Minnesota Marathon for Non-Public Education

I want to express my deepest gratitude to all who have sponsored me, our school, or any of our students for the annual Minnesota Marathon for Non-Public Education. Since its' inception it has been held on the first Saturday of October. I suspect this date was chosen because it was close to the date for the annual Twin Cities Marathon. This past year at least three priests were among



those who competed in the annual Twin Cities Marathon. When I was in elementary school the MN Marathon for Non-Public Education was a city-wide event where many of the various non-public schools would gather together at the same location for at least a twelve-mile marathon. For some reason the number twelve is lodged in my memory as what was then required of us. The route in those days was between the Ford Bridge and the Lake Street-Marshall Bridge traversing on Mississippi River Boulevard on the St. Paul side of the Twin Cities, and West River Parkway on the Minneapolis side. I don't recall if we were required to make the entire circuit, or whether different schools began on different sides depending upon where their respective school resided. Did St. Paul based schools start on the St. Paul side, and Minneapolis based schools start on the Minneapolis side? I don't know. I do recall, however, that at some point there was a picnic at Minnehaha Regional Park, or at least a break with water. I also recall that we were instructed to get pledges per mile. A really great pledge in the middle 1980's would be \$1 per mile. After my family moved to the West Side of St. Paul in the spring of 1987 so that we could be closer to our parish and school I clearly remember going door to door in my neighborhood to seek pledges during that fall. This was also the year the newly constructed Smith Avenue Bridge aka "The High Bridge" reopened, and also the year that the Minnesota Twins won its first World Series. I was ten years old at the time, and entering my favorite year of school, fifth grade. Sometime in the 1990's the practice of multiple schools gathering together for the Minnesota Marathon for Non-Public Education ended, and schools began doing the Marathon on their own.

Sacred Heart has long held the Marathon with a great route. Our school begins at Sanborn Park traversing to Victory Memorial Drive then proceeds south down the drive to roughly 33rd avenue just before Lowry Ave N, and then we head back on the same route to Sanborn Park where a picnic follows. This year, because of a bicycle I got at the annual SHCCW Treasure Hunt last spring, I decided to bike the marathon. Usually, I would walk the route once, but I must confess I felt like I was cheating if I only went once on the route using a bike, so I did it twice. Since I rode the bike from the Sacred Heart Rectory to Sanborn and back, I was able to do about seven miles altogether, but that is about five miles less than I



remember from grade school! Thankfully, these October days have been great, so last Saturday Oct. 9th I was able to do a nine-mile bike ride, and on my day off I was able to get in a 11-mile bike ride. I still need to get an entire 12-mile ride in as well. I am close. Thus far I have brought in approximately \$3,367 for Sacred Heart Catholic School for this year's marathon thanks to you. Thanks again for all of your support!

We even go above and beyond to find favor with our bosses so that we can get a little extra recognition and maybe the next promotion when it comes up. This is the way of the world. Those who have their values set on earthly things are going to work by earthly rules. We forget that it doesn't work that way in the Kingdom of God. Success is measured not from the place of status, influence, or prestige but from the place of humility, service, and sacrifice. The authority that one hopes to achieve is not an authority over others but an authority that comes from wisdom and developing one's relationship with God. Jesus flips the tables on our priorities. Even the first disciples had a tough time understanding this. They really thought that they would somehow receive a privilege or bonus from being faithful. We often operate under that same illusion.



SAINT OF THE WEEK – EXAMPLES OF OUR FAITH



St. John Paul II | Feast Day October 22

St. John Paul II was born Karol Wojtyla in the small Polish town of Wadowice. During World War II, when the Nazis invaded Poland, Karol secretly studied for the priesthood in an underground seminary. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1946, appointed Archbishop of Krakow in 1964, and three years later he was made a cardinal. In 1978, he was elected the 264th pope, where he took the name John Paul II.

St. John Paul II made evangelization a key part of his papacy and made pastoral visits to all parts of the world. In 1981, he was shot twice in an assassination attempt. Following Jesus' example of compassion, he later met with his would-be assassin in his prison cell, where he forgave him for what he had done.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Question:

Are Catholics allowed to visit psychics? Why or why not?

Answer:

It's part of human nature to experience some sense of unease and fear about the future. This can lead some people to seek out the services of psychics or consult horoscopes or turn to other occult practices or resources (e.g. Ouija boards or tarot cards). The Catechism of the Catholic Church is very clear that Catholics should avoid such practices: "Consulting horoscopes, astrology, palm reading, interpretation of omens and lots, the phenomena of clairvoyance, and recourse to mediums all conceal a desire for power over time, history, and, in the last analysis, other human beings, as well as a wish to conciliate hidden powers. They contradict the honor, respect, and loving fear that we owe to God alone" (no. 2116). Despite the uncertainties we might feel, we are called to have faith and trust in God, confident of God's desire for what is best for us. This means that we are called to surrender, to pray and to reflect on how we can best move into the future in hope, knowing that God is with us.


