

GOSPEL MEDITATION

Once I was invited to a group meeting with Pope Francis. Entering the room, I paused, eyeing the seats next to the Pope's fancy chair. Someone saw my paralysis and invited me to sit in the seat farthest from what I wanted. Hiding my disappointment, I sat. We waited. To our surprise, an aid pointed out that those seats were still empty and invited me and another to have them. We calmly but gleefully strode across the room and sat. Pope Francis entered, and we enjoyed two hours of amazingly uplifting conversation.

Jesus says this week to us: "When you are invited, go and take the lowest place so that when the host comes to you he may say, 'My friend, move up to a higher position.' Then you will enjoy the esteem of your companions at the table" (Luke 14:10). This is not about how to score free seat upgrades. Rather, it is a wise pattern for the whole of life. It is how to live free from the anxiety of constantly grasping for status and recognition.

Jesus perfectly embodies his seat-taking advice. He eschews his glorious throne for the lowest: death on a cross, that lonely chair we all deserve. In his resurrection, he calls us up higher to his marvelous banquet seats. This week, perhaps we should look for opportunities to choose the lowest seat. We'll be pleasantly surprised when we do.



Catholic Life Explained: CAN WE CHEW GUM AT MASS?

Question: Does chewing gum break the fast before Communion?

Answer: If you look in Canon Law or in the Catechism, there is no mention of chewing gum. I guess it does not rate the attention of the universal church! The Church requires us to fast for one hour before we receive the Eucharist. Basically, we are to refrain from food and drink, not including water or medicine. There are also exceptions for people who are ill. Overall, the fast is intended for us to prepare ourselves to receive the Eucharist and in some small way to literally as well as spiritually hunger for what we are about to receive. Chewing gum, while not really food, does at least break the spirit of the fast. Besides that, it is a distraction and rude. What do you do with the gum when it is time to receive Communion? People have actually come to the altar chewing away, oblivious to what they were doing or Who they were receiving. At best, it is distracting and irreverent. At worst, it adds a barrier to giving our best to receiving God's best.

MAKE BREAST HEALTH A PRIORITY

Q: " Are you allowed to use birth control if you are a Catholic?" — Kay B., 15

A: Your question is very important, but complicated, so I will have to spend some time addressing it.

Does the Church allow birth control? It depends on what you mean by "birth control. Birth control, as the name suggests, regulates the birth of children. Consequently, birth control can include things such as contraception and abortion as well as Natural Family Planning (NFP).

Contraception is "any action which, either in anticipation of the conjugal act, or in its accomplishment, or in the development of its natural consequences, proposes, whether as an end or as a means, to render procreation impossible. (Humanae vitae, no. 14). Abortion is the deliberate and direct ending of a pregnancy by terminating the life of an innocent, unborn

child. Both are morally unacceptable means of "regulating birth" or "birth control," although abortion (and the forms of artificial

contraception that can work as abortifacients) is the graver of the two immoral acts. The sin of contraception may be committed by means of contraceptive pills, condoms, spermicides, physical

or chemical

"barriers."

sterilization, etc. None of these are morally acceptable means of family planning.

On the other hand, there are morally acceptable means of "regulating births." Natural Family Planning (NFP) uses restriction of sexual intercourse to the infertile times of a woman's cycle to avoid pregnancy.

One of the most awesome gifts God gave man is the ability to

generate new life made in God's image. Human beings are co-creators with God in that process. Contraception deliberately thwarts this Godgiven gift by treating

conception as an evil physically or chemically altering the act of intercourse. God designed sexual intercourse with two inherent "meanings." These meanings are Foreword by Jeff Cavins sort of "written into" the act itself. They are disorder.

> the "unitive" or person-uniting meaning (loving) and the "procreative" or personbegetting meaning. These two meanings are interrelated and were intended by God to be present in every act of intercourse.

Every act of intercourse need not result in procreation. God designed things in such a way that this doesn't happen. But each act of intercourse should have, by its nature or the kind of act it is, the possibility of new life. The act should have a procreative meaning even it, here and now, procreation doesn't occur.

Contraception, as I've said, works against that meaning. It deprives the act of sexual intercourse of its procreative meaning. It turns it into another kind of act, one not only closed to new life but actually hostile to it. How so? By taking something like the pill, wearing something or otherwise doing something directly and intentionally opposed to new life. Consider an analogy: Let's say I want to lose weight. One way is to avoid foods that have a lot are challenging to raise, but, of calories. But what if I ate large pieces of chocolate cake, savored the taste and swallowed it, but then, to avoid gaining weight, I made myself vomit? I enjoyed the goodness

of the cake, but then did something, the unnatural act of forced vomiting, to avoid the consequences of my act. The natural purpose of eating is for nourishing the body. Yes, it is pleasurable, but the thing to be avoided by pleasure that accompanies the act ought not to be our only purpose for eating. We ought not to eat in such a way that we actually thwart the nourishing purpose or "meaning" of eating, just for the pleasure of it. People who do that have an eating

> Contraception is similar. People contracept to avoid a natural consequence of the sex act contraception — but still insist on the pleasure. In doing so, they attack one of the basic goods (new life) inherent in the act. And, not only do they hurt the procreative meaning of intercourse, they also attack its unitive or person-uniting (loving) meaning. People who contracept withhold a very important part of themselves in their love making: their power to generate with another a being made in God's image. They do not really give their whole selves to their spouse in intercourse; they do not fully become "one flesh" in that sense.

We live in an age where children are often viewed with contempt. Children are often seen as burdens, liabilities and obstacles to "personal freedom." This is an anti-life mentality that too often manifests itself in families where parents are more concerned with material gain and leisure than raising up children for God. Sure children ultimately, they bring far greater joy and love to the family than worldly pursuits.
