Gospel Reflection for the Holy Family

The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph

December 26, 2021

Families can be very difficult things to negotiate. This is true not only of our families of origin, the current family of which we are a part, the family of our Church, our society, and our global family as well. Everything human can be found in family stories. Those stories speak of wonderful life-giving successes as well as painful spirit-robbing abuses. Our greatest joys and our greatest wounds are usually connected with the experience of family. Our needs, experiences, and unresolved baggage often color what we bring to our familiar relationships. They contribute to our level of defensiveness, how guarded and protected we become, and what prejudices we believe.

In order to break the cycle of dysfunction we have to remember that it is not only by human effort that we negotiate the difficult and challenging events of our lives. There is a Divine Effort at work as well. For sure, the human effort can create quite a mess and easily destroy lives. This is true of any family with which we are associated. Today's Feast of the Holy Family serves to help us understand that there is a Divine Story being told as well. It is a story of perseverance in the face of hardship, determination in the face of despair, healing when we see nothing but wounds, and light where there is darkness.

Do we believe that God is always working, guiding, restoring, and leading? Unless we do, we will never be free from the imperfections and wounds that bind us and never be able to understand what it really means to forgive. Pope Francis tells us that the "light which comes from the Holy Family encourages us to offer human warmth to other families." While this is most certainly true, we can only really begin to do this when we realize that we are still works in progress, not anchored to the wounds and sins of our past, and still a leading star in God's continually unfolding story of love. The Holy Family persevered and radiated warmth because they knew they were not alone. We can too.

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK

It was the best of times and it was the worst of times. Our families can bring out the best and the worst in us. This is true of our families of origin, the current family of which we are a part, the family of our church, our society, and the like. In all of our family experiences, what stands out as our most challenging memory? Everything human can be found on the pages of family life. But there is also a Divine story to be discovered as well. When life gets difficult and perplexing, today's Feast of the Holy Family stands to remind us that it is not just by human effort that we tread treacherous waters. We have to remember and learn from the Divine effort too. We need this perspective if our love lessons are going to be learned completely and well. We are all works in progress and we all come from homes that are broken by imperfection. In whatever life brings us and in whatever family we find ourselves, may the promptings we feel toward faith and hope lead us to greater love.

Celebrating the Twelfth Days of Christmas

- 1. On the first day of Christmas...Read the Christmas story (Luke 2:1-21) Rejoice! Jesus is born!
- 2. On the second day of Christmas...The feast of St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr. Promote Christianity and almsgiving
- On the third day of Christmas...The Feast of St. John the Evangelist. He was called from his fishing boat and stood by Jesus' side during crucifixion. Consider ways you may be an evangelist. Pray for those who devote their lives to spreading God's word.
- 4. On the fourth day of Christmas...The Holy Innocents are remembered December 28. These infants were slaughtered at Herod's order when he learned that a new king was born. Pro-life groups observe this day as a special day of prayer for the unborn.
- 5. On the fifth day of Christmas...Surprise someone today with a Christmas gift!
- 6. On the sixth day of Christmas...Light all the candles on your Advent wreath or light another candle and pray this to keep the light of Jesus shining in your home: O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice; come, shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death (O Antiphon from December 21)
- 7. On the seventh day of Christmas...Seek the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Pray and ask for God's grace and guidance in the coming year
- 8. On the eighth day of Christmas...January 1, Mary, Mother of God. Think about this very young woman accepting God's call with incredible grace. Start your day with the Hall Mary!
- 9. On the ninth day of Christmas...remember those less fortunate in prayer today and consider how you can help in the coming year.
- On the tenth day of Christmas...Epiphany, the arrival of the Three Wise Men. Do a house blessing. Used blessed chalk and inscribe the Magi's initials above the door (C, M, B— Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar): + 20 + C + M + B + 22
- 11. On the eleventh day of Christmas...Keep the spirit of Christmas alive. Carry the "merry" by giving a gift, singing Christmas carols, baking cookies.
- 12. On the twelfth day of Christmas...Re-read the Christmas story, then write a message to yourself and family about peace, hope, and joy of this year to pack away with your decorations to read next year! Then pray this blessing before packing away the manger:

God of every nation and people, from the very beginning of creation you have made manifest your love; when our need for a Savior was great, you sent your Son to be born of the Virgin Mary. To our lives He brings joy and peace, justice, mercy, and love.

Lord, bless all who look upon this manger; may it remind us of the humble birth of Jesus and raise our thoughts to him, who is God with us and Savior to all, and who lives and reigns for ever and ever. Amen
