

**Catholic Funerals:** Every baptized Catholic has a right to the prayers of the church at the time of life threatening illness and death even if they have not been practicing their faith up until that time. The parish provides a guide for funeral planning and is prepared to assist at the time of a death in the family. Ordinarily the funeral home will contact the parish to schedule a funeral though families are always welcome to contact the office. Customarily a Catholic funeral has three distinct moments: the vigil prayers, funeral and rite of committal at burial.

**Sacrament of Baptism:** The Catholic custom of baptizing infants is founded upon the testimony of Scripture and Tradition and demonstrates the priority of grace as a gift in the Christian life. Customarily baptism occurs as soon as possible after birth. Please contact the parish office with requests for dates prior to selecting godparents for whom there are some requirements that need documentation.

**Sacrament of Marriage:** Please contact the parish office at least six months prior to a desired wedding date and prior to committing to a reception facility. Parish wedding dates can only be confirmed after meeting with the priest and completing initial documentation establishing a person's freedom to marry as a Catholic. The parish offers marriage preparation which is required in anticipation of the wedding.

As a child I remember the parish priests would make visits to the Catholic families in Madawaska. Granted that the town was small and a majority of the households were Catholic so it was rather efficient. I don't recall any particular moment however the fact of a

parish visit has always stayed with me. Once when I was a student home for the summer from the seminary I recall a retired priest asking me, so what would you do if you became a priest? I remarked that I would reinstate parish visits. I do remember he looked quite intently at me and spoke approvingly, I hope you will do that. As we all know wanting something and doing something are not in face the same thing. I have had some experience with variations on parish visits, which I remember fondly as we attempted a very simple version of some visits in the towns outlying Jay and Farmington when I arrived. Given the last couple years it does seem like there is a kind of need for a reintroduction even within the context of parish life—for me personally and for others as well. I recall a story from a young priest in Bangor who used to visit an elderly parishioner with whom he played cribbage. He remarked one time, while I cannot do that with every parishioner, I do welcome the opportunity to do it with some.

The time has come to try again to make some parish visits this summer. Please pray for this effort. There is something gospellike about simply taking to the streets and encountering people in ordinary life. So that's what I will attempt as an expression of pastoral charity. I don't pretend to think I will be able to systematically visit every house like Msgr. Chaloux and Fr. Lariviere. Nor do I suspect everyone would welcome a visit from me. Glad we have some help. The parish is welcoming Sophie Ouellette who has experience and availability for the summer to assist us. Sophie will be the staff person who will schedule visits by reaching out to parishioners by phone. She may make visits herself. She will schedule me to make visits. She will schedule the St. Isidore Corps Summer Missionaries. And we may add others to a working group that has been helpful to me to explore this possibility. We will announce the parish visits with a postcard to all registered parishioners. And we will provide updates in the bulletin and by other means. When making calls we will use parish phones so the parish name appears on the call screening device. Initially we are going to begin with active volunteers in the areas of Liturgy and Devotions, Faith Formation and Parish Social Ministry as a way of saying thank you.

### Why is Parish Social Ministry so important to parish life?

We are beginning the process to welcome a parish staff person dedicated to the implementation of parish priorities and goals in the area of Parish Social Ministry (PSM). By parish social ministry we mean an intentional effort on behalf of the parish communities to incorporate and implement the Gospel as expressed in the corporal works of mercy. The Catholic Tradition has articulated a body of social doctrines expressing the gospel in practical ways which has come to be called Catholic Social Teaching. The pastoral planning process the parishes undertook four years ago resulted in a vision for Parish Social Ministry and related staff. The early conversation was shaped by our cooperation with Catholic Charities as they have sought to support social ministry throughout parish life in Maine. Our strategy has been to put Parish Social Ministry on par with Faith Formation as a expression of Catholic faith that seeks to love God and neighbor. While our own parishes have had a heart for charitable works as many parishes, we seek to express our commitment to this manner of service by comparable staff resources in vital collaboration with volunteers. The intuition has proved fruitful as parishioners have discovered opportunities to serve, goodwill has been generated within the communities we serve and many people have been served in practical and meaningful ways. We are grateful to Max Becher and more recently Stephanie Crowe who have sought to demonstrate this approach to parish life, which has not been easy but remains necessary as the witness of Catholic truth requires the demonstration of goodness and the evidential power of beauty.




### HOME GARDENERS

#### **SUMMER READING OPTIONS**

The Benedict Option by Rod Dreher has sparked a lively conversa on since it was published in 2017. David Brooks of Harvard University refers to the book as "the most discussed and most important religious book of the decade." Others have followed with the aim of articulating common norms for resilience within communities. Dreher draws on the historical context of the founding of Benedictine monasteries as resilient communities based on principles of order, hospitality, stability and prayer. From these principles Dreher suggests we can draw from history lessons that inform the present moment. If you are in the habit of summer reading, you are encouraged to take a look.

In *Redeeming the Time*, Bishop Robert Barron follows the wisdom of St. Paul in Ephesians chapter five and boldly shines the light of the Gospel into our dark hour. Sorting through our moral, intellectual, social, political, and ecclesial turmoil, this collection of essays is a timely reminder that our hope—especially when things seem hopeless—is always found in Christ and his Church. The past several years have been a time of tremendous challenge. From the pandemic that afflicted the world, to the political polarization that unsettled the nation, to the division, disaffiliation, and scandal that rocked the Church, Catholics everywhere have been filled with fear, burdened by pain, and longing for hope.
