Catholic Funerals: Every baptized Catholic has a right to the prayers of the church at the time of life threatening illness and death even if they have not been practicing their faith up until that time. The parish provides a guide for funeral planning and is prepared to assist at the time of a death in the family. Ordinarily the funeral home will contact the parish to schedule a funeral though families are always welcome to contact the office. Customarily a Catholic funeral has three distinct moments: the vigil prayers, funeral and rite of committal at burial.

Sacrament of Baptism: The Catholic custom of baptizing infants is founded upon the testimony of Scripture and Tradition and demonstrates the priority of grace as a gift in the Christian life. Customarily baptism occurs as soon as possible after birth. Please contact th parish office with requests for dates prior to selecting godparents for whom there are some requirements that need documentation.

Sacrament of Marriage: Please contact the parish office at least six months prior to a desired wedding date and prior to committing to a reception facility. Parish wedding dates can only be confirmed after meeting with the priest and completing initial documentation establishing a person's freedom to marry as a Catholic. The parish offers marriage preparation which is required in anticipation of the wedding.

PASTOR

In the spirit of New Year's resolutions, which is an honorable aspect of our popular culture, we find ourselves revisiting the parish goals and priorities. Recall that a few years ago we worked with Kate Sell from the Catholic Leadership Insti-

ute to develop a three year plan for parish life. Among the many hopes that have been dashed by the *pandemic culture* was our inability to renew the pastoral plan in a comprehensive way in the course of las t year. The hope had been to have a renewed plan in place for the beginning of the school year 2021. In the absence of a year-long deliberation members of parish commissions, councils and staff meet a few time with Kate Sell to renew a one-year interim plan. The emphasis of the plan is to attempt to integrate some of the existing goals within the activities guided by the parish priorities of Liturgy and Devotions, Faith Formation and Parish Social Ministry. At a glance the principal task related to Liturgy and Devotions is ongoing cooperation with the diocesan efforts and the circumstances in people's lives to welcome people to Mass. This encouragement is most basically a renewed invitation to prayer. The obvious goal for Faith Formation is to welcome Amanda and support her efforts at pursuing the good of faith formation for all ages. Parish Social Ministry staff and volunteer have been very active in a variety of ways. The priority for persons assisting with the corporal works of mercy is to continue to integrate the spirit of the gospel into the activity of Parish Social Ministry. You will note in the bulletin we are publishing the text of the current plan. We also have a round of quarterly meetings with various volunteers and work groups, commissions, councils as well as staff meetings. The renewed pastoral priorities within the context of current meetings provide good opportunities for open, honest and charitable conversation.

St. Sebastian | January 20



Not much is known about the life of St. Sebastian (256 - 287), except that he was a Roman martyr whose name has been mentioned throughout history since early 350.

We see St. Sebastian many times in art, especially from iconic paintings from Guido Reni, Andrea Mantegna and Hendrick ter Brugghen. Historical scholars now agree that a spiritual story has the

beloved saint entering the Roman army because only there could he assist Christian martyrs without arousing suspicion on himself. Eventually he was found out, brought before Emperor Diocletian and delivered to Mauritanian archers to be shot to death. Pierced with arrows, he was left for dead, but managed to survive. He recovered from his wounds but still refused to leave.

One day, St. Sebastian took up a position near where the emperor was to pass. He confronted the emperor, condemning him for his cruelty to Christians. This time the sentence of death was carried out, and St. Sebastian was beaten to death with clubs. Today he is the patron saint of athletes. ©LPi

Marriage. In addition to civil requirements, Catholics are required to be married by a priest (or deacon) in the presence of two witnesses. The Catholic Church acknowledges the public nature of civil marriage and the commitment of persons who seek civil marriage. Nevertheless the Church has a different understanding of marriage than the minimum and pliable notion of marriage as promoted by the state. Catholics in a civil marriage are asked to refrain from the reception of Holy Communion and encouraged to talk to the pastor about pastoral solutions for full participation in the sacramental life of the Church. We can all do better to respect, love and welcome Catholics who have experienced separation, divorce and remarriage.

St. Bridget's Catholic Church closed in 2011 as part of a parish consolidation. The 1920's mission style church was renovated and now serves as a community center where "Sew for a Cause" creates a variety of handmade items for local charities.

National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month in Maine and Across U.S.

January is National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month, created over a decade ago to raise awareness about human trafficking, particularly how this crime can be prevented. Calculated as a \$150 billion industry, human trafficking is a form of modern -day slavery and occurs when a trafficker uses force, fraud, or coercion to control another person for the purpose of soliciting labor or services against his/her will. There are an estimated 40.3 million victims of human trafficking worldwide. The elimination of human trafficking is a priority issue for the Catholic Church as every life is a gift from God and is sacred, it deserves to be protected and nurtured.

Convened by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishop's Migration and Refugee Services, the Coalition of Catholic Organizations against Human Trafficking (CCOAHT) consists of over 35 national and international agencies working to end human trafficking and support survivors. CCOAHT members advocate for stronger state and federal legislation, promote trauma-informed and survivor-centered services for victims, raise public consciousness, and press the private sector and consumers to prioritize slave-free supply chains.
