Cycle B—Reflection on Readings

Second Sunday of Lent Genesis 22:1-2,9,10-13,15-18; Psalm 116 Romans 8:31-34; Mark 9:2-10



Theme: Peak Moments

Peak moments, to use the description of psychologist Abraham Maslov, have an important role in our lives. When time seems to stop, we see the mystery of the known with fresh eyes and eternity seems to break into time. Such moments can be in Church, when we fall in love, or even in simple scenes of beauty in nature, or anywhere. How easy we bandy about the word "love". We love pizza, we love our community, we love our friends.

Today's readings see love not as a momentary emotion but as a lifelong commitment. Nothing is too demanding than to show one's profound dedication.

Mother's joy

A mother is busily getting breakfast for her young family. The kitchen is filled with sunlight, the children are laughing and talking while the husband is playing with the baby. Suddenly, she stops, looks at the scene and is overwhelmed with joy and love for her family and even tears of gratitude begin to fill her eyes.

My beloved, we all need such moments in our lives when we can experience the unmistakable love and mercy and protection of God pursuing us. Perhaps that is why the church places the Transfiguration of the Lord among the somber Lenten readings as we prepare for the awful events of Good Friday. Transfiguration was Christ's peak moment. Jesus was about to begin his terrifying journey to Calvary. But he had a marvelous experience on Mount Tabor.

Getting your peak moments

We must often pray for such experience of God's love which will give us special strength in our sometimes-hard spiritual journey. For example, we will be called like Abraham to obey God's exceedingly difficult demands at times. In his case, he was asked to sacrifice his only son (Gen 22:2), and he obeyed in the faith that God still loved him. *Faith is trusting obedience in a loving Father*. It is a negation of any reliance on one's own powers and resources.

How strong is your faith?

Human beings cannot always see the logic behind God's judgments and way of running his world. The triumph of evil and unfair suffering can often seem to lack sense of fairness, but faith is the conviction that it is all somehow an expression and a means of God's love for every individual. Behind the trials of suffering, the loving hand of God leads his children along the path to perfect happiness.

Sacrifice your only best

The Genesis account of the sacrifice of Isaac is dramatic. God has been promising Abraham a host of descendants and possession of a great land. The promise now seems jeopardized when God asks Abraham to sacrifice Isaac. Yet Abraham will go to this extent. Abraham's love of God means letting go, even of Isaac.

To dramatize the extent of God's willingness to assist us, Paul appeals to a specific kind of love. "He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else?" (Romans 8:32). Thus, God and Abraham both refuse to set limits on their capacity to love.

The Transfiguration relates both to Jesus' transfiguration and to the Christian's transformation through self-giving -- letting go.

Let's Act now

Letting go takes many forms. Life may call us to let go of a career that is damaging to self and family, of a habit that is destroying health or relationships, of purely selfish interests. These are but a few examples of that central reality in life -- that loving means letting go. May our sacrifice for the Lord yield an eternal harvest. Remain Blessed!
