

The news of the Messiah unsettled Herod. We see his anxiety clearly in today's Gospel. This is what Christ has come to do, after all. He has come to shake things up. Are we ready to be unsettled?

First Reading: Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem!prophets by the Spirit: that the Gentiles are
coheirs, members of the same body, and
copartners in the promise in Christ JesusYour light has come, the glory of the Lord
shines upon you. (Is 60:1)copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus

Psalm: Lord, every nation on earth will adore you. (Ps 72)

Second Reading: It was not made known to people in other generations as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and

prophets by the Spirit: that the Gentiles are coheirs, members of the same body, and copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel. (Eph 3:5-6) **Gospel:** "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." (Mt 2:2)

GOSPEL MEDITATION

Have you ever wondered *why* the magi had gold, frankincense, and myrrh? Matthew's Gospel tells us, **"Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh"** (Matt. 2:11). Why are these things their "treasures"? One possible answer is they were magicians and astrologers, and these three items were the tools of their questionable trade. In offering them to Christ, they demonstrate that they will cease using such items to predict or control life. They place this baby-king, the God of Israel, at the center of their lives, and not their own devices of control, manipulation and prediction.

Isn't that what we need to do, too? Consider, for example, the magical power of money, symbolized by the magi's gold. Seemingly whatever we ask of money, it does. It wields a god-like power over the world. It can predict the future by guaranteeing better outcomes for us — which is why it is such a tempting alternative to trusting in God. The problem is such absolute trust in money enslaves us to the economic forces that make money so powerful. In paying homage to Jesus with "gold" (i.e., tithing), we participate in his authority over (and therefore freedom from) the magical sway of money.

What things in your life do you use to predict or control your future? What in your life seems to give you power over the world? Those are your treasures. Are you tired of feeling enslaved to them? Find a way to open them and give them to Christ, and you will be freer.

Epiphany Blessing, Explained

The Epiphany household blessing is a centuries-old tradition that invokes God's blessing on all who enter one's home.

All you need for an Epiphany blessing is chalk, which is usually made available by parishes either on the feast of the Epiphany or in

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained: EPIPHANY

Question: Besides the Wise Men, what is significant about the Epiphany?

Answer: Epiphany means "manifestation," or public display. The feast is usually celebrated January 6. In the US, it is

celebrated on the Sunday nearest to January 6.

It originates from a story unique to Matthew (2:1-12). Magi from the East come to offer homage to the newborn King, presenting him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

This part of Matthew's infancy narrative differs from Luke's account of the birth of Jesus. In Luke there are no Magi, star, nor gifts. Luke has Jesus being born in a stable after Mary and Joseph's long travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem. Matthew seems to have the family living in a house in Bethlehem, where the Magi find them.

Why these differences? They stem from the needs and



concerns of the audience the authors were addressing, as well as the theological stance of each author. Knowing the original

intention helps

get at the correct interpretation of the text. Since Matthew was writing primarily to a Jewish community, his concern was to show that Jesus did not come just for Jews, but for Gentiles as well. From his very birth, Jesus not only manifests himself to Jews, but also to Gentiles, who are prominently included in the manifestation, symbolized by the Magi and their journey. This is the most significant aspect of the feast of Epiphany. How do you manifest Jesus to all with whom you come into contact?



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



Q: "How could there be a place like hell if Jesus loves people unconditionally?" — Jennifer N., 17

A: Because Jesus loves people so much He gives them the tremendous gift of freedom. That means if they chose to reject Him, He will not force Himself upon them. Those who finally reject Him get what they want — to be left alone by God. That is the horrendous reality we call hell.

Here are seven reasons why a place like hell is reasonable to believe in and, despite it's horrendousness, is still compatible with God's love.

(1) What else can God do with the man? If a man dies loving himself more than God, what can God do with him? He has to let him to the place of his own making. He can't take him to heaven and force him to love Him, for that would mean an inconceivably close union with God, Whom the man hates. Loving God (and being close to Him) would be a ceaseless torment to the man, who really loves himself most of all. It is impossible for man to reject God and possess Him at the same time.

(2) Jesus (and the Father) wouldn't lie. God the Father and the Son (Jesus) reveal many times in Scripture that hell is real. How then could God say, "I was only kidding." God doesn't kid about something as serious as hell. It must be true.

(3) God is justice and love together. God is not 51 percent love and 49 percent justice or vice versa. God is 100 percent justice and 100 percent love at the same time. By His very nature (perfection), God is incapable of an injustice. Therefore, eternal punishment must somehow be just.

Our free will is a gift that is in accord with our dignity as human beings. It would be an injustice for God to force us to love Him because this would go against our nature as humans. It would not offer the challenge or choice that our intellects and free will deserve. It would be an injustice for Him *not* to allow us to use our free will to choose or reject Him. Therefore, hell can actually be an argument *for* the justice of God.

(4) Because the offense is so serious, the punishment must be just. If a person assaults another person, he may go to prison for a year. If he assaults the mayor, he will go to prison for a longer time. If he assaults the president of the United States, he'll go for an even longer time. And, if he assaults the eternal God, by rejecting Him and His laws, it's not unreasonable to think he should go to "prison" for all eternity. Why? The penalty is measured by the gravity of the offense and the importance of the person we assault. Rejecting an infinite God (and not repenting) merits an infinite punishment. (5) God does not condemn men to hell. We condemn ourselves. God simply allows it because He knows that because the man rejected Him, it is just. God gives us every possible aid to avoid hell. He gave His only Son. He gave us the Church and the pope to teach us. He gave us the Bible as written documentation of His truth. He gave us the Eucharist to nourish us spiritually. He gave us Confession to heal us spiritually. He even gave us the Anointing of the Sick for those who are close to death. He gave us miracles to help us believe. Yet, people still reject Him. They couldn't care less about Him or His laws. What is God to do with them without offending their human dignity and free will?


(6) Because man would live a more sinful life if there weren't the threat of hell. The possibility of spending eternity in hell is a great deterrent for bad behavior. Hell is an "emergency brake" against a life of sin. Time has proven that, because of our sinful nature and love of self, too many men choose to live for themselves instead of God. And this is in a world that mostly believes that hell exists. Can you imagine what life would be like if Christianity taught that there was a second chance after this life? Many would act much differently. Many would say, "I'm going to live it up here on earth because I plan to repent in the next life." We would have chaos. We would have much more abortion, homicide, premarital sex, etc.

(7) If punishment on earth is OK, why not in the afterlife? For those of you who reject the idea of eternal punishment, why do you not reject temporal (earthly) punishment? Why have prisons? Why have traffic tickets for speeding violations? Why have penalties for crimes here on earth if you're not prepared to have penalties for crimes committed against the One who made the earth? Penalties for crimes are necessary in order to maintain earthly justice and order. Likewise, penalties for crimes against God are necessary in order to maintain justice and order in the spiritual realm.

It's important to remember you are in no danger of hell if you simply are faithful to God and His laws. God will help us. And, if you fall into sin, get back up and be reconciled through the confessional. God does not take pleasure in allowing people to go to hell. Nor should we. This would be a warped view of justice. We should want all to be saved. We should always pray the Our Lady of Fatima prayer at the end of each decade of the rosary which says in part, "Lead all souls to heaven, especially those in most need of Thy mercy."



God's Doorkeeper
