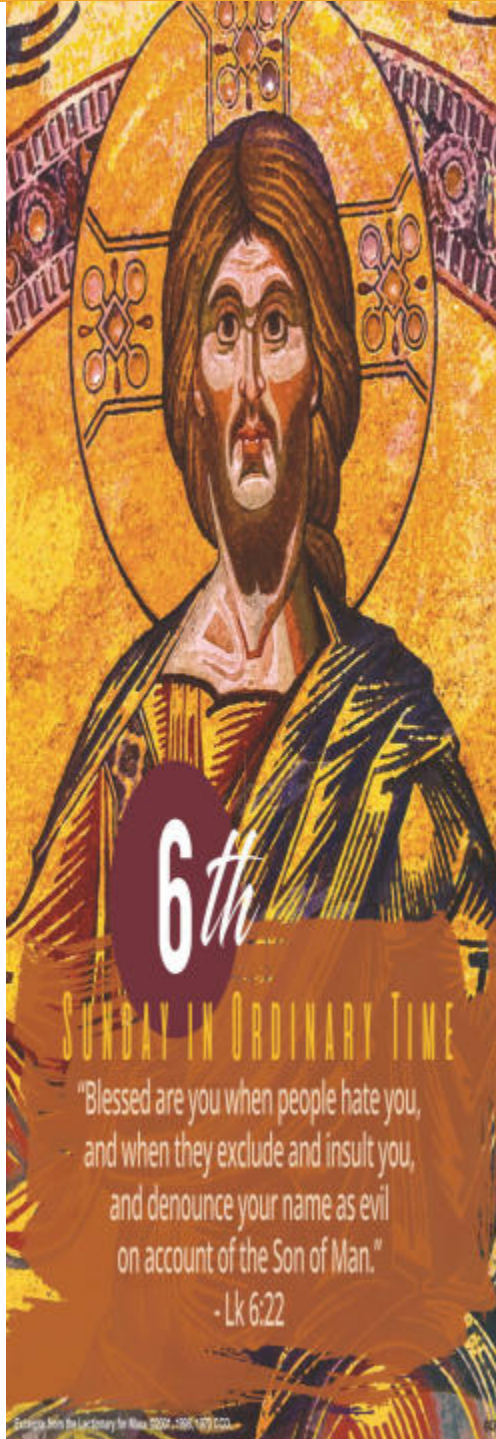

ASK FR. JOE

"I was reading about praying for souls in purgatory and the offering of indulgences and I came across the suggestion of offering Gregorian Masses for those in purgatory. Tell us more about these Masses that Pope Gregory encouraged the faithful to have said and participate in. Other than being said in succession of thirty at a time, what else makes them unique? Where are they offered?"

I have to admit, I had not heard about this before, so please do not feel bad if you have not heard of it before either. So here is the lowdown on Gregorian Masses.

Pope St. Gregory the Great, who was Pope from 590 to 604 A.D., encouraged the faithful to have a series of thirty Masses (one each day for thirty consecutive days) said for a specific person who had recently died. St. Gregory explained that he once had thirty Masses said for a monk named Justus. After the thirtieth Mass was said, Justus appeared before one of his fellow monks and announced that he had been delivered from the flames of purgatory.

The Church has certain rules regarding Gregorian Masses. First of all they can only be offered for the deceased. It does not matter how long ago they died, but it sounds like the tradition is to have the Masses said as soon as possible. Second, they can only be said for one person at a time, not for a group or for all the souls in purgatory. The idea is to focus our prayers for a specific individual. Third, they must be said for thirty consecutive days. They do not all have to be said by the same priest or at the same altar as long as no days are skipped.

Remember, we can always pray for the dead and the souls in purgatory on our own, like when we pray a rosary, or have a holy hour. A layperson can even offer up their own private intentions at a Mass they are attending or request that a Mass be said for one of those same intentions. Those prayers are very effective. What makes Gregorian Masses so unique is that all those Masses are being applied to one specific soul. Very few souls are ready for Heaven when the person dies. Purgatory helps purify them and our prayers help them through that time of purification. Our prayers for the dead are very important.

Gregorian Masses can be offered in any Catholic Church. You can have them said at parish Churches, but you would probably need to have those Masses said at multiple parishes to make sure the thirty days are not interrupted. You should also let the priest or priests know what you are doing so they do not reschedule a Mass and break the thirty days. Otherwise there are religious communities that offer Gregorian Masses. Do an internet search for Gregorian Masses and several communities will come up.

Youth Minister's Letter

"Blessed are they who hope in the Lord." (Ps. 40:5a, Today's Psalm Response)

Sometimes we think hope is another word for "wish," but the theological virtue of hope is so much more. Hope is a "confident expectation of divine blessing and the beatific vision along with a fear of offending God's love. It allows us to trust God for our salvation" (Morgan, Barbara, *Echoing the Mystery*). Hope of eternal life enables us to preach and live the Gospel in a radical way. It calls us to trust God in all things, putting all anxiety aside. Despair is the sin of refusing to hope, of insisting that God cannot help or save you. One of the best antidotes to despair is the Beatitudes. "Beatitude" comes from a word which means blessed, or happy. To live with the virtue of hope is to live the spirit of the Beatitudes that we hear in today's Gospel. In every situation, God offers us hope:

"Blessed are you who are poor, for the kingdom of God is yours. Blessed are you who are now hungry, for you will be satisfied. Blessed are you who are now weeping, for you will laugh. Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude and insult you, and denounce your name as evil on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice and leap for joy on that day! Behold, your reward will be great in heaven" (Lk. 6:20-23).
