March 28, 2022—War and Peace

The Catholic Church teaches that for a war to be just it must be: defensive, the last resort, not create worst destruction than it purports to solve, and have a reasonable probability of success. There are so few wars that meet this standard. Clearly Russia invasion for whatever rational it presents is not defensive, few options were tested and in the sort period of time it has already created loss of life on both sides to say nothing of displacement and damage to infrastructure.

One thing that has changed in the nature of war in the last 70 years is that it is rarely open warfare between matched armies. Almost all of the contemporary wars have been asymmetrical. One side is clearly more powerful; it dominates in size and level of arms of its military. There can be no lining up of armies facing each other openly. Fighting is more fluid. There is more guerilla warfare and the line between civilian and combatant isn't as clear. The moral demand to protect non-combatants is ignored. As is the distinction between military targets and humanitarian necessities of water, food, electricity.

The Ukrainian Government is on the defensive and seems to have been offering diplomatic openings regularly. If there have been questions about influence peddling and corruption in the Ukraine, war does not resolve those issues, certainly imposing a government from without doesn't end the question of manipulation. Each country has the right to struggle through their own political mess without threat of military intervention. Only an end of war allows for that sort of aboveboard political activity.

The Gospel says that: "Blessed are the peacemakers; they will see God". There is a War College, and rightly so. War so easily changes form and military goals and tactics have to be reshaped. In the chaos it is all too often where the moral ground gets lost. It is good to have disciplined minds prepared to make hard moral, as well as tactical choices. Unfortunately, there is no Peace College. The Church teaches that the development of international bodies can be a force for peaceful resolution of conflicts. The International Court at the Hague as well as the United Nations were conceived in this hope. In practice countries have been loath to recognize any sort of international authority. We are poorer for the weakness of these international organizations.

Peacemaking requires the same level of commitment- in fact more commitment than war making. We are taking up collections- we might do our quarterly tithe for Ukraine- looking for the most effective channel. We participate in the consecration of both Russia and Ukraine to the Blessed Virgin. Consecration is handing over for the purpose of the Holy con-secration. And our prayer should ache and strain our heart- like basic training puts stress on the body so a peacemaking soul will undergo a stress. There is a strain in holding the violence of war in our hearts, there is a strain in keeping it all personalized because peace is a blessing most of all for individual souls and then the nation as a whole.

In the course of our peacemaking, we will see God. We will see the God of generosity who shares through people near and far. We will see God in the movements that turn minds to peace- whether it be because the costs have become so high or some higher motive. We will see the God of the Passion in the suffering. We will see the face of Jesus in the refugee and the sheltered. We will see Christ in those standing face in the violence.
