

Catholic Funerals: Every baptized Catholic has a right to the prayers of the church at the time of life threatening illness and death even if they have not been practicing their faith up until that time. The parish provides a guide for funeral planning and is prepared to assist at the time of a death in the family. Ordinarily the funeral home will contact the parish to schedule a funeral though families are always welcome to contact the office. Customarily a Catholic funeral has three distinct moments: the vigil prayers, funeral and rite of committal at burial.

Sacrament of Baptism: The Catholic custom of baptizing infants is founded upon the testimony of Scripture and Tradition and demonstrates the priority of grace as a gift in the Christian life. Customarily baptism occurs as soon as possible after birth. Please contact the parish office with requests for dates prior to selecting godparents for whom there are some requirements that need documentation.

Sacrament of Marriage: Please contact the parish office at least six months prior to a desired wedding date and prior to committing to a reception facility. Parish wedding dates can only be confirmed after meeting with the priest and completing initial documentation establishing a person's freedom to marry as a Catholic. The parish offers marriage preparation which is required in anticipation of the wedding.

Pope Emeritus Benedict consistently reminded people in public settings of the history of Europe as a Christian society. The act of remembering the past **PASTOR** though important is not necessarily indicative of the present moment. Sometimes you might hear people

recall with nostalgia their youthful participation in Catholic school or the gentleman at the cemetery who recalls his days of altar serving. When it comes to a living expression of the faith, the past serves as a foundation though does not insure perseverance in faith infused by charity. Pope Benedict anticipated a smaller more faithful Church. The coincidence of the pope's namesake reminds us of St. Benedict whose intuition was also for faithfulness in a time of decline in Christian culture.

The Benedict Option by Rod Dreher has sparked a lively conversa on since it was published in 2017. David Brooks of Harvard University refers to the book as "the most discussed and most important religious book of the decade." Others have followed with the aim of articulating common norms for resilience within communities. Dreher draws on the historical context of the founding of Benedictine monasteries as resilient communities based on principles of order, hospitality, stability and prayer. From these principles Dreher suggests we can draw from history lessons that inform the present moment. If you are in the habit of summer reading, you are encouraged to take a look. Also, if you are inclined you are encouraged to reach out to participate in reading and discussion with others by contacting the parish office or staff person.

In the wake of public health, cultural and political influences that have produced anxiety, isolation and polarization, now is a fitting time to reflect on the nature of common life. The insights from The Benedict Option may provide us an opportunity to assess and implement opportunities for intentional resilient community. I have been encouraged by sights and sounds of people getting together. I wonder how within the context of the parish we might pursue times and places to be together.

Statement from Bishop Deeley on the Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization Supreme Court Decision

June 24, 2022 - Today's decision reaffirms the truth that every life is sacred, and it promotes protection for women and children from the grave injustice of abortion. We welcome the possibility of saving the lives of countless unborn children as well as sparing many women and families from pain. The Diocese of Portland will continue to accompany any woman, regardless of faith, who is experiencing difficulties in pregnancy through our various Catholic agencies in Maine, including pregnancy help centers and parish-based initiatives like Walking with Moms in Need. As well, we will support and assist those who have been involved in an abortion through our Project Rachel program. God is merciful, and it is of paramount importance that people who experience distress grow in understanding of this truth and are guided on a path to emotional and spiritual healing.

Press Release (excerpts) June 24, 2022 Karen Vachon, Maine Right Life Executive Director

We are very pleased that the court recognized that abortion on demand was never consistent with the Constitution of the United States of America. Overturning Roe does not prohibit abortions. Rather, the Court's decision will allow states to pass pro-life legislation. The decision goes back to the people and to the state legislature which allows states to choose abortion policy representative of the citizens. This is a victory for women, the unborn and the pro-life movement that has worked so hard to save and promote life. Polls consistently show that there has never been majority support for the holding of Roe which was abortion on demand throughout

all nine months of pregnancy. In a 2021 Marist Poll, 76% of respondents opposed abortion on demand and would limit abortion to the first three months of pregnancy (25%), only in cases of the life of the mother, rape, or incest (28%), only to save the life of the mother (11%) or felt that they should never be permitted in any circumstance (12%).

A lot has changed since Roe was decided. In 1973, the technology didn't exist to allow babies to survive outside the womb at 21 or 22 week's gestation. With scientific advancement, more babies are surviving prior to what was once considered *viability*. While some have changed their position on abortion with this knowledge, many members of the public, as well as women contemplating abortion may not realize how developed a baby is at various stages of pregnancy. At 15 weeks of gestation, a baby's heart has been beating for over two months. Brain waves are detectable at 8 weeks. At 9 weeks a baby is kicking and swimming. At 10 weeks a baby can begin to hear. Women and all deserve accurate information when facing an unplanned pregnancy so an informed decision can be made in good conscience.

PARISH SOCIAL MINISTRY AND HOMELESSNESS

As we begin to engage, as parishes, with issues of housing and homelessness, I have been thinking about how we frame our conversation and how we think about all the people we serve – those who are hungry, ill or in prison, strangers...

In the Gospel of Matthew (chapter 5: 43-48), Jesus dismisses the notion that it is sufficient to merely love our neighbor – the folks we know. Instead, He instructs us to "love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your Heavenly Father..." By this instruction, Jesus effectively does away with the false dichotomy of **us** (neighbors) and **them** (enemies, persecutors). He goes on to say that our Heavenly Father "makes His sun to rise on the bad and the good, and causes rain to fall on the just and the unjust." What Jesus is saying, clearly, is that there is no **them**; there's just **us**. We are all God's children. We don't all look the same, come from the same backgrounds, have the same opportunities, make the same choices, but we're still neighbors; we're still **us**. While sometimes it seems easier to notice differences, I believe Jesus wants us to be attentive to (and even search for) what we have in common, what makes us neighbors, what makes us **us**. And when that's difficult (and it often is), let's remember that the Father causes the same sun to shine on all of us. **Janet Brackett**




HOME GARDENERS

Alison and Noel exchanged vows in a recent convalidation. Alison benefited from a form of an annulment known as "a decree in favor of the faith" requiring cooperation of the pastor, the bishop and a personal intervention of Pope Francis. Catholic marriage law governs sacramental practice and Alison, in cooperation with her

husband of thirty years, has demonstrated diligence, patience and reverence in seeking to renew the practice of her Catholic faith. A convalidation is required for Catholics in a civil marriage, which is not sacramental, prior to the public reception of Holy Communion. A convalidation assumes there is no "prior bond" for persons who have been previously married. The annulment process attends to the circumstances of prior marriages involving Catholics. This particular annulment, of which there are various kinds, demonstrates that the "canon laws" that govern public Catholic life are tempered by mercy and directed to the spiritual good of persons.
