as the twelfth night of Christmas, on January 6. In the United States, this feast has been moved to the Sunday, January 2, 2022. In many families, the king figurines are moved a bit closer to the nativity scene every day from Christmas Day until Epiphany. Moreover, it is traditional for parish priests to bless water, chalk, and incense on the eve of Epiphany, and use them for the blessing of homes the next day.

The blessing of homes (schools, places of employment, etc.) on Epiphany revives the beautiful custom of making our homes sacramentals. Sacramentals make us more mindful, receptive and cooperative with God's grace. This blessing also reminds us that Christ is the One Who enlightens our hearts and homes with His love. He is the source of our hope, our comfort and our joy.

Marking doorways with blessed chalk is also a witness of faith. Use the chalk to mark above the main door and, if possible, over all exterior doors in the following fashion:

\* Numerals to consecrate the New Year.

\* Initials to remind us of the legendary names of the Magi—Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar—and also to represent the Latin motto: *Christus mansionem benedicat* (May Christ bless this house)

\* Four crosses to represent the four seasons. Example for the year 2022: 20 + C + M + B + 22

#### **Epiphany Blessing of the Home**

If a priest is present, he leads; otherwise, the head of the family is the leader. All present go from room to room, blessing each room with holy water and praying the following prayer:

Blessed be all the rooms of this home. May each of them be holy and filled with the spirit of happiness and peace, love and affection. May the spirit of pardon and affection reside with us and be always ready to heal our divisions. May the spirits of joy and laughter, hope and faith, playfulness and prayer, compassion and love be perpetual guests in our home. May God's holy blessing rest upon us all, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

As the leader inscribes the initials of the three Magi above the exterior doorways using the blessed chalk, the following prayer is prayed:

Inscription for the year 2022: **20 + C + M + B + 22** 

Blessed be this doorway. May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us as we welcome them with respect and kindness. May all our comings and goings be under the seal of God's loving care. May we seek and serve, in everyone we meet, Jesus, Who is Lord forever and ever. Amen. (Rev. Philip T.
