Saints of the Day for July 26 **Saints Joachim and Anne's Story**

In the Scriptures, Matthew and Luke furnish a legal family history of Jesus, tracing ancestry to show that Jesus is the culmination of great promises. Not only is his mother's family neglected, we also know nothing factual about them except that they existed. Even the names "Joachim" and "Anne" come from a legendary source written more than a century after Jesus died.

The heroism and holiness of these people however, is inferred from the whole family atmosphere around Mary in the Scriptures. Whether we rely on the legends about Mary's childhood or make guesses from the information in the Bible, we see in her a fulfillment of many generations of prayerful persons, herself steeped in the religious traditions of her people.

The strong character of Mary in making decisions, her continuous practice of prayer, her devotion to the laws of her faith, her steadiness at moments of crisis, and her devotion to her relatives—all indicate a close-knit, loving family that looked forward to the next generation even while retaining the best of the past.

Joachim and Anne—whether these are their real names or not—represent that entire quiet series of generations who faithfully perform their duties, practice their faith, and establish an atmosphere for the coming of the Messiah, but remain obscure.

Reflection

This is the "feast of grandparents." It reminds grandparents of their responsibility to establish a tone for generations to come: They must make the traditions live and offer them as a promise to little children. But the feast has a message for the younger generation as well. It reminds the young that older people's greater perspective, depth of experience, and appreciation of life's profound rhythms are all part of a wisdom not to be taken lightly or ignored.

Estamos hoy celebrando el 17º domingo del tiempo ordinario.

La Iglesia nos invita a reflexionar sobre el famoso y largo discurso de Jesús sobre el Pan de Vida.

A través de este discurso, Jesús alimenta / enseña a las personas de una manera distinta. Esta sección se divide en varias partes: en los versículos del 1 al 15, vemos a Jesús alimentando a cinco mil personas, y en los versículos del 24 al 69, Jesús se revela así mismo como el Pan de Vida.

Hay una señal para reflexionar en el evangelio de Juan el día de hoy. La comida para alimentar a 5000 personas con sólo cinco panes y dos pescados, que un niño de la multitud provee, demuestra el poder de Dios. La acción de dar trae consigo beneficios. Vemos como Jesús tomó los panes y dio gracias a Dios, esto nos da un ejemplo claro a seguir: agradecer.

Estos tres pasos: dar, alimentar y agradecer nos llevará si los seguimos a disfrutar de la providencia de Dios, que actuará a nuestro favor en cualquier peligro que se nos presente en nuestras vidas.

Jesús vino “para que todos tengan vida y la tengan en abundancia “(10,10), proveyendo lo suficiente para alimentar como Pan de Vida a todas las generaciones de cristianos.

Esto nos invita a reflexionar, en estos tres pasajes bíblicos : cómo creer en Dios en el desierto (envía Mana al pueblo hambriento); a través de la Encarnación (Jesús); y en la Iglesia (la Eucaristía). Situaciones diferentes que nos muestran la bondadosa providencia de Dios y que es real para cada uno de nosotros.



Saint Ignatius of Loyola's Story Saint of the Day for July 31

(October 23, 1491 - July 31, 1556)

The founder of the Jesuits was on his way to military fame and fortune when a cannon ball shattered his leg. Because there were no books of romance on hand during his convalescence, Ignatius whiled away the time reading a life of Christ and lives of the saints. His conscience was deeply touched, and a long, painful turning to Christ began. Having seen the Mother of God in a vision, he made a pilgrimage to her shrine at Montserrat near Barcelona. He remained for almost a year at nearby Manresa, sometimes with the Dominicans, sometimes in a pauper's hospice, often in a cave in the hills praying. After a period of great peace of mind, he went through a harrowing trial of scruples. There was no comfort in anything—prayer, fasting, sacraments, penance. At length, his peace of mind returned.

It was during this year of conversion that Ignatius began to write down material that later became his greatest work, the *Spiritual Exercises*.

He finally achieved his purpose of going to the Holy Land, but could not remain, as he planned, because of the hostility of the Turks. Ignatius spent the next 11 years in various European universities, studying with great difficulty, beginning almost as a child. Like many others, his orthodoxy was questioned; Ignatius was twice jailed for brief periods.

In 1534, at the age of 43, he and six others—one of whom was Saint Francis Xavier—vowed to live in poverty and chastity and to go to the Holy Land. If this became impossible, they vowed to offer themselves to the apostolic service of the pope. The latter became the only choice. Four years later Ignatius made the association permanent. The new Society of Jesus was approved by Pope Paul III, and Ignatius was elected to serve as the first general.

When companions were sent on various missions by the pope, Ignatius remained in Rome, consolidating the new venture, but still finding time to found homes for orphans, catechumens, and penitents. He founded the Roman College, intended to be the model of all other colleges of the Society.

Ignatius was a true mystic. He centered his spiritual life on the essential foundations of Christianity—the Trinity, Christ, the Eucharist. His spirituality is expressed in the Jesuit motto, *Ad maiorem Dei gloriam*—"for the greater glory of God." In his concept, obedience was to be the prominent virtue, to assure the effectiveness and mobility of his men. All activity was to be guided by a true love of the Church and unconditional obedience to the Holy Father, for which reason all professed members took a fourth vow to go wherever the pope should send them for the salvation of souls.

Reflection

Luther nailed his theses to the church door at Wittenberg in 1517. Seventeen years later, Ignatius of Loyola founded the Society that was to play so prominent a part in the Catholic Reformation. He was an implacable foe of Protestantism. Yet the seeds of ecumenism may be found in his words: "Great care must be taken to show forth orthodox truth in such a way that if any heretics happen to be present they may have an example of charity and Christian moderation. No hard words should be used nor any sort of contempt for their errors be shown." One of the greatest ecumenists was the 20th-century German Jesuit, Cardinal Augustin Bea.

Retreats

RCIA Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults

This program is for adults 18 years or older who have heard the call to accept the *Good News* of Jesus Christ, and desire to be baptized in the Catholic Church. These **catechumens** spend time growing in “faith” reflecting on the *Good News*, digesting the Christian way of life and becoming included in the Community. Formation during this time is more important than mere information. The Sacraments of Initiation, Baptism, Confirmation & Holy Eucharist will be received at the *Easter Vigil*. For the parish, RCIA reflects a time of renewal. For those Catholic adults seeking Confirmation, a special 13 week program will be offered beginning the first week of Lent of 2022.

Candidates for the **Catechumenate** will be accepted for and begin formation in September.



Through the Franciscan Lens

*Love is patient; love is kind;
love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude...
It does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth.
-1 Corinthians 13:4-5,6*

This Sunday July 25th, I will witness my grandson Drew's wedding to Erica. I am humbled by their request that I proclaim this reading in its entirety at their Nuptial Mass, a reading often chosen by couples planning their wedding, they are in love and of course they will be able to live out the truth of this reading. It is so perfect! St. Paul had a greater message in this passage however, He speaks to all of us, of our love relationships with each other, family, community, the world.

Francis in his youth was a hopeless romantic. He dreamed of chivalry, being a knight, capturing the heart of a lady in distress, and winning great battles. He sang songs of love and fancied himself as Lancelot, in the King Arthur tales. And yet, as we now know, Francis' unique contribution is that he applied this dream not to a lady locked up in a castle but to a "lady" surpassing all earthly beauty, **Lady Poverty**. Francis transferred the fervor of love for another person and directed it toward all people and God. Love led him to risk his life and give away all his earthly possessions and securities. Courtly love was one spark that when combined with Francis' experience of the gospel, ignited his decision to give his all to Christ. In the Bible, the Song of Songs serves a similar purpose. It is clearly about the love between a woman and a man, but it has come to be applied to the love between God and God's people.



No doubt, most of us feel far removed from knighthood. Loving another person is still a challenge, and it can go wrong in any number of ways. Some of us remain blissfully married for a lifetime, while many others face one challenge after another. The same applies with those who choose a religious life or the priesthood. Every vocation is an opportunity of the challenge to love.

We too can experience something of the passion and intensity of love in our lives that Saint Francis felt in service to his Lady. Francis lived out his calling to love in fairly simple ways, as he went merely where the Spirit led him. Saint Francis was particularly devoted to his brothers. We can be devoted to friends. When Francis saw a need, he responded to it as he saw love directing him. We can do the same, even if it is not convenient. Our Seraphic Father Francis wanted all people to taste and see the goodness of living out love through the gospel life. May the Lord + give you His peace. Charlotte Kelly OFS



World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly

Pope Francis has formally established **World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly** to be celebrated annually throughout the Church on the fourth Sunday in July—close to the feast of Sts. Joachim and Anne who, as the grandparents of Jesus, are the paragons for all grandparents.

The purpose of this celebration is to remind us that advanced age is a blessing—a gift that should be both cherished and freely shared, most especially in passing on the Faith.

For this year, the theme is “***I am with you always***” to emphasize not only the Lord’s closeness with the aged, but also the intergenerational bonds shared between young and old, and most especially characterized by the passing on of the Faith.

Obligation to attend Mass

The general dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation will end on the eve of the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, August 14, 2021.

The faithful are required to attend Sunday and Holy Days of Obligation Masses beginning on August 14, 2015. This obligation does not apply to those who are ill, those who are confined to their home, a hospital, or nursing facility, or those with serious underlying health conditions

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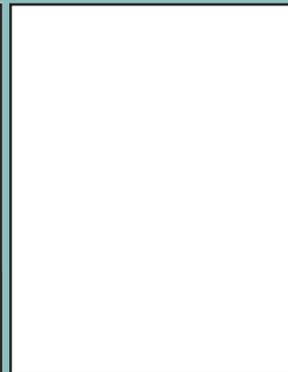
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
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
