

## FROM FR. JOEL

One of the chief marks of the Church is universality. Is this true of the Church today?

In our profession of faith each Sunday, we recite "I believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church." In this statement are the four marks of the Church: that the Church is one—in unity of faith; that it is holy—it is God's own; that it is catholic—the faith that the Church lives and proclaims is the whole and universal Truth; and that it is apostolic—founded by Christ who established it in the apostles.

Though outward appearances change and clarification is needed at time, these four marks of the Church are timeless. A very good example of this is in our question for today—is the Church still universal. Indeed, the notion that the Church is "catholic" is meant to state that it is universal. However, the way we use the word "catholic" has been deepened and formalized through the centuries.

In the first millennium of Christianity, the Church was understood as "catholic" not in the way of an official title, but as that Church wherein the whole truth of Christ is found. However, beginning in 1058, the Eastern Christians (those whom we know as the "Orthodox Church," who held Constantinople as the place of importance) split from the West (Rome), primarily over differences regarding the authority of the Pope. Later, in the 1500s, beginning with Luther, the Protestant Reformation took place, leading to the use of the terms "Protestant" and "denomination" in differentiating the divisions within Christianity.



#### FROM FR. JOEL (CONTINUED)

It was only after the beginning of Protestantism that the word "catholic" became applied to the Church of Rome as an official title - though the faith and teaching of the Church itself remains unchanged.

More to the question of universality, the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, in paragraph 830-831, speaks of several details: the Church is catholic because Christ is present in her; it is the fullness of the Body of Christ united with its head, having the fullness of means of salvation; and because her mission is to the whole human race. These realities are seen in every parish and every diocese—in all particular churches that are in communion with the Church of Rome. Universality is not understood a total in a number. Rather, universality exists in the complete union of faith and life among all Churches that profess the true faith, which subsists in the Catholic Church.

In these ways, the Church's universality is also seen in the midst of the world and among religions. For, as it is in the Church that the fullness of the Body of Christ and where all the means for salvation are found, it is through the Church that salvation in Christ is available to all people—whether they are Catholic or not. Thus, those who are not familiar with the Church or the true faith through no fault of their own may also achieve salvation. However, we should never tire of bringing the Good News to people in word and in deed. In this way, even those who are not Catholic can hear the Gospel, and hopefully, through God's grace, believe the truth of Jesus Christ and share in the fullness of the life that Jesus offers through his one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church.

#### St. Sebastian | January 20

Not much is known about the life of St. Sebastian (256 – 287), except that he was a Roman martyr whose name has been mentioned throughout history since early 350.

We see St. Sebastian many times in art, especially from iconic paintings from Guido Reni, Andrea Mantegna and Hendrick ter Brugghen. Historical scholars now agree that a spiritual story has the beloved saint entering the Roman army because only there could he assist Christian martyrs without arousing suspicion on himself. Eventually he was found out, brought before Emperor Diocletian and delivered to Mauritanian archers to be shot to death. Pierced with arrows, he was left for dead, but managed to survive. He recovered from his wounds but still refused to leave.

One day, St. Sebastian took up a position near where the emperor was to pass. He confronted the emperor, condemning him for his cruelty to Christians. This time the sentence of death was carried out, and St. Sebastian was beaten to death with clubs. Today he is the patron saint of athletes.
