

From pastor's desk on the 3rd Sunday in Advent, year B

The third Sunday of Advent is called *Gaudete Sunday*. In ancient Latin language *gaudete* means “rejoice!” This is the first word in the second reading taken from St. Paul’s letter to the Thessalonians. The apostle Paul writes:

“Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus” (1 Thes 5:16).

St. Paul directs us to the source of joy, which is the Son of God. For a Christian there is no other cause for true joy in this world except for being with Jesus. If you still think you can find an authentic and lasting joy apart from Christ, you only deceive yourself. Outside of the faith in Jesus, there is only sadness and despair, for only in Him is our salvation:

“There is no salvation through anyone else, nor is there any other name under heaven given to the human race by which we are to be saved” (Acts 4:12).

For the believers Christ must be their all, so that they can truly rejoice in Him. Furthermore, if I am a disciple of Christ and believe in Him without any reservation, I am also able to give thanks in all circumstance recognizing that *“this is the will of God for [us] in Christ Jesus.”* A true follower of Christ knows how to be grateful for everything—for all that is pleasant and easy, but even more for all that is unpleasant and often difficult. That is a mark of a disciple of Christ, to bear the cross with Christ.

This second joyful message in today’s liturgy is that Jesus the Messiah is present among us. It is the Presence that requires faith. Those who do not believe will not see Him nor can they experience the gift of salvation. St. John the Baptist pointed out the way to Christ, as we hear in the gospel, *“there is one among you whom you do not recognize, the one who is coming after me...”* (John 1:27).

Hence, in order to experience that heavenly joy we must first discover Christ, who may be “passing” amidst of us, often unnoticed. This happened during His first coming. Jesus had been living among the people for thirty years and yet did not reveal Himself except to His own Blessed Mother and to His cousin John. The other people recognized Him gradually as they saw more signs performed by Jesus. Since John the Baptist had pure faith, he was the first to recognize the presence of the Lord at the Jordan river. We should carefully listen to the words of John, for Christ is near and we need to recognize Him too: in the Church, the sacraments, and in the people we meet on our journey.

Thus, John the Baptist’s “words have value for us too; Jesus is really present in our midst: present in our tabernacles by the Eucharist, present in our souls by grace. But who recognizes Him? Only those who believe. Revive, then, your faith; you will find Jesus, and will know Jesus, according to the measure of your faith in Him. Sometimes He conceals Himself from you, and you think that you will never find Him, never feel Him again. This is the time to redouble your faith, to walk in pure faith” (Fr. Gabriel of St. Mary Magdalen, *Divine intimacy*, p).

Very often we want to see miracles to confirm our faith. But the Lord tells us, *“Blessed are they that have not seen and have believed”* (John 20:29). St. John the Baptist did not see any miracle of Jesus; nevertheless, he believed the Messiah had come in the Man from Nazareth. Even Mary lived by faith not seeing other miracles until Jesus’ public ministry, yet She believed. She had faith in Christ, though She did not understand everything. Mary too had to believe in the words of the Angel to be fulfilled in Her life.

Let us pray that we may experience a holy joy and grow in faith while keeping watch with Jesus and the Blessed Mother.



El Adviento es un tiempo de esperar con alegre esperanza por la venida del Señor.

En nuestro camino de Adviento, hemos llegado al tercer domingo de Adviento, 'Domingo de Gaudete' (¡Alégrate!), cuyo título está tomado de la Carta a los Filipenses: "Estén siempre en el gozo del Señor; yo Dígallo de nuevo: esté alegre ". (Ph 4.4)

¿Qué es el domingo "Gaudete"? Este domingo es como una pausa en medio del Adviento y como una anticipación de la alegría de la Navidad. Esperamos con alegría la celebración anual del nacimiento de Jesús, que vino de Dios en nuestra carne para salvarnos.

El Papa Juan Pablo II, en el Ángelus del 3er domingo de Adviento de 2003 escribió: "Sabido que Dios está cerca, atento y lleno de compasión, no indiferente, que es un padre misericordioso que se interesa por nosotros en el respeto de nuestra libertad, es motivo de un gozo profundo que las ataduras diarias no pueden atenuar. La característica única del gozo cristiano es que se puede compartir con el sufrimiento, ya que se basa enteramente en el amor. Señor que está tan cerca de nosotros para venir a comunicarnos su alegría, la alegría de amar, sólo así entendemos la alegría serena de los mártires incluso en la prueba, o la sonrisa de los santos de caridad ante lo que sufre. Es una sonrisa sin ofensas, que consuela. "

El domingo Gaudete afirma el valor del regocijo y da razones de nuevo de nuestro regocijo: Dios ha dado esperanza a su pueblo que espera la redención. Esperamos con regocijo lo que ya ha logrado y aun lograra a través de Cristo.

Jesus. Before starting his public ministry, Jesus submitted himself to the baptism given by John the Baptist. The waters did not purify him; he cleansed the waters. .

. Jesus did not need to be baptized because he was totally faithful to the will of his Father and free from sin. However, he wanted to show his solidarity with human beings in order to reconcile them to the Father. By commanding his disciples to baptize all nations, he established the means by which people would die to sin – Original and actual – and begin to live a new life with God.

In Baptism, the Holy Spirit moves us to answer Christ's call to holiness. In Baptism, we are asked to walk by the light of Christ and to trust in his wisdom. We are invited to submit our hearts to Christ with ever deeper love.

Parishioners have been asking about the progress of the ramp project.

We have two contractors who are under consideration, when we chose one we will apply to the town with the final permits and wait for approval.

The bathrooms are a separate project and the general contractor is working on the permits with the town. When they have been approved then we can start on them.

The ramp itself will hopefully be started in mid-March or early Spring depending on the weather.

There will be a meeting of the ramp committee in the near future.



What does the Advent wreath symbolize?

The **wreath** and candles are full of **symbolism** tied to the Christmas season. The **wreath** itself, which is made of various evergreens, signifies continuous life. The circle of the **wreath**, which has no beginning or end, **symbolizes** the eternity of God, the immortality of the soul, and the everlasting life we find in Christ.

The **Advent wreath**, or **Advent crown**, is a Christian tradition that **symbolizes** the passage of the four weeks of **Advent** in the liturgical calendar of the Western church. ... Many **Advent wreaths** include a fifth, Christ candle which is lit at Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.

The Meaning and History of Advent

During the Middle Ages, **Advent** became associated with preparation for the Second Coming. In early days **Advent** lasted from November 11, the feast of St. Martin, until Christmas Day. **Advent** was considered a pre-Christmas season of Lent when Christians devoted themselves to prayer and fasting.

Why do Christians celebrate Advent?

Advent means 'Coming' in Latin. This is the coming of Jesus into the world. **Christians** use the four Sundays and weeks of **Advent** to prepare and remember the real meaning of Christmas. ... Some people fast (don't eat anything) during **advent** to help them concentrate on preparing to **celebrate** Jesus's coming.



THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT – “JOY”

Light two purple or blue candles and the 1 pink candle on your Advent Wreath.

God of gladness, when we ask, “What should we do?” you respond “Rejoice”. Help us enjoy one another like children full of wonder. Speak to us through the music we sing, the scriptures we proclaim, the symbols we see, and the moods that touch us. Make us heralds of your joy in our world. AMEN

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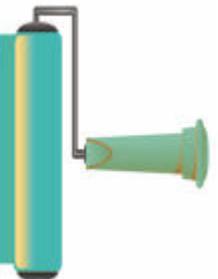
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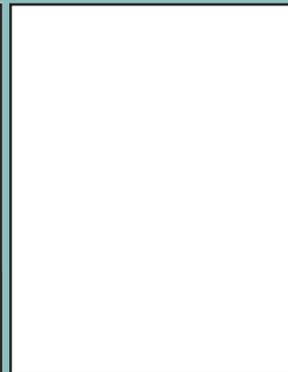
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
