

Good Shepherd Sunday and the need for more priests

The fourth Sunday in the Easter season is known as “Good Shepherd Sunday”. This is because the gospel story on this Sunday is always about Jesus describing himself as the “good shepherd” who lays down his life for his sheep. The shepherd calls his sheep by name, and the sheep recognize his voice and follow him, and they will follow no other. The good shepherd protects and cares for his flock and will make sacrifices for them. During this Easter season, when we remember that our Shepherd died for us to set us free, let us thank God that we are under the secure care of this very, very, good Shepherd!

This fourth Sunday of Easter has also come to be known as “Vocations Sunday” when the Church asks the Lord to call forth more good priests to shepherd God’s people. Today, we also pray for men and women who hear the call of the Lord and follow him in full-time religious service – Sisters and Brothers. We remember our permanent deacons too. Our faith could not flourish without this entire great army of servants who spend their lives tending the flock of Christ. We need to pray for them, and fervently today, that more and more young people will heed the call to serve God’s people in all corners of the world.

Sometimes married people also experience a “call within a call” as Mother Teresa puts it. She was already a nun when the Lord called her to serve the poorest of the poor. Sometimes married people feel a tug at their hearts to do more for Christ. It is important that they not shrug it off. The work of laypeople in diverse ministries in the Church today, now more than ever, touch the lives of countless thousands of people who will never come in contact with priest or Religious.

Our diocesan newspaper, *The Evangelist*, has lately featured priests of our diocese and interviewed them about the origins of their vocation and how they feel about their ministries today. This past week, Fr. Rich Carlino, a native of Troy who serves in Schenectady, was asked how he felt about priesthood, almost 40 years after his ordination. He said that he can’t think of a more exciting and fulfilling vocation in the entire world than the priesthood. He said that he’s filled with joy every day at the thought of being a priest. So many of us, his confreres, feel the same way and thank God along with him for this wonderful and sublime gift.

These last few decades have been tough on the priesthood. Scandals, defections and low numbers intimate a low point for Catholic priests. However, the great silent majority of priests in our country and in our world remained happily at work through it all and are sterling examples of confidence in the Church and in the priesthood. A lot of silent and effective good shepherding has gone on, often unnoticed. We have a lot to learn from these last two decades but recent set-backs will never diminish the greatness of the call to priesthood.

My own vocation goes back to the time when I was in the first grade in St. John the Baptist School in Schenectady. A newly-ordained priest visited our classroom one day and passed out his ordination prayer-cards. Sister Mary Daniel, our teacher, told us to hang onto the card we were given and look at it occasionally. So I did what she said. I kept that prayer-card throughout the years and still have it. It did keep the thought in my mind about possibly becoming a priest one day. After I set out, I had a few false starts along the way to ordination, and I drew back a few times but, I thank God everyday that He wrote straight with crooked lines, and that he privileged me with such an awesome gift in the end.

Pray for priests, especially in these times when the numbers of priests are low. We need more priests right now. Our culture makes it hard for many to hear or embrace the call. But times will change. They always do. And the faith, goodness and idealism of young people is something we can rely on. Pray that many devout men and women will embrace the great call to serve the Lord and his people. It really is a swell and exciting ride and one that can yield eternal benefits.

This Wednesday is the feast day of a great woman

You may never have heard of Dr. Gianna Beretta Molla whose feast day is this Wednesday, April 28. She was an Italian doctor who died in 1961 and has been canonized by the Church, not only because of her exemplary Catholic life but because she gave up her own life in order to save the life of her unborn child.

Born in Italy in 1922, Gianna lived her Catholic life with great joy and purpose. She was a loving wife and mother of four, as well as a devoted pediatrician, working outside the home. In 1961, she became pregnant with her fourth child. Early on, it was discovered that she had a dangerous fibroma on her uterus. Her doctors gave her three options: an abortion and removal of the fibroma, a hysterectomy, or the removal of the fibroma only. Since she and her husband would not consent to an abortion, the couple chose that only the fibroma be removed, hoping to save her baby. On April 21, 1961, she gave birth, via cesarean section, to a healthy girl whom she and her husband named Gianna Emanuela. Despite the efforts of her doctors, she died of sepsis seven days after giving birth.

She was canonized in 2004 at a ceremony attended by her husband and four children, including Gianna Emanuela who is now a practicing doctor of geriatrics. The Church honors her not only for her courageous sacrifice, but also because she is an example of how to integrate deep faith and marriage, motherhood and a professional life. She is an example to wives and mothers who are working professionals and all who value the dignity and sanctity of the family and human life.

Celebrating Deacon Matt Duclos on July 4th

Deacon Matt Duclos will be ordained to the priesthood on Saturday, June 19th at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Albany by Bishop Scharfenberger. He will celebrate his first Mass in his home parish of Corpus Christi in Clifton Park on the following day. Deacon Matt will be returning to our diocese in mid May and will be in residence in our rectory until the diocese gives him his official assignment for the summer. As you recall Matt spent last spring and summer here with us at St. Mary's. So I have invited him back to celebrate one of his first Masses with us on Sunday, July 4th at 11:15 AM. A reception will follow on the grass space on the side of the church. I realize this is July 4th weekend and it may not be the best weekend for travelers, but since he has to report for duty the following week for his summer assignment this is one of the only dates he is available for us. I'm hoping a great many will be around to share in his joy. (If there are any changes to this schedule I'll let you know when they happen.)

Post Abortion Healing

Once again, our Diocese is offering a weekend in-person retreat for women who have undergone an abortion and are in need of reconciliation, healing and support. The retreat is called "Rachel's Vineyard" and is an opportunity to experience God's love and healing in a safe and confidential environment. The dates are May 14th through May 16th and it will be held at the Dominican Retreat Center, 1945 Union St., Schenectady. The cost is \$195 which includes room, meals and materials. (Fr. April 16, 2021 - Media and Communications Update

The end of March and beginning of April were busy from a communications standpoint. In Flocknote, 11 notes were sent to members via email, to notify our Parish of information about items such as Small Group Readings, our weekly bulletin, and Bunny Bags. On our website, we had a total of 2241 visits, with 1385 unique visits; 75% of those who visited our site were new viewers. Our Facebook Livestream information for Holy Week includes the following statistics: Holy Thursday - 1000 views, Good Friday - 559 views, Easter Vigil - 1205 views, and both Easter Masses - 2850 views. *This means that for Holy Week, we had over 5600 views for our online Masses. 




GOSPEL MEDITATION

ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

Any builder worth his or her salt knows the value and importance of a cornerstone. Properly laying and securing this primary unit determines how the rest of the project unfolds and its success. Cornerstones are necessary elements not only of buildings but of lives as well. Many human beings conduct the business of their lives paying little attention to a grounding reference or starting point. Hence, what unfolds is a tapestry of relativism, with few anchors or guideposts and many impulsive choices. Some consider love to be their cornerstone. While this may sound attractive and useful, the pursuit of love without a simultaneous pursuit of its source can be shallow and self-focused. Just because a person chooses to do no harm and love others does not mean that they are living in truth and properly anchored to the real cornerstone.

Jesus is the true and authentic cornerstone and shepherd. It is only in following the Risen One as the way, the truth, and the life that we can move from being well-grounded ethical people to properly focused moral ones. Proper conduct, a true sense of justice, wisdom, virtue, moral principles, faith, hope, and love will be difficult to find unless we listen to the right Voice. It is when we learn to listen to the voice of



God that we begin our journey on the road to salvation. It is only the Good Shepherd, the authentic and solid cornerstone, who can guide us through life's questions and challenges and bring us to the safe and proper pasture.

A person's life only has meaning when the cornerstone is properly selected and set. Understanding themselves only as random acts of creation, existing without intent or purpose, will color their choices and influence their decisions. The foundation of their lives will be simply a matter of preference and choice, leaving benchmarks of growth and higher ideals optional to pursue. Whereas people who

believe that they are fashioned and loved into existence by a God who purposely made them, have this incredible unconditional relationship at their source which has tremendous significance. Their allegiance is not to themselves out to their Creator. Life, then, is an adventure in search of this Creator God and a journey of self-discovery that seeks to unite their will to His. There is a cost. We have to give up our life in order to gain our life. As ironic as that sounds, it is true. It is only when we finally figure this out that the true cornerstone of our lives will be properly laid and we can, with God's help, get about the business of properly constructing a temple that endures.

I have power to lay it down, and power to take it up again. This command I have received from my Father.”






