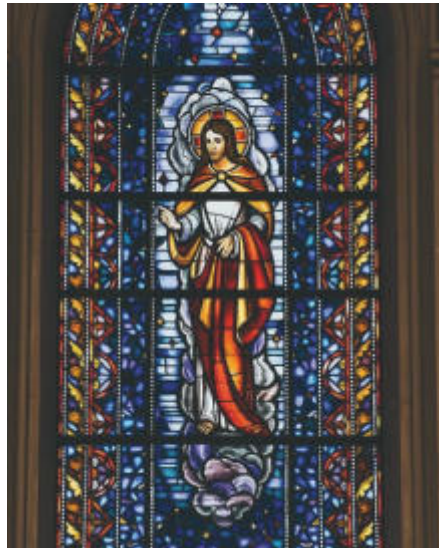

Dear Parishioners,

—Greetings from Fr. Tim—

Today in the second reading, Paul urges his readers in Corinth to contribute to a collection for the Christians in Jerusalem: "As you excel in every respect, in faith, discourse, knowledge, all earnestness, and in the love we have for you, may you excel in this gracious act also. For you know the gracious act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, for your sake he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich."

Christ, of course, is the standard: by "becoming poor" of the "riches" of Heaven, and coming to earth to save mankind, He saved us, "enriching" us with friendship of God. And so Christians must do likewise: emptying themselves of their own riches so as to supply the poor--those in need in any way.

Now of course we can understand this lesson in a very general sense: whether visiting the imprisoned, comforting the afflicted, counseling the doubtful, or instructing the ignorant -- works of mercy -- in any way we serve others with true charity, we are "emptying" ourselves of time, resources, or attention and thus living out the path of Christ's self-gift.

But we should also keep in mind the importance of the specific practice of almsgiving, that is, giving material resources to the poor. The Bible places great value on this practice, as we hear, for example, in the advice of Tobit to his son Tobiah: "Give alms from your possessions to all who live uprightly, and do not let your eye begrudge the gift when you make it. Do not turn your face away from any poor man, and the face of God will not be turned away from you. If you have many possessions, make your gift from them in proportion; if few, do not be afraid to give according to the little you have. So you will be laying up a good treasure for yourself against the day of necessity. For charity delivers from death and keeps you from entering the darkness; and for all who practice it charity is an excellent offering in the presence of the Most High" (Tob 4:7-11). Notably, here almsgiving is seen not only as a way of helping others, but also of "delivering from death" and "laying up a treasure for yourself against the day of necessity": that is, making satisfaction for past sins, and somehow building up a "treasury" in Heaven. Jesus will refer to these same points later in His own teaching, for example: "Sell your possessions, and give alms; provide yourselves with purses that do not grow old, with a treasure in the heavens that does not fail, where no thief approaches and no moth destroys" (Lk 12:33).

Still, we should also keep in mind the spiritual goal of our charity. Charity is moved by faith, desiring not only what is materially necessary for each human being, but also the ultimate good of God for each individual as a unique creation of God, body and soul. Material goods are good insofar as they help in this goal, but will not provide ultimate happiness; only God can perfectly satisfy us and keep our other loves in order. Christian almsgiving is therefore far different from the Marxist/Communist/socialist vision of "equality" in which everyone will supposedly only be happy when everyone has the same amount of material possessions and there are no differences at all. Such a vision leaves out the spiritual dimension of human beings, and moreover ignores that in some respects, we are created with inherent "inequalities" that are good in light of the common good. As St. Paul says elsewhere, in reference to the Church:

"God arranged the organs in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single organ, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, 'I have no need of you,' nor again the head to the feet, 'I have no need of you.' On the contrary, the parts of the body which seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those parts of the body which we think less honorable we invest with the greater honor, and our unpresentable parts are treated with greater modesty, which our more presentable parts do not require. But God has so composed the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior part, that there may be no discord in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together" (1 Cor 12:18-26).

Unity in the body of the Church is therefore about each member fulfilling the vocation he or she has in God's plan. Of course, a basic equality of needs must be met, but such equality does not presume every member should be identical. There is beauty and unity in the diversity of the Church, and in the end, we must learn to "rejoice" not only in the gifts God has given us, but the ones that God has willed instead to give to oth-

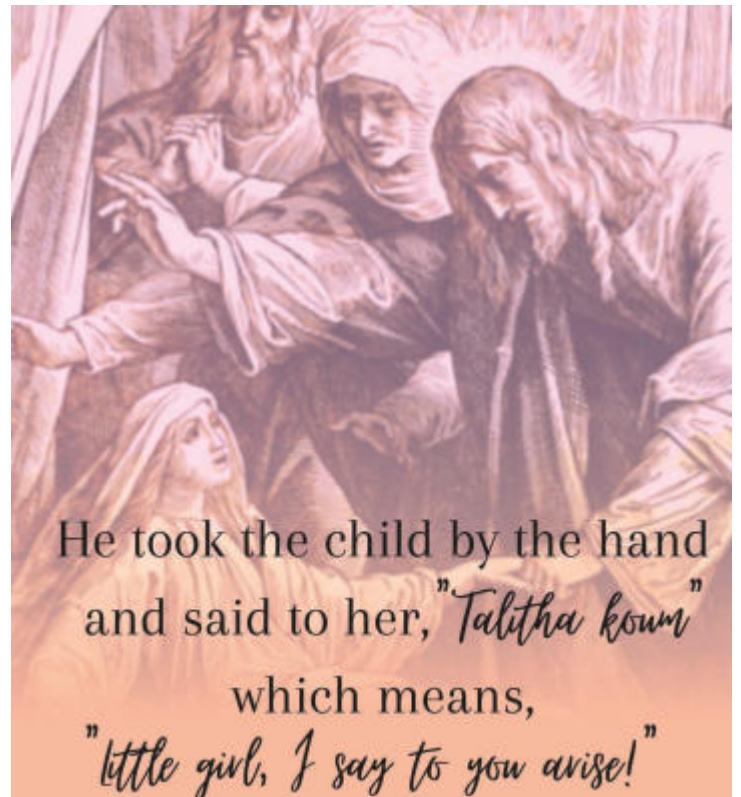
