

GOSPEL MEDITATION

When I was a young boy, my parents told me about their wedding. Then a few years later, they showed me my mother's wedding dress and my dad's suit. It was astonishing to see and touch garments that connected me to the event that led to my existence. Of course, I already believed they were married based on their word. But these holy garments made the event real and tangible for me.

Something like this is at play when St. John reports encountering in Jesus' tomb, "the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place" (John 20:7). Those two separate cloths, for his head and for his body respectively, meant a great deal to St. John and to the early Christians. Some years after the resurrection, there surfaced reports of two cloths with unusual characteristics, one bearing the image of a crucified man's body, another smaller one with the image of a wounded man's face. Some call them the Shroud of Turin and the Veil of Manoppello; they both can be seen today. These two cloths have a long and complicated history, and scholars debate aspects of them. If you're curious, I encourage you to read about them. To be clear, I believe in the resurrection of Jesus because of the testimony of eyewitnesses and the gift of faith in the Church. Nevertheless, seeing these two mysterious cloths have made the life-giving event of Jesus' resurrection more real and tangible for me. Maybe they will for you, too.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained: DISCERNMENT

Question: How do I discern if a call to do something big is really from God?

Answer: Each day we face plenty of decisions about following God: whether or not to pray, how to treat people, and how to prioritize our time. Sometimes there can be something much more significant we discern: a vocational call, a promotion at work that requires a move, or a new ministry position at church. In addition to a pro-con list or a cost-benefit analysis, here are a few things to prayerfully consider and to talk over with trusted individuals.

Does it conform to God's will revealed in the Church? God doesn't call us to do something that contradicts the moral law. Will it encourage spiritual growth? Sometimes we need to choose between multiple good options.

Consider the personal impact on you and others you are responsible for, like family. Other times we might be invited to do good for others, but when we assess our other life commitments, we see that saying yes to this would actually impede our prior responsibilities in the long run. Does the call seem consistent?

This isn't to say that God won't do something new. Even so, consider if the call is consistent with your gifts and abilities. Can you see a "through-line" so to speak, with how your experiences have led you to this point? Do others confirm it? Share your reflections with trusted, insightful confidantes. Have they seen the same things you have, or are they bringing up new points to consider? Humbly add their relevant points to your considerations. Don't forget your gut. After you've carefully considered everything in your mind, don't neglect your instincts. Does your heart say yes or no?



A: Saturday was the Sabbath for the Jews, but the early Christians changed the practice to Sunday to commemorate Jesus' rising from

Jesus' rising from the dead on Sunday. For the first Jewish Christians, both Saturday (the original





Sabbath) and Sunday were regarded as festival days. As the number of Jewish converts to Christianity decreased, the observance of Saturday as a holy day diminished.

For the gentile (non-Jewish) Christians, Saturday never had any importance. They only observed Sunday as a holy day. There have been attempts by modern Protestant sects to reestablish Saturday as the day of worship. The most notable sect is the Seventh-Day Adventists. This belief has virtually no historical basis and is contrary to the spirit of the early Church and the will of God.

PROLIFE UPDATES

On March 26, Dr. Susan Bane, OB-GYN of 25 years, spoke at Legislative Day. She is the director of four pregnancy centers in North Carolina. She knows full well the effects of abortion on families, especially mothers and those living human lost to abortions. Amendment 3 is not life affirming care. The are no safeguards for licensing plan at planned parenthoods, for safety procedures, for counseling care afterwards for women that need to recover from health and healing of the trauma of an abortion, and for the dangers of chemical abortions. She stated one in 25 mothers go to emergency rooms after the surgical or chemical procedures.

EIGHTH MONTH OF UNBORN BABY DEVELOPMENT: In the eighth month, a baby swallows a gallon of amniotic fluid per day and often hiccups. The baby kicks, and mom may be able to feel an elbow or heel against her abdomen. The baby sleeps and wakes in a pattern, and senses the difference between light and darkness. Fingernails reach the end of a baby's fingers. A baby can weigh 4 or 5 pounds.

Baby shower celebration: This year our parish family will celebrate the birth of babies we have been praying for during the last nine months of our spiritual adoption program for unborn babies. We will celebrate with a baby shower the weekend of May 31 and June 1 after Masses at the front entrance of church extending into the cry room. Items for Baby Grace and My Life Clinic will be listed in the future.

We will have baskets available at the entrances of church and in the school office in May for the baby shower weekend for anyone who cannot attend and would like to participate.
