

Pastoral Musings: Be Blessed and Not Stressed



Dear Friends,

Blessed the people the Lord has chosen to be his own (PS 33:1).

As a society and modern culture, we are experiencing the epidemy of stress and anxiety. Keeping up with the demands of life keeps people stressed and worn out. Many of us are getting much less and quality sleep than we need. The heightened stress and anxieties of life makes the blood pressure soar high and get out of control leading to strokes and paralysis in a number of situations of extreme stress. People tend to use many instant ways to numb and compensate the pressures of stress with intoxications and additions that isolate people and trap them in more fear and sickness. Those who are caught up in this vicious cycle find it hard to find freedom and release. This weekend's second reading from the letter of Hebrews focuses on what faith means in the life of the faithful. Faith is the trust and confidence in God that helps transform our stresses and anxieties and make us feel the inner freedom and deliverance of life. It helps us keep God as the center of our life and experience the monumental love that God pours into the daily moments of our life. Faith helps us overcome many anxieties of daily life and finds many ways to bring new life and light into our faith community.

This week, it was a great delight to join with 28 kids and adults in the vacation bible school program inviting kids from other churches and communities. Kids love to dance and sing praise to God through the powerful stories of God's creation and redemption, loving all beings including the pets, animals and birds. It was a delight to see how teachers help the kids to experience the love and joy of faith through action songs, skits and a shared meal every day for a week. I have been talking with our protestant pastors and some volunteers who joined the crew. They are happy to see that our churches are welcoming and keeping an open door to all those who want to come and be part of the community. I told them that Saint Augustine reminds us "in essential things unity, in non -essential liberty, and in all thing's charity." There are many things that unite our protestant brothers and sisters than divide us. The word, "Ecumenical" means "attitude of Christian unity and collaboration". Many of the other denominal churches and catholic parishes are concerned about how our church will survive in the long haul as our younger generation is moving far away from faith and the practice of faith. This is like the grass which is getting dry for lack of water. If we sprinkle water in times of drought and dryness, the grass and the flowers grow and flourish. Similarly, it is important to inspire hope and confidence by doing all that is possible both individually and collectively as a faith community to grow and flourish. While there are faith communities that grow and thrive with active devotion to the Holy Eucharist and Bible studies, ministries to various age groups, and outreach to the poor and less fortunate, it's good to think about how our community is doing and assess the quality of our faith and discipleship. Anyone can take initiative to inspire and bring hope to the community especially for its future generations.

Jesus tells us that "faith can move mountains." As faithful adults by keeping our faith alive, active and sharing with the younger generation, it helps us pass the batons of inspiration and devotion to the Lord by our example and generous outreach. Studies show that those who enjoy the gift of faith are less stressed and feel more blessed; their families are much stronger and less broken or fragmented. Faith filled families handle the pressures of life with trust and ongoing prayer. If hardship or misfortune should come our way, we learn to endure like saints and heroes of our faith, knowing that God is on our side, and trust that He will make all things good for those who love Him. It is not an easier way of life but more fulfilling and happier that this world can offer without faith. By faith Abraham received power to generate and God blessed him with future generations like the sands of the beach and stars of heaven. "Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen" (Heb 11:1). "Truly I tell you, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you." (Matthew 17:20-21). With faith, let us pray for good rain and plentiful harvest in due season. Fr. Tom
