Jesus tells us to "be vigilant at all times." Advent is a time of watchfulness. Things are moving and shifting and changing — in our souls, in heaven, on earth. It's a time of great consequence. Great trial. Great hope. So, look to Jesus. He is coming.

First Reading: "In those days, in that time, will raise up for David a just shoot ; he shall do what is right and just in the land." (Jer 33:15)

Psalm: To you, O Lord, I lift my soul. (Ps 25) **Second Reading:** May the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we have for you, so as to strengthen your hearts, to be blameless in holiness before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his holy ones. (I Thes 3:12-13)

Gospel: "But when these signs begin to happen, stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand." (Lk 21:28)

GOSPEL MEDITATION

When I was a young priest, about one year after ordination, I was called to the hospital to anoint a dying mother of three young children. She had a painful, terminal cancer. After celebrating Last Rites with her, I said, "Don't be afraid." She looked me square in the eye from her hospital bed and said, "Oh Father, I am in a lot of pain, but I am not afraid. Something wonderful is about to happen." A few days later she died.

Christians face the ending of our personal various "worlds" in a totally unique way. This first Sunday of Advent, Jesus says that when people see their world falling apart, they find themselves "fainting with fear and with foreboding of what is coming on the world" (Luke 21:26). In our fear, our natural response is to check out, to hide our heads in drunkenness, distraction, and false securities. But Jesus commands us to "look up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near." He then compares what's coming to a lovely summer in full bloom. That's what the cross and resurrection empower us to do, as strange as it may seem.

ADVENT CHALLENGE: What world in your life is collapsing? A relationship, a dream, a work opportunity? Maybe you're troubled by a crumbling world in the political or economic sphere. Or maybe someone you love is seriously ill or dying. Name that world or worlds. Then pray: "Lord, help me to not faint with fear. Help me to raise my head and see your redemption coming." — Father John Muir





Q: "What is heaven like?"

- Robert V., 15 A: Reading about heaven is fascinating. Unfortunately, very few books are out today that address the topic. Perhaps this is why so few seem to be concerned with heaven. Nevertheless, it is worthy of much discussion.

Heaven will be the most profound experience we will ever know. The Bible uses human terms to describe heaven, but these fall far short of the reality. Heaven has been referred to as "eternal life," "holy city," city of solemnity," "promised land," "everlasting joy," and "perpetual rest." St. Paul tells us that "eye has not seen, and ear has not heart, and it has not entered the human heart, what God has prepared for those who love Him" (1 Cor. 2-9).

with God (1 Pet. 4:19, Ps 31:5). The Beatific Vision (the vision of God) will be our completion. Our souls crave heaven, even though many of us do not know it. Hell is perpetual incompleteness. Hell is the pain of the loss of God. In contrast, heaven is the complete joy found is the possession of God.

Imagine a 10-year-old girl who has been locked in a dark and cold cell all of her life and then is finally set free. She is set free into an endless field of flowers. It's a sea of beauty with no boundaries. She is basking in the warm sun. The little child is allowed to gaze upon and pick the flowers. Each flower is more beautiful than the next. She is truly happy for the first time in her life. She knows she will always remain happy. This example is but a small taste of the endless beauty and joy of

heaven.

Did you ever see something so beautiful that you actually lost your breath for a second? In time, however, you were not as moved as when you first saw it. Well, the Beatific Vision will be like that first awe-filled breath. But this breath will never end.

When people see something that is delightful, they occasionally burst into tears with joy. The joy is so intense that tears are the only appropriate response. This too is what the Beatific Vision will be like. Our hearts will be so filled with joy and God's love that they will want to burst.

In heaven, not only will every wish be satisfied, every wish will be anticipated by God. We wont even have to wish for anything. It will already be there. In fact, we will be incapable of wishing for more than we already have because we will have God.

I can guarantee if you read good Catholic books on heaven and think about it often, you will grow in love and desire for it. When you desire something, you work towards it. Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained: **ADVENT WREATH**

Question: What's the story behind the Advent Wreath? Answer: Each season in the liturgical calendar comes with its own local and regional rituals. During the Advent season, wreathes adorn church sanctuaries and family dining room tables. You may have said Advent wreath prayers in childhood or taken a turn lighting the candles. The Advent wreath is full of symbolism about Christ and his rose vestments at Mass. This is coming at Christmas. The wreath is made of evergreen boughs, reminding us that the life of grace doesn't falter with the changing seasons. It always remains fresh and new. Similarly, a circular wreath reminds us of the eternal, never-ending nature of God's love.

Candles remind us that Christ is the light of the world, the

One who "shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." We use four candles to represent each week of Advent. Traditionally they come in the liturgical colors of the season. Purple has historically represented penance and sacrifice. We see the same color for the season of Lent. On the third Sunday of Advent, however, we light a rose color. The priest will wear Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means "rejoice" in Latin. On the third Sunday of Advent, we're roughly halfway through the season. The Church chooses the midpoint to remind us to celebrate in the midst of our anticipation! Whatever the color and whatever the day, the Advent wreath is a beautiful practice to focus our attention on Christ's coming at Christmas.


