

April 3, 2022

Next week begins Holy Week it is highest and holiest of days. The symbols and gestures, the words and Palm Sunday begins with such a joyous feel; we gather for a procession and there are free palms Our palms are blessed and we hear the Gospel of the entrance into Jerusalem and did I mention free palms. There is joy in the air and in the festive songs. Then the liturgy turns and it becomes Passion Sunday. We read the whole Passion with all its terrible power. We leave in silence. We make a cross out of our palms.

Holy Thursday has a warm feel. It takes place in the warm light of evening. It has an intimate feel. At the time of the Gospel the preside takes off his vestments and kneels down and washes the feet of 12 people. It is symbolic- everyone washes their feet ahead of time but the bending down and the holding of each foot is real- the service has a real effort and humility. We end the liturgy focused on the great gift of the Blessed Sacrament. We process with candle and incense solemnly and reverently to a place of repose. We can remain in prayer until 11pm with the Eucharist. In the meantime the church is stripped empty.

Good Friday is dark and silent there is a somber weight of sorrow. We have the stations of the Cross at noon. We have outdoor stations with the young people to walk the Way with Him. We have indoor Stations for those whom uneven ground would present too much of a risk. At 3pm in the liturgy we read the full Passion with the growing menace of death and betrayal, violence and suffering surrounding a silent Savior. We adore the Cross with a touch or a kiss. The Cross which is an instrument of death and redemption. We end in silence

Saturday, we prepare for Easter. There is a silence as we decorate. When the time comes for the Easter Vigil, all is dark. We begin by lighting a Holy Fire outside the Church. We bless the Paschal Candle and light it. It is the only light in the darkness. It is the light of Christ risen from the dead. This is the candle that gives light to each new baptized member. It is the light that leads each Christian through death at their funeral. Slowly the congregation lights their own candles. We continue in candle light through the Old Testament readings. The lights burst on with the Gloria and the New Testament. After the readings we call forth those who have made a choice and prepared themselves to become fully initiated Catholic Christians. They are a symbol to us all that our faith is worth choosing, and that the Faith fills us with gifts of the Holy Spirit.

Easter is a riot of colors and joyful songs. The Church is dressed with the best of flowers and banners. The singing is ecstatic and the Alleluias are multiplied. Things are truer and newer than ever. The Gospels are full of joyful surprises. "Will we be able to clean his dead body?" "The tomb is empty." Has he been stolen? Why do you look among the dead for the living?" Who could imagine just how good the news would be?

People come back to Church during Holy Week- free palms- but also because there is a visceral power to what we celebrate. We welcome all those who are coming back. And we pray that the faithful be most fully renewed.






