
Baptisms: Twice a month at 1:30 pm for registered parishioners. Instruction for parents is required. Arrangements must be made in advance.

St. Francis, Fourth Lateran Council, Eucharistic Jubilee

This past week Tuesday was the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. St. Francis is famous for many things: the patron of ecology and the blessing of animals, carrying the stigmata- the wounds of Christ in his body, his love of poverty and the poor, his joyfulness, his partnership with St. Clare in developing the Franciscan ideal. He is also a great champion of the Eucharist. In the writings that are directly attributed to him he teaches about the Eucharist as much as any other theme.

St. Francis in his rule says that candidates to the Franciscan Order should be the most catholic of men. In St. Francis' lifetime there was an Ecumenical Council- the 12th ecumenical council in the history of the Church. It is convoked in 1212 AD It is probably the most significant council after the first 7 and shapes the Church most powerfully until the Council of Trent in 1545. The 4th Lateran Council defines what happens during the consecration – it is transubstantiation- theologians had groped about trying to define what happens – how symbolic or real the changes were. Furthermore the Council established what we call Easter Duty- every catholic are duty bound to receive the Eucharist at least once a year in the easter season. It also required the Eucharist be kept in worthy places, protected and locked, that Churches not be used to store things that don't relate to the celebration of liturgy, Including animals. It also promulgated laws about the buying of positions like bishops, abbots and pastors. You can imagine what sort of times it must have been for these sorts of rules to be required. St. Francis was inspired by the Council and ran with the themes.

In his Admonitions, the First Letter to Guardians, the Letter to All People, St Francis develops two themes around the Eucharist: Recognizing the Divine Prescence, and the Call to Penance. In the Admonitions St. Francis points out that Jesus teaches that no one can know God except in the Spirit. HE goes on to point out that in Jesus' day people did not recognize the divinity of Christ when he was in the flesh. Now the question is will we recognize him in the Eucharist consecrated by Christ' own words on the altar. St. Francis prays that people we desire for the gift of the Spirit to open their eyes and not be condemned to ignorance.

In the Letters to Guardians St. Francis talks about "those who do penance and those who do not". For St. Francis penance is not another word for punishment. It means committed to being converted. He writes that those who participate in and adore the Eucharist are committed to penance. What we look upon changes us. When we focus on God who is willing to come among us as food and drink, a God who gives his very self: body, soul and divinity, seeing that God should stir us. His sublime humility should inspire us to embrace humility, his generous self-giving should inspire us to give of ourselves. The more faithful we attend to the mysteries the more we are transformed. To stay away is to resist the call to truly repent, be converted, become holy.

This fall the United States Catholic Conference inaugurated a three year "Eucharistic Revival". There had been a survey of Catholics a few years ago and the results were startling. Only 25% of those surveyed would use transubstantiation to describe what happens at the consecration. A similar number agreed to the term "real Prescence' to describe the reality of Christ in the Eucharist. The bishops called for a three year effort to re-teach the truths of the Eucharist as taught by the Church.

The Eucharist is the Real Prescence of Christ in his divinity. He can change our lives. It is a good time to see in what ways we can deepen our devotion. We should ask for the Holy Spirit so that we can more deeply appreciate the mystery. We should share our own devotion so that others may return to be fed by the Lord himself. There is no substitute.

What do we mean by presence? In its most general sense, presence means being with another. We all experience presence in several familiar ways. It might be local, when we are in the same physical place as another. It can also be temporal, when we are with another at the same time. Local and temporal presence usually go together, but sometimes we can be temporally present to another without being

physically with them, for example when talking over the phone or via the internet. A third kind of presence might be called personal - how we experience "being with" another person - even when that person is not physically with us but is with us through our memory, imagination or emotions.
