

Jesus said, "My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me." To follow him, we must know him. This week, how can we know Jesus better?

First Reading: The Gentiles were delighted when they heard this and glorified the word of the Lord. All who were destined for eternal life came to believe, and the word of the Lord continued to spread through the whole region. (Acts 13:48-49)

GOSPEL MEDITATION

A few years back, I felt as if I couldn't hear God's voice the way I used to. The words in the Bible seemed like cold ink on a page. Prayer felt like sitting anxiously in a lonely room. I was worried — how could I, a priest, preach or help others if I couldn't hear God's voice? It went on for months.

Then a friend encouraged me to go on a retreat and spend as much time as possible in silence. After a day or two of quiet prayer, I noticed gentle but clear thoughts of repentance in two specific areas of my life. I asked God for the grace to change, and I went to confession. Suddenly, the divine silence that haunted me was filled with a sense of God's closeness and goodness. I realized, gratefully, that God had been speaking to me in the quiet voice of my conscience.

This week we hear Jesus say, "My sheep hear my voice. I know them and they follow me" (John 10:27). Jesus links the hearing of his voice to following him. He speaks to us in our conscience in an intimate, personal way, when we most need to hear him. When you feel deaf to God's voice, perhaps it is time to listen in silence for His voice in your conscience calling you to hear and follow the Good Shepherd of your soul.



Catholic Life Explained: WHY DO WE GENUFLECT?

Question: Why do we genuflect?

Answer: Genuflection is an act of devotion that literally means "to bend the knee." For many Catholics, it's an almost automatic gesture that we perform before entering our pew or row of seats at Mass. But, like many of the symbols and gestures of our faith tradition, genuflecting can also be an invitation for deeper reflection.

The practice of "bending the knee" is an ancient way of recognizing the presence of someone greater than we are. It has been said that the practice dates back to the time of Alexander the Great, but it became a common part of etiquette in the royal courts of the Middle Ages. From throne rooms and palaces, it was a small step to genuflecting becoming part of the devotional lives of Christians, who used this secular gesture as a way of recognizing the presence of the One who is King of Kings, especially in the Eucharist. Today, Catholics are asked to genuflect in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament (whether in the tabernacle or exposed on the altar during eucharistic adoration). So, while it has become second nature to genuflect before entering your seat in church, we should pay attention to where the Blessed Sacrament is kept in each church or chapel that we visit, and genuflect in the direction of the tabernacle where the Blessed Sacrament is kept. In churches or chapels in which the tabernacle is in a separate space, we are invited to simply bow toward the altar.

In addition to genuflecting before the Blessed Sacrament, we are also instructed to genuflect before the cross used for veneration on Good Friday (during the solemn celebrations of the Lord's Passion) and any time a relic of the True Cross is displayed for veneration. This long-standing tradition is a way of honoring the cross as the great sign of our salvation and of showing devotion to the passion of Jesus.

Q: "Why aren't Catholic priests allowed to marry?" — Amy F., 14

A: Although the early Church allowed married clergy, the Church later came to see celibacy as a better example of the norm and model of Jesus' priesthood.

In referring to celibacy, St. Paul says: "Indeed, I wish everyone to

be as I am, but each has a particular gift from God ... Now to the unmarried and to widows I say: it is a good thing for them to remain as they are, as I do" (1 Cor. 7:7-8). He goes on to say: "An unmarried man is anxious about the things of the Lord, how he may please the Lord. But the married man is anxious about the things of the world, how he may please his wife, and he is divided" (1 Cor. 7:32-54).

Jesus said: "Everyone who has given up house or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands for the sake of My name will receive a hundred times more, and will inherit eternal life" (Matt. 19:29).

Celibacy is a discipline, not a dogma. This means that the Church could change the rule. However, this is unlikely because of the many positive and practical benefits of celibacy. Here are 10 reasons why a celibate clergy makes good sense:

- 1. It leaves the priest free to more fully commit his life to the service of the Lord and the laity.
- 2. The Church has found it is better to keep priests moving from parish to parish every few years perhaps for a few reasons, including the desire to prevent a cult of personality from building around a particular priest. This situation can put too much focus on the man vs. the message. Can you imagine how much stress it would cause a priest to have to move a wife and family each time? Having a celibate priesthood enables the bishop, to whom the priest dedicates his life at ordination, the full flexibility he needs to move priests around.
- 3. To be able to lay their life down for their flock. Because a celibate priest does not have the obligation of a wife and children, he can give himself more easily: including his own life, if necessary. For example, Blessed Damien de Veuster of Belgium was able to work with lepers on the island of Molokai, Hawaii, because of the freedom he had in being a celibate minister. This work eventually lead to his contracting and dying from leprosy.
- 4. It is a sign of contradiction and challenge to a society that is flooded with sexual messages. Celibacy surely gains the Catholic clergy a hidden respect from many people.
- 5. It gives the priest greater credibility when he asks the laity to make sacrifices because the laity knows that celibacy involves sacrifice.
- 6. It helps the priest master his passions, which will help as he teaches and ministers to the laity. It also gives him more time for prayer, which is the lifeblood of any ministry.
- 7. It enables a priest to be more objective when counseling married couples. He is less likely to project his own marriage successes or problems onto the couple.
- 8. It enables the priest to be a "spiritual father" to many more

people than a married man.

9. It allows the Church to put the hundreds of millions of dollars it saves in priestly salaries to the evangelization and charitable assistance of a needy world. Although priests do receive salaries, they are much less than they would have to be if they had families to support.

10.It's a foreshadowing that there will be no marriage in heaven.

No one is required to live a permanently celibate life. The Church says that people are free to marry. In fact, the Church glorifies the married state. Only if one wants to become a priest, brother or religious sister do they have to live a celibate life. The religious life, and the

requirements that come with it, do not have to be chosen by anyone. However, when it is chosen, it needs to be followed in the manner our Lord and His Church requires.

Sure celibacy can be difficult, especially in this sexually permissive age. But if a priest has good seminary formation that strongly supports celibacy and if he stays close to our Lord in prayer, he will be able to turn this sacrifice into a wonderful aid to his work.



PROLIFE UPDATES

Ninth Month of Unborn Baby Development: In the ninth month, a baby will gain one half pound per week as it is getting ready for birth. The bones in the head are soft and flexible to help with the journey down the narrow birth canal. Of the 45 generations of cell divisions before adulthood, 41 have already taken place. Only four more come before adolescence. Ninety percent of a person's development happens in the womb.

Our Ss. Peter and Paul Parish Baby Shower will be Saturday, May 31 and Sunday, June 1 at front entrance of church and cry room. Pick up some literature, ask questions, grab a couple of cookies and a bookmark for the kids.

We will have baskets available at each of the church entrances and in the school office two weeks before the baby shower weekend for anyone who cannot attend and would like to donate a baby shower gift.

Baby shower gifts needed are as follows: baby lotion, head-to-toe body wash and shampoo, nail clippers, pacifiers, diaper rash ointment, newborn diapers to size 5, infant sleepers through size 1, and infant clothing through size 1. Baby thermometers, and white onesies size newborn and 3-6 months are also needed.

Items will be taken to My Life Clinic and a pregnancy resource center. We toured the centers that do so much to support parents of an unplanned pregnancy with no cost: sonograms, counseling, educating parents on caring for their baby, helping mothers get jobs, managing a household, cooking and a place to stay as needed.

Thursday, May 1 was the Midwest March for Life at the Mis-

souri State Capitol. The theme was "To Honor and Glorify Jesus Christ and Defend Innocent Life." Bishop Rice based his talk about defending life on a phrase on the wall in the senate chamber of the capitol that read "Nothing is politically right which is morally wrong."



Andrew Bailey, the attorney general, gave testimony of his own family adopting two children. He gave a speech on the need to appeal and replace Amendment 3 because the law did not explain what it actually would do.

Denny Haskins, Secretary of State, stressed all should be protected, and Governor Mike Kehoe stressed the importance of involvement. Speakers talked about not growing weary, the importance of involving fathers and programs for fathers. Another woman talked about being led into the room for an abortion, and a doctor who tried to convince her to continue the abortion after she changed her mind. She left the room after seeing blood on the floor. A janitor in the hallway helped her. There were additional speakers offering support and discussing why abortions are not health care nor are they safe, especially, the chemical abortions.
