PAROLE DEL NOSTRO PASTORE

Words from our pastor, Father Bernie Carman, S.A.C.

† THERE WAS A WEDDING AT CANA IN GALILEE †

There are a lot of lessons in this Gospel scene. First is that for believers, marriage is a Sacrament. It is not merely a social convention, a legal document, a personal contract. The Lord, Himself, has a stake in it and blessed it with His presence at this celebration. It creates a new relationship and initiates the "domestic Church." It guarantees the continuation of the human race.

Second, Jesus was real. He did real things. He went to dinners and parties. He celebrated life's events and religious holidays as any faithful Jewish person would. We are not saying "party animal," but legitimate and joyful enjoyment of life.

Third, He was getting ready for His public ministry. As one of us in all but sin, He had to take time to reflect, pray, discern the best course of action.

Fourth, Mary played a role in His mission discernment. She did not order Him around. Recall her words. "Do whatever He tells you." She intercedes. She expressed loving concern for her relatives. She stands by us in our need.

Fifth, this miracle not only saves face for the bride and groom. It initiates His time of ministry, setting Him off on His mission. It signals the beginning of a new time, "but you have kept the good wine until now." Millennia of promise are coming to fruition.

And lastly, He chose to do it in a natural, common setting. The real presence of God is manifested in ordinary life. As quiet yet as certain as the dawn, the presence of the Savior is made known.

Look around. The heavens and the earth and all creation sing of the glory of God. Join in the song! **†**



ARCHDIOCESE OF BALTIMORE'S COVID-19 TASKFORCE PROTOCOL

(excerpted)

- All parishes in jurisdictions where masking is required (such as Baltimore City) are required to follow those mandates.
- All liturgical ministers and clergy are to wear masks, except when speaking.
- Parishes are asked to carefully evaluate all ministries and activities during January to determine how to transition them to a virtual or limited contact mode.
- For in-person ministry activity, masking is required for ALL parishes and ALL participants as well as other safety protocols, such as hand sanitization, social distancing (minimum 3-feet) and contact-tracing of positive cases among the attendees.
- Individual third party users of facilities for January events such as wedding receptions, family reunions, etc. *already* scheduled, may proceed; however, parishes should not accept new requests for January.
- During Mass, parishes are to carefully evaluate the logistics of choir activity. If the choir can safely perform with spacing and other considerations, it can continue. However, if a parish is concerned, use of a single cantor is suggested.
- All parishes must carefully adhere to proper hand sanitization following the distribution of Communion on the tongue.
