Catholic Funerals: Every baptized Catholic has a right to the prayers of the church at the time of life threatening illness and death even if they have not been practicing their faith up until that time. The parish provides a guide for funeral planning and is prepared to assist at the time of a death in the family. Ordinarily the funeral home will contact the parish to schedule a funeral though families are always welcome to contact the office. Customarily a Catholic funeral has three distinct moments: the vigil prayers, funeral and rite of committal at burial.

Sacrament of Baptism: The Catholic custom of baptizing infants is founded upon the testimony of Scripture and Tradition and demonstrates the priority of grace as a gift in the Christian life. Customarily baptism occurs as soon as possible after birth. Please contact the parish office with requests for dates prior to selecting godparents for whom there are some requirements that need documentation.

Sacrament of Marriage: Please contact the parish office at least six months prior to a desired wedding date and prior to committing to a reception facility. Parish wedding dates can only be confirmed after meeting with the priest and completing initial documentation establishing a person's freedom to marry as a Catholic. The parish offers marriage preparation which is required in anticipation of the wedding.

Catholics have a sense of the sacred that touches upon time and spatial orientation. Accordingly Catholics are rightly attentive to the movement of liturgical seasons different time of the year. This sensibility comes naturally

to Mainers because of the definite movements of times marked by the four seasons. The seasons of Lent and Easter are precisely an experience of sacred time. Lent: a time of prayerful, penitential preparation to enter into the Paschal Mystery of Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection. Easter: a time to rejoice in the victory of Christ, the risen Lord. I like to point out that season of Easter is actually longer than the season of Lent. We do well to find ways to observe the time of Easter like we so faithfully observe the time of Lent.

Catholics likewise pray in a way that takes its cues from the natural world. We tend to think of heaven as up though it is metaphorical. Recall that on Sugarloaf there was a sunrise prayer on Easter Sunday. Why? Well, it is a good human intuition to associate the rising sun with the resurrection of the Son. The orientation of the natural world in adopted into the architecture of Catholic churches. Churches are sacred spaces within the sacred space of the created world. Early Christians shared this intuition for natural orientation and came to associate an eastward direction with the resurrection of Jesus as well as His return in glory at the end of time. Like Muslims have the custom of facing towards Mecca, Catholics have adopted the spatial orientation of *facing east*. This explains in part why churches and cemeteries often have an east-west orientation. This notion of ad orientum (toward the east) has been and continues to be an aspect of liturgical prayer in churches expressed sometimes by the orientation of the building itself (like at St. Rose) and sometimes in the directionality of the priest and people who face the crucifix as a kind of liturgical east.

Reflecting on space and time in the liturgy, Pope Emeritus Benedict in The Spirit of the Liturgy writes: It was also important clearly to distinguish the place of the Liturgy of the Word from the place for the properly Eucharistic Liturgy. For the Liturgy of the Word is about speaking and responding, and a face-to-face exchange between proclaimer and hearer does make sense. On the other hand, a common turning to the east during the Eucharistic Prayer remains essential. Looking at the priest has no importance. What matters is looking together at the Lord. It is now a question, not of dialogue, but of common worship, of setting off toward the One who is to come.

On May 1, we celebrated one of Good St. Joseph's most esteemed titles, the title under which he is our parish patron in Farmington, *St. Joseph, the Worker*. A table was set up in the foyer and parishioners enjoyed coffee and donuts after the 10:30 AM Mass on May 1.

The Feast of St. Joseph the Worker was instituted by Pope Pius XII in 1955. St. Joseph is an example of one who modeled holiness in labor. Celebrating this saint on his May 1 feast day allows us to honor the saint who is the special friend of all workers. HOLY CROSS CEMETERY

Please be reminded of the rules and regulations that were established a few years ago in an ongoing effort to improve maintenance practices and insure the continued quality and general appearance of Holy Cross Cemetery.

11-G Urns and Flower Vases - Placement of approved urns, vases, baskets, boxes and potted plants is restricted to the following locations: one item on either end of the main above-ground monument only. In the event that there is no above ground monument on the lot, one of the items described above may be placed where the above ground monument would be located so as not to obstruct mowing operations.

11-H Ornaments - The use of shells, crushed or bleached stones, lawn ornaments, glass containers vigil or perpetual lights, shepherds crooks and tin cans is strictly prohibited. No lawn ornament of any kind as defined shall be allowed. The staff reserves the right to remove without notice any planting or object that is in violation of these regulations, is a hazard to its employees or detrimental to the general appearance of the cemetery.

12-B Rubbish - Throwing of rubbish on roads, driveways, paths, walks, or any part of the ground of any cemetery, or its buildings, is prohibited. All rubbish (including organic) must be removed from the cemetery by those persons generating the rubbish.

Please note that there is no water at the cemetery. Needed changes were made regarding the electricity, which means we are not able to run the pump that provides the water.

In our continuing effort to keep our staff and visitors safe, please remember the new rules and regulations that were adopted. All items that are deemed unsafe, such as solar lights and shepherds crooks will be placed by the shed for owners to pick up.

For a copy of the rules & regulations, please contact the parish office or copies are available at the work shed at the cemetery.

Thank you for your cooperation in helping the staff maintain the beauty and dignity of our cemetery.



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
