

"The people were filled with expectation." writes Luke. And so we find ourselves, two thousand years later, filled with expectation, with longing. Who can give us what we seek? Only the one upon whom the dove descended. Follow him.

First Reading: Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together; for the mouth of the LORD has spoken. (40:5)

Psalm: O bless the Lord, my soul. (Ps 104) Second Reading: He saved us through the bath of rebirth and renewal by the Holy

Spirit. (Ti 3:5)

Gospel: After all the people had been baptized and Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily

form like a dove. (Lk 3:22)

GOSPEL MEDITATION

In my second year of theology studies, I went to confession to a priest visiting the seminary for a three-day retreat. My heart wasn't in it. I was going through the motions. I confessed my sins and waited for his response. The priest said, "For your penance, I'd like you to go into the chapel and repeat the words 'You are my beloved Son, with you I am well pleased' (Luke 3:22) until they mean something to you." Easy penance, I thought.

But to my surprise, I struggled to say those words. I sensed a strong interior resistance blocking them. How could God be well-pleased with me? He couldn't be, I thought. A battle within me ensued. Two hours later, the resistance vanished, and I found myself able to speak, and claim as my own, those marvelous words. I emerged from the chapel with a new, deep, peaceful conviction that I was indeed God's beloved son.

Those words are a precious gift from heaven to all of us. Jesus' baptism, which we celebrate this week, offers them to us. Are we willing to receive these words anew? Many things can block this deepening of our baptismal identity: failings, sins, disappointments, traumas, problems, and so on. Yet God's love is always greater. This week I challenge you to prayerfully repeat these words over yourself — or perhaps over someone you're struggling to love until those words find a home in your heart. — Father John Muir



The Epiphany household blessing is a centuries-old tradition that invokes God's blessing on all who enter one's home.

All you need for an Epiphany blessing is chalk, which is usually made available by parishes either on the feast of the Epipha-

ny or in the weeks leading up to it. There are a few different formulas for blessings out there, but the essence of the ritual is always the same: a priest or the head of the household calls down God's blessing on the house and everyone who comes into it, and an inscription is made above the door in chalk.

The inscription reads: the first two digits of the year + C + M + B + the last two digits of the year. The initials C, M and B rep-

resent the names of the magi — Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar — and also signify the Latin phrase Christus mansionem benedicat:

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained: BAPTISMAL BIB

Question: At my grandson's Baptism, the priest put a bib on the baby. I do not remember seeing this before. Why is this done? Is it something new?

Answer: When an adult is baptized, there is a part in the ceremony when the newly baptized is vested in a white garment. It is symbolic of the changes that baptism brings in the life of the baptized as they are freed from the bonds of sin and brought into the saving grace of Christ. Realities that are so profound are symbolically presented so that we might better grasp and understand them.

Infants are often dressed in a baptismal dress, which is the baptismal garment. In some places, the bib is used as a kind of baptismal garment. At the place in the ceremony

where the investiture takes place, the bib is used. Some are poncho-like and fit over

the baby's head. Others are simply placed on the baby's chest. If the baby is dressed in a white garment, nothing else is needed.


The prayer says it

all: "See in your white garment the outward sign of your Christian dignity ... bring that dignity unstained into the everlasting life of heaven." In baptism, we are given our purpose and goal in life as believers and this is symbolized by the white garment.

Q: "What is purgatory?" — Meagan R., 15

A: Purgatory is the state of purification that some souls undergo before receiving the Beatific Vision, the vision of God. Purgatory is an infallible dogma of the Faith.

Purgatory is for people who are destined for heaven, but who have venial sins on their souls or the effects of *forgiven* mortal sins, which must be cleansed (Matt. 5:26). Because "nothing unclean shall enter" into heaven (Rev. 21:27), God has established a place of final purification, purgatory. Purgatory is not a "second chance." If one dies in mortal sin, he goes directly to hell. If one dies in a state of grace and has completely formed his will and love of God to a state of perfections, he will go straight to heaven.

At our personal judgements after death (Heb. 9:27, 2 Cor. 5:8), we will know our past life as never before. If we get saved but are still attached to the vestiges (remnants) of sin, we will not only see the justice and logic of purgatory, but will actually want to go there. As C.S. Lewis one wrote, "Our souls demand purgatory, don't they?" No questions will arise; no justification will be offered. We will adore and humble ourselves before Jesus when we first meet Him, but then want to leave His presence because it would be an insult to Him for us to stay.

When we sin, we love ourselves more than God and His laws. This is disordered love. This sin is like the impurities found in newly mined gold. To make the gold perfect, we need to put it through fire. The fire "sweats out" the impurities. This is analogous to the purification process in purgatory (1 Cor. 3:12-13).

There's a common objection directed at the Church by Protestants that the doctrine of purgatory "takes away from the work of Jesus on the cross at Calvary" and is therefore unbiblical. This is not true. Purgatory is an *application of* the cross. Jesus' death is so powerful that it can actually purify us in the afterlife. The souls in purgatory are purged of their sin by their sharing in the sufferings of Christ.
