Catholic Funerals: Every baptized Catholic has a right to the prayers of the church at the time of life threatening illness and death even if they have not been practicing their faith up until that time. The parish provides a guide for funeral planning and is prepared to assist at the time of a death in the family. Ordinarily the funeral home will contact the parish to schedule a funeral though families are always welcome to contact the office. Customarily a Catholic funeral has three distinct moments: the vigil prayers, funeral and rite of committal at burial.

Sacrament of Baptism: The Catholic custom of baptizing infants is founded upon the testimony of Scripture and Tradition and demonstrates the priority of grace as a gift in the Christian life. Customarily baptism occurs as soon as possible after birth. Please contact the parish office with requests for dates prior to selecting godparents for whom there are some requirements that need documentation.

Sacrament of Marriage: Please contact the parish office at least six months prior to a desired wedding date and prior to committing to a reception facility. Parish wedding dates can only be confirmed after meeting with the priest and completing initial documentation establishing a person's freedom to marry as a Catholic. The parish offers marriage preparation which is required in anticipation of the wedding.

As we hopefully continue to move in the right direction with common life within the community and engagement in parish life, I ask that parishioners make a simple resolution to pray the Lord's Prayer daily for the unity and good of the parishes. The role of making simple resolutions is a powerful tool to remain intentional in our personal and spiritual lives. The practice of making resolutions is seemingly simple as it is the interior beginning of action insofar as it is the decision to act. It is the spark that starts the fire. It is the internal movement of the mind and heart that generates human action that is praiseworthy or blameworthy. As we move toward the beginning of the new liturgical year at the outset of Advent at the end of the month, we may want to adopt the calendar year practice of taking up new year resolutions. As a parish we have done something like that recently in cooperation with Kate Sell of the Catholic Leadership Institute. Thanks also to those from various commissions, councils as well as staff who participated in the process for renewing and recalibrating parish goals.

For my part I may attempt a different more anecdotal approach to a brief note in the bulletin about more mundane matters that make up parish life and activity. Communication remains sluggish it seems to me and the social fabric of the parish has suffered like so many other social contexts. I noticed an ironic reversal at the Sunday morning Mass times in recent months where the practice of exposition of the Blessed Sacrament after Mass at St. Joseph has created a quiet exit to Mass that previously been comfortably chatty as people, who may only see each other in this context, have a moment to say hello and catch up a bit. Likewise the conclusion of Mass at St. Rose in the morning has customarily been rather reserved has been marked by a more spontaneous gathering of families and children. The opportunity to connect with others at Mass points to the common life of public prayer which is certainly a good thing. If parishioners are ready and interested to convene after Mass with some intentional hospitality and minimal structure that would be welcome. Volunteers who have been so generous to establish the parish-based self-service food pantry are hosting an open house following the morning Mass. Please consider joining them and learning more about the effort to *feed the hungry*. This past week employees from Franklin Savings Bank dropped off several boxes of food collected in a recent food drive in addition to donations from employees matched by a very generous check of \$2500.00 from the Bank's charitable foundation. Thank you!

SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION

Once the child is baptized and candle is lit from the paschal candle with the words, *receive the light of Christ*, the family walks forward to the altar and prays the Lord's Prayer. The action of parents carrying their child to the altar anticipates the child approaching the altar by his or her own action. One important way this happens is at First Communion when a child approaches to receive Jesus in Holy Communion as a *sacramental food* that is meant to sustain the life of grace given in Baptism. Preparation for First Communion takes the form of some basic commitments over the course of a couple years culminating in an introduction to sacramental Confession, the sacrament of Confirmation and Holy Communion. For families with children who have participated in some way in year one preparation, please communicate your intention to continue this year with an eye to next autumn. For families who would like to present a child for the first year of preparation, please complete the registration form below and return it to the office.

CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) faith formation is open for child registrants. St. Elizabeth of Hungary | Feast Day November 17



Although her life was short, St. Elizabeth of Hungary (1207 – 1231) is recognized for her love of the poor and suffering, and as patroness of Catholic charities and the Secular Franciscan Order. The daughter of the King of Hungary, she chose a life of penance instead of leisure, which made an impact on the “commoners” she served.

St. Elizabeth married Louis of Thuringia when she was 14. Deeply in love, they had three children. Despite their wealth, she led a life of prayer, sacrifice, and service to the poor and sick under the spiritual direction of a Franciscan friar.

After six years of marriage, her husband died in the Crusades, and St. Elizabeth was grief-stricken. Her husband's family did not look kindly upon her and mistreated her before finally throwing her out of the palace. However, the return of her husband's allies from the Crusades resulted in her being reinstated, since her son was legal heir to the throne.

St. Elizabeth joined the Secular Franciscan Order in 1228 where she cared for the poor in a hospital she founded in honor of St. Francis of Assisi. She died in 1231, but her great popularity resulted in her being named a saint only four years later.
