**Baptisms:** Twice a month at 1:30 pm for registered parishioners. Instruction for parents is required. Arrangements must be made in advance.


Marriages: Arrangements must be made at least one year in advance.

#### October 23, 2022

There is an old Irish joke about the wake for the town wastrel – lets call him Martin. Everyone in the town gathers in the little country church for the wake. The pastor opens with a prayer then invites any one from the congregation to share a memory of Martin, then he reminds them , "Nothing but good shall be said of the dead" He sits down and no one comes forward. After 5 minutes of silence the pastor gets up again, then the pastor lays down the law, : We won't be leaving until some one speaks for Martin". A fellow gets up sheepishly and says, "Well his brother is worse." There is a pearl of wisdom that is passed around in 12 step groups-"If you don't want to change compare yourself to others." God is not interested in our "better than", he wants our best.

Strangely enough a foundational element of spirituality is the discovery of a God who is truly greater than us, whose holiness dwarfs our goodness. Like the publican we recognize that we are sinners and can claim nothing on merit. We can only ask for mercy and rely on his free gift of grace. We recognize our smallness to ask for great things.

Next week we celebrate All Saints and All Souls Days. All Saints we celebrate how God took small people and filled them with his own holiness in an heroic way. On All Souls we pray for those who have died who still need filling now by our prayers rather than their own.


#### Thank you!
