#### Saint of the Quarter

The Catholic Church is blessed to have members whose holiness and goodness are real-life examples of how to live. We're even more blessed to use them as intercessors and examples when something happens in our lives to take us down a path we either struggle with or didn't expect. That's right- we're talking about the saints!

This year join the Natick Catholic Community as we introduce Saint of the Quarter. Each quarter we'll dive into the life of a saint and participate in a service project to honor this saint and remember their works. We invite our parishioners to take part in this initiative and stay tuned for updates on how you can get more involved.

We present our first NCC Saint of the Quarter- Saint Joseph!

Saint Joseph was the earthly father of Jesus. The month of March is dedicated to Saint Joseph and his solemnity is celebrated on March 19. He mostly appears in the Gospel of Matthew and was known to be a carpenter, or highly skilled craftsman.

The past year was just celebrated as the year of St. Joseph and it seems appropriate! He is truly a saint for all whether you are married, single, working, unemployed, a member of the clergy. In his paper, Saint Joseph: Our Father in Faith, Father Frederick L. Miller states, "Loving and reverencing everything human, he teaches us how precious human life is. Joseph stands at the origin of the new culture of life initiated by the Incarnation of the Word. Devotion to Saint Joseph teaches Christians to love and reverence human life, to understand how sacred are virginity, conception, motherhood, spousal love and parental love." He goes on to describe Saint Joseph as a spiritual provider, one who is a helper in all material needs. Some of these needs even includes housing and budgeting help! Saint Joseph is the patron saint of fathers, families, and workers, among many other things.

#### Our Service Project

Sister Maureen Clarke, a member of the Sisters of Saint Joseph, leads an Aftercare Program at the Massachusetts Correctional Institution – Framingham, Massachusetts for women preparing to leave prison. For our service project this quarter, starting February 19, we'll be writing letters to these women and collecting them after mass at St. Linus and St. Patrick in baskets labeled for this project. 

#### PRAYERS and RITES for the SICK

The month of February, usually at the height of cold and flu season, brings our Church some important occasions to focus on the healing power and presence of the Risen Lord. On Saint Blaise Day, it is customary to have one's throat blessed (how appropriate at this time, especially during the COVID pandemic!). Along with this blessing, the priest asks the Bishop and Martyr, Saint Blaise, to pray with us that each faithful person will be protected from disease by the healing grace of Christ. On the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, the Church worldwide acknowledges the powerful intercession of the Blessed Mother on behalf of all those who are in need of healing. For years Catholic people have made pilgrimage to Lourdes, France seeking the support of the Virgin Mary's prayers.

Any time of year, the Church has the opportunity to request the ANOINTING OF THE SICK. One of the Seven Holy Sacraments, the anointing involves a special blessing for anyone who is seriously ill, anticipating or recovering from surgery, disabled or infirm due to chronic illness or advanced age. Accompanying the priest's prayer is an anointing with holy oil on both the person's forehead and hands. The intention of this prayer is to ask Jesus to fortify the sick person, giving their bodies strength, their minds courage and confidence, and their hearts peace. This sacrament may be offered in the hospital, in nursing homes, rehab or assisted living facilities, and even in someone's home. If the family members and friends of the sick person could be present, they too are invited to join in the prayers.

LAST RITES is the colloquial term for the final sacraments that the Catholic Church offers to those who are nearing death. Just as there are three SACRAMENTS of INITIATION to begin one's life-long journey of faith in Christ, so there are three sacramental rites that are the fullest expression of how a Catholic Christian prepares spiritually for death. First there is CONFESSION. Understanding that we are all sinners, in need of the mercy of Christ, the Church hopes that the dying person will have the opportunity to cleanse his / her conscience through sacramental absolution. Then follows the ANOINTING (mentioned above) which offers healing strength, confidence, courage, and peace to the soul of the dying person whose sins have been forgiven through PENANCE. Finally, the sacraments of VIATICUM is offered as "last Holy Communion". The forgiven and anointed person is ultimately given Eucharist as a pledge of eternal life and as "food for the journey" which he / she is about to embark on, from this life to the next, toward the merciful heart of God.

#### He Came To Natick in 1854 And A Tradition Was Born

Coming from Kilmacow, County Kilkenny, John Everett was the type of strong character that Ireland sent to this country in the 1840's. After humble beginnings as a shoemaker in Cambridge, Medway and Millis, he finally settled in Natick in 1854. Here, with a small band of Catholics, under the direction of Fr. John Walsh, he helped found St. Patrick's Parish in 1856. John Everett became sexton of the church and superintendent of the cemetery. In 1861, a growing need in the Natick Community prompted Fr. Walsh to ask John to establish a funeral undertaking business, and so a tradition of quiet, dignified and sympathetic understanding was born. Now, after four generations, that tradition is still an integral part of our service.
