

From the Desk of Father Jason

Dear Friends,

The Church, in her wisdom, has set apart the month of November to remember those who have died. It's traditional to visit cemeteries and pray for the holy souls in purgatory throughout November. Besides praying for the dead, another way to enter into the liturgical spirit of this month is to remember our own deaths as well. That makes it a very fitting time to embrace the practice of "*Memento Mori*" ourselves.

"*Memento Mori*" literally means "Remember that you will die." The premise of *Memento Mori*, an ancient Christian tradition, is to recognize that there is a powerful spiritual value in remembering one's own death in order to live well. Practicing memento mori means taking some time to meditate on this truth. Meditating on the fact that we will die helps us to appreciate our lives more deeply while we have them and it helps us to remember what Christ has done for us. Jesus Christ has destroyed death! In this light, thinking about death is not a morbid thing, it is a worthy and faith filled practice that helps us accept the inevitable with hope. The idea of the "*Memento Mori*" isn't meant to depress us, or make us sad and dreary, it should strengthen us and fill us with peace and joy, knowing how much Christ loves us and that He gave his life for us, so that we might have eternal life.

The phrase and discipline known as memento mori has recently resurfaced and experienced renewed popularity, thanks to the writing of a young nun, Sr. Teresa Aletheia Noble of the Daughters of St. Paul. Sr. Teresa Aletheia's apostolate has introduced this ancient phrase and its practice to a new generation of Catholic Christians. She realized that though the practice of memento mori may be ancient, the concept is relevant in all times and places. She reminds people that meditating on the fact that we will die helps us to appreciate our lives more deeply while we have them. Catholics are called to live counter-cultural lives in many ways, and one of those ways is to resist the "culture of death avoidance" that surrounds us. As Sister Theresa Aletheia Noble writes: "Remembering one's death is an absolutely essential aspect of the Christian life not only because it helps us to live well but also because it helps us to remember what Christ has done for us. Jesus trampled death! Reflecting on death is not a morbid affair, it is a healthy and often healing practice that helps us accept the inevitable with hope."

Recalling that our time here is limited and will end at some time is a powerful motivator to make the best use possible of the time that we do have. What does it mean to "keep death daily before your eyes"? The answer will look different for every one of us. But we do know that taking up this practice, in whatever form, can help us live with a greater sense of purpose and gratitude.

This November, the month of the dead, let's set aside time to practice *memento mori*. It's a profound way to live this liturgical season and to find the eternal meaning in our ordinary, beautiful, utterly unique lives.

Whisper Answers Back to your Child's Questions

A child will not remember his questions after Mass, and as long as he is being respectful, receiving answers will encourage him to really think about what is happening. Encourage conversations about the Mass *after* Mass: talk about the homily and readings, why the priest wore a special color, etc.

Plenary Indulgences in November

During this month of November let us remember our loved ones who have died and let us pray for them. As in 2020, Pope Francis has again expanded the possibility of obtaining a plenary indulgence for the faithful deceased throughout the month of November.

By means of the decree, the Apostolic Penitentiary “confirms and extends for the entire month of November 2021 all the spiritual benefits already granted on 22 October 2020” – that is, it allows the faithful to gain plenary indulgences for the souls in purgatory by visiting a cemetery on every day in November and praying for those who have died. Normally, this indulgence is limited to the first eight days of the month.

A second plenary indulgence is offered on All Souls’ Day, November 2. The current decree allows the faithful to obtain that indulgence for the benefit of the deceased on any day of November. The All Souls’ Day indulgence is obtained by devoutly visiting a church or an oratory and reciting an Our Father and the Creed.

The elderly, sick, and all those who for serious reasons cannot leave their home will also be able to obtain the indulgence by joining spiritually with the faithful, specifies the decree.

The conditions for obtaining a Plenary Indulgence are Sacramental Confession, reception of Holy Communion and prayer for the Holy Father’s intentions, and being “completely detached from sin.”

On his deathbed, St. Joseph himself must have been concerned about the future of his wife and Son. Would they suffer? Would they be treated cruelly by others? Would their future be a happy one? Yet St. Joseph had boundless confidence in God’s love and mercy. He died trusting in Divine Providence, full of confidence that God would take care of his wife and Son. With St. Joseph in our life, you do not have to be fearful of death either. When your time comes, St. Joseph will help you experience a happy and holy death.

To prevent an unhappy death - a death that catches us unprepared, without the last Sacraments – prepare for it now by consecrating yourself to St. Joseph and living a holy life. In giving everything to St. Joseph, death will not catch you unprepared.



Baby Saved! Praying on Pennacook Street

The cold rain and wind on Pennacook Street last Wednesday didn't stop the faithful from holding their prayer vigil outside of Planned Parenthood on surgical abortion day. A woman leaving PP opened her car window and said, "What are you going to do for me? You said you would help me." Before a sidewalk counselor could answer, she said, "I'm pregnant and my boyfriend just cheated on me. Are you going to adopt my baby? I have been sleeping in my car for three nights." Her tears started flowing as the volunteers tried to talk to her. The PP site manager then came out and told the security to get the woman's car out of the driveway. She moved across the street and then the group connected her with the Pennacook Pregnancy Center. She had time to sit down and talk to a counselor there and was given lots of information and resources. Thursday morning it was very upsetting to see her back at Planned Parenthood. When she left, she wouldn't look at the sidewalk counselors. Prayers were answered when she returned Friday morning to the Pennacook Pregnancy Center to report she decided to keep her baby. She is young, but when she told her family and her boyfriend's family, they were all very happy to hear about a new grandchild on the way. The baby's father still needs time to adjust but please pray he realizes what a blessing it is to become a father.

Our cemetery serves to give families a place to grieve, preserves history, and lifts the spirits with its natural beauty. As a Catholic cemetery, it also serves three distinct purposes:

LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

The Eucharistic Prayer is the heart of the Liturgy of the Eucharist. In this prayer, the celebrant acts in the person of Christ as head of his body, the Church. He gathers not only the bread and the wine, but the substance of our lives and joins them to Christ's perfect sacrifice, offering them to the Father.

The introductory dialogue, establishes that this prayer is the prayer of the baptized and ordained, is offered in the presence of God, and has thanksgiving as its central focus. Following this dialogue, the celebrant begins the Preface.

The Eucharistic Prayers make clear that these prayers are offered, not to Christ, but to the Father. It is worship offered to the Father by Christ as it was at the moment of his passion, death and resurrection, but now it is offered through the priest acting in the person of Christ, and it is offered as well by all of the baptized, who are part of Christ's Body, the Church. This is the action of Christ's Body, the Church at Mass.

The priest offers the Eucharistic Prayer in the first person plural, for example, "Therefore, O Lord, we humbly implore you..." This "we" signifies that all the baptized present at the Eucharistic celebration make the sacrificial offering in union with Christ, and pray the Eucharistic Prayer in union with him. And what is most important, we do not offer Christ alone; we are called to offer ourselves, our lives, our individual efforts to grow more like Christ and our efforts as a community of believers to spread God's Word and to serve God's people, to the Father in union with Christ through the hands of the priest. Most wonderful of all, although our offering is in itself imperfect, joined with the offering of Christ it becomes perfect praise and thanksgiving to the Father.
