


Baptisms: Twice a month at 1:30 pm for registered parishioners. Instruction for parents is required. Arrangements must be made in advance.

The anticipation and preparation is a powerful thing. Christmas itself is not a day. It is an Octave- 8 days of celebrating the same mystery, then the season continues until the Baptism of the Lord or Epiphany. That God was incarnated as a real and true human. That the creator of all things came as a little child- dependent and small, needing help to grow. That is worth chewing over to understand the full implications.

The Sunday that falls in the Octave of Christmas is the Solemnity of the Holy Family. To be human is to need a family. Among the gifts we gave to Jesus a family is a particularly beautiful gift. It is both beautiful and necessary- we can't live with out them. But family life is complicated.

The readings trace tensions in good families. The reading from Samuel is a different sort of blended family- it is polygamous and the wife with children harasses Hannah who has none. It winds up to impel Hannah to pray. The answered prayer is a child who will be dedicated to God- Samuel. God moves families to holiness but not without troubles.

The Gospel is the mystery of the finding or losing or maybe even arguing in the Temple. Mary and Jesus- not a sin between the two of them- they bump heads. After searching and returning to Jerusalem Mary expresses her anxiety, worry, frustration. She asks a mom question: "Son, why have you done this to us. Your father and I have been looking for you with great anxiety." Moms ask that question not because there is a good answer but to communicate their discomfort or disappointment

Jesus flips the conversation; he asks a similar question that is really a statement of an unarguable point: "Why were you looking for me? Do you not know that I must be in my father's house?" The best of people- the best of families have moments that they don't understanding each other. Each of us represents a mystery- we barely know ourselves fully to say nothing of other people.

Sometimes we think we should understand and be understood better- misunderstandings can sow doubt. Parents raise little people from their first days but there are always mysteries: Why does one child sleep through the night and the other wake and squawk. Why do perfectly sweet children start getting pouty in their teenage years. Where do the weird culture fascinations with certain video games, certain singers come from? They don't come from you.

And parents are a mystery to their children. Its not just the humor and music but why are they so cool about somethings and get so much more quickly upset about other things. Why do they inspire so much confidence and yet show insecurity, impatience, imperfection in other things.

God gives parents to children to protect and care for physical needs but also social needs. Parents do this in a process that keeps moving- the children have to grow. Children force parents to become more spiritually mature- to make sacrifices and have the reverence to reflect on their lives in family prayerfully.

Jesus and Mary walk back from the Temple each meditating on the events. Mary carrying it in her heart considering: "What sort of child has God given me who teaches the teachers" Jesus returns to Nazareth and grows in wisdom, age, and favor. He will grow for another 17 years before he teaches in the Temple.
