MARRIAGE





GOSPEL MEDITATION

January 9, 2022 The Baptism of the Lord

"We are called to live our baptism every day, as new creatures, clothed in Christ."

— Pope Francis

What reference point do you use when making decisions? Many times, impulse takes control and decisions are made based solely on emotion and desire. We all know that these types of decisions can often get us into trouble. When a person has a confident sense of who they are and a real understanding of what is important and of value, the likelihood of kneejerk impulsive choices diminishes. Baptism gives us what we need to make well informed and purposeful decisions. By this simple gesture, God claims us as His own and provides us with the identity and purpose we need to properly live life.

It is tremendously reassuring, when we truly embrace this revelation and realize that we no longer have to wonder about the purpose of our lives or struggle to find our way. The answer of who we are in God has been given to us. We no longer have to fumble around, trip over ourselves or walk aimlessly about. Issues surrounding the sacredness of life, the meaning of death, the protection of those most vulnerable, care for the weak and the poor, offering hospitality to those in search of a home, the purpose and proper place of work, how to create a just social order, caring for creation, and understanding our roles as heralds and stewards are just a few of the wonderful gifts baptism brings. When we make decisions based on things such as these core Gospel truths we really act as Christ himself, revealing to others the new creations that we are. This is how we live our baptism.

It is difficult to walk against the tide. Yet, that is precisely what baptism calls us to do. Although we are sinners, in need of mercy and far from perfection we are called to order our life and make decisions based upon the wisdom and guidance of Almighty God. He alone is the one who can claim us as His sons and daughters. Standing up for our principles will not make us popular. But who ever said Christianity is a popularity contest? Baptism calls us to stand up for that which goes against the grain of secularism. Standing in line with other sinners, we have our anchor to steady us in the tempests of life and God is very pleased. Forge ahead. There is nothing to fear.

A MESSAGE FROM MONSIGNOR BOB

We come together this weekend to celebrate the Baptism of our Lord. This feast is celebrated liturgically as the conclusion of the Christmas season, devotionally as the first of the Luminous Mysteries of the Rosary and theologically as the scriptural call to baptism for all who believe in Christ. There is always the question why Jesus chose to be baptized by His cousin, John the Baptist. John's baptism was meant to be a sign of repentance for sin and conversion to a new way of life. Why then did Jesus, who was without sin, ask for this baptism? Jesus uses this moment as the beginning of His public ministry. It was His emergence from a life of seeming obscurity into a life of growing popularity on account of His preaching and the miracles and healings he was performing as well as His call to us to receive God's mercy and forgiveness. Jesus steps into the River Jordan, has water poured over Him and begins His ministry of redemption through this very public and humbling action. As the water flows over His head, a dove appears and a voice from heaven calls out to Him; the Trinity is revealed in this sacred and simple act. We can draw profound parallels between Jesus' baptism and our own. We can plainly see that just as Jesus was revealed as the beloved Son of the Father, so too we receive a new identity in baptism as the adopted sons and daughters of God. Jesus shares His divine life with us through the waters of our baptism. This spiritual adoption draws us into the very life of God and His endless stream of graces. In this moment of Jesus' baptism we witness His anointing by the Holy Spirit, we hear the Father claiming Him as His Son and we begin to share in a mission of love for each of us. It is in this action that Jesus testifies to His willingness to empty Himself totally out of love for us in order to heal our brokenness, forgive our sins and bring us to new life. Let us renew our baptismal promises this day so as to remind ourselves of God's goodness to us.

PERSONAL RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL PROMISES

Do you renounce sin, so as to live in the freedom of the children of God?

Response: I DO.

Do you renounce the lure of evil, so that sin may have no mastery over you?

Response: I DO.

Do you renounce Satan, the author and prince of sin?

Response: I DO.

Do you believe in God, the Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth?

Response: I DO.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was born of the Virgin Mary, suffered death and was buried, rose again from the dead and is seated at the right hand of the Father?

Response: I DO.

Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting?

Response: I DO.

And may Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has given us new birth by water and the Holy Spirit, and bestowed on us forgiveness of our sins, keep us by His grace, in Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen.



I Hope I Am Like Him

"Who is this Christ? Is he like you?"

Perhaps you've heard this story, often attributed to the life of St. Teresa of Calcutta. A sick man asked her this question, as he marveled at her tireless service to himself and others in the name of someone named Jesus Christ.

"He is nothing like me," the saint is said to have answered. "But I hope I am like him."

Though the authenticity of this exchange cannot be verified, its message rings perfectly true: all the value of our stewardship lies in its relativity to the one in whose name we perform it.

Consider the figure of John the Baptist — a magnificent, towering character even purely from a literary or historical perspective. A martyr who fed on wild locusts and boldly spoke truth to power — a man so great some mistook him for the Messiah.

But why is he great? Because he prepared the way. All his accomplishments and escapades mean nothing if they are taken out of the context of salvation history. He only makes sense relative to Christ — and this is exactly as he wanted it. "One worthier than I is coming," he insists. And because of that humility and that total embrace of God's will, he is given one of the greatest honors in the New Testament — he baptizes the Son of God.

Let's examine our lives in the light of their relativity to Christ. How do we prepare the way? When Christ comes to us, what do we do? How do we leave ourselves open to be actors in God's plan?

Baptismal Bib


Question:

At my grandson's Baptism, the priest put a bib on the baby. I do not remember seeing this before. Why is this done? Is it something new?

Answer:

When an adult is baptized, there is a part in the ceremony when the newly baptized is vested in a white garment. It is symbolic of the changes that baptism brings in the life of the baptized as they are freed from the bonds of sin and brought into the saving grace of Christ. Realities that are so profound are symbolically presented so that we might better grasp and understand them.

Infants are often dressed in a baptismal dress, which is the baptismal garment. In some places, the bib is used as a kind of baptismal garment. At the place in the ceremony where the investiture takes place, the bib is used. Some are poncho-like and fit over the baby's head. Others are simply placed on the baby's chest. If the baby is dressed in a white garment, nothing else is needed. The prayer says it all: "See in your white garment the outward sign of your Christian dignity ... bring that dignity unstained into the everlasting life of heaven." In baptism, we are given our purpose and goal in life as believers and this is symbolized by the white garment. ©LPi





15-year-old Blessed Carlo Acutis died in Italy on October 12, 2006 of acute leukemia. Carlo loved Jesus and the Eucharist from a very early age, and one of his sayings was "to be always close to Jesus, that is my life plan." Another of his quotes is "The Eucharist is my highway to heaven." Carlo was quite an ordinary teenager in that he loved sports, especially soccer; and he was a big fan of computer games and practical jokes. Yet because of his love of Jesus in the Eucharist, and because he was adept with the computer, he created a program of all the Eucharistic Miracles documented through the centuries. After his death, this program was made into an Exhibit, on panels, of these miracles. This exhibit has been traveling all over Europe and is now beginning to be shown in America. The Exhibit will be at St. Jude Parish in Monroe, CT on January 22 & 23. Come and see!




