FROM FR. JOE

THE SOLEMNITY OF SS. PETER AND PAUL, APOSTLES – JUNE 29

On Wednesday, June 29, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of two of our greatest saints: St. Peter and St. Paul. We recognize both of their names from Sacred Scripture, but how well do we know them? Here is a little more about them.

SAINT PETER

Simon, as he was originally called, was from the area of Galilee. John 1:44 tells us he was from the town of Bethsaida, just north of the Sea of Galilee, and Mark 1:21 tells us that he had a residence in Capernaum, another town on the Sea. Matthew 8:14 describes the healing of Simon's mother-in-law, so we know he was married, but we do not know if they had any children. Jesus called Simon to be one of His Twelve Apostles and began referring to him as Cephas, which is the Aramaic word for "rock". This was later rendered in Greek as petros, which is how we get the name Peter. The change in his name in Matthew 16:18 signified a change in his mission. After this we see Peter taking on the role as a leader among the Twelve and really become the "rock" foundation of the Church. Thus, Peter is known as the first Pope, the leader of the bishops who are the successors of the Apostles.

Peter continued his leadership after the death and Resurrection of Jesus. We can read about his many miracles in the first few chapters of Acts. He ministered in many different communities, but he eventually made his way to Rome. Writings outside of the Bible tell us that he came to Rome between A.D. 41 and 54 and was eventually killed in A.D. 67 under the reign of Emperor Nero. It is said that he was crucified upside down at his own request, because he did not feel worthy to die in the same way as Christ.

SAINT PAUL

Originally named Saul, Paul came from the town of Tarsus, in modern day Turkey. He was a Jew and a member of the Pharisees, but he also had Roman citizenship, which gave him certain legal rights. While still a young man, Saul persecuted Christians and sought to arrest as many as he could. Acts 9:1-19 tells the story of how Saul was converted on his way to Damascus to make some arrests. He became just as, if not more, zealous for the Christian faith as he had been in persecuting it. As Saul begins his missionary work in Acts 13, his name is abruptly changed to Paul. He made three missionary journeys, traveling to and founding many early Christian communities in modern day Greece and Turkey. During the first journey, his focus shifts from trying to convert fellow Jews to converting Gentiles (non-Jews). This leads to a big debate in the early Church that both Paul and Peter helped resolve: should Gentile converts first become Jewish (which included circumcision) and then be baptized or could they just be baptized. Paul was eventually arrested and was taken to Rome. Because he was a Roman citizen, he was beheaded rather than crucified. He is said to have also died in A.D. 67.

Who has guardian angels?

It is considered theologically certain that each member of the faith has a special guardian angel from the time of baptism.

This view is reflected in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, which speaks of "each believer" having a guardian angel.

Although it is certain that the faithful have guardian angels, it is commonly thought that they are even more widely available. Ludwig Ott explains:
According to the general teaching of the theologians, however, not only every baptized person, but every human being, including unbelievers, has his own special guardian angel from his birth [Fundamentals of Catholic Dogma, 120]. This understanding is reflected in an Angelus address by Benedict XVI, who stated:

Dear friends, the Lord is ever close and active in humanity's history and accompanies us with the unique presence of his Angels, whom today the Church venerates as "Guardian Angels", that is, ministers of the divine care for every human being. From the beginning until the hour of death, human life is surrounded by their constant protection [Angelus, Oct. 2, 2011].

- How can we thank them for the help they give us?

The Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments explained:

Devotion to the Holy Angels gives rise to a certain form of the Christian life which is characterized by:

devout gratitude to God for having placed these heavenly spirits of great sanctity and dignity at the service of man;

an attitude of devotion deriving from the knowledge of living constantly in the presence of the Holy Angels of God;-serenity and confidence in facing difficult situations, since the Lord guides and protects the faithful in the way of justice through the ministry of His Holy Angels. Among the prayers to the Guardian Angels the Angele Dei is especially popular, and is often recited by families at morning and evening prayers, or at the recitation of the Angelus [Directory on Popular Piety and the Liturgy, 216].
