Via Dolorosa means, "Way of Grief". It is also the street in the Old City of Jerusalem that Jesus walked on the way to his crucifixion. Whether your child died this past year or many years ago, whether he/she was young or old, this will be a nurturing and safe place to share. The group meets on the second Wednesday of the month. "How do you experience God in your life?"

Today is the great Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord! We all know the story of the Magi, traveling from afar to seek the Messiah, who had been foretold by the prophets. Imagine their journey on camels, over hundreds of miles – wow – how did they come to have such fervor to make this sacrifice to seek the One who was to come? Tradition tells us that they studied astronomy, as well as the Scriptures. They came to believe, through prayer and study and in life's experiences, that God would fulfill the promise of salvation. Can you imagine the joy and wonder they had when they encountered the Baby Jesus (Whose name means, "God saves")?! The Magi represent the whole world, not just the "Chosen People" of Israel. God revealed Godself to the Magi, who represent ALL people. Through Jesus, ALL people are invited into the Kingdom of God.

As I reflect on that story, I think of my own experiences of walking along the journey of faith each year with the Christ-Seekers (those who are in the process of being fully initiated into the Catholic Church). Each week, Deacon Vinny & I pose the question, "How did you experience God in your life this week?" Most often, as the year begins, many answers revolve around the splendor of creation – a beautiful sunset, brilliant stars, a bird's lovely melody. As the year progresses, their answers get deeper: They start recognizing God's presence in their lives by the compassionate, joyful, helpful, encouraging words or actions of people they encounter or by their own actions and words, by stirrings in their hearts to make life-giving decisions, by the peace that comes over them, by their own positive changes and in so many other ways. You see, as the year continues, they, like the Magi, have been making sacrifices to seek Christ by studying Scripture and the Traditions of the Church, by praying more than ever, by sharing their faith with others, by practicing good deeds. God is made manifest or appears to them in new and clear ways (Merriam-Webster definition of *epiphany*). They experience more "ah-ha" moments or "God moments"! When, at Easter, they finally receive Christ in their hands at their First Holy Communion – wow – they have that same joy and wonder as the Magi experienced 2021 years ago!

What about us? Do we have the fervor of the Magi or the Christ-Seekers? Are our eyes and hearts open to the Presence of Christ in our lives? Do we experience that joy and wonder each time we receive Christ in the Eucharist? We are at the start of a New Year! Let's make it a year in which we, all, become more aware of God's all-abiding presence in our lives, through our happy times and our challenging times. We can do that with more prayer, more spiritual reading, more full participation at Mass, more service to others. I guarantee that stronger and deeper awareness of Christ's Presence within and around us will make all the difference in the world.
