From the Desk of Father Jason

Dear Friends.

The celebrations aren't over yet; this Sunday we celebrate the *Feast of the Epiphany*, also known as *Three Kings Day*!

The Feast of the Epiphany is a holy day that celebrates the revelation of Jesus to the three Wise Men (or Kings) when they arrived at His place of birth after following the unusual star in the sky. Often, we picture the Wise Men arriving on Christmas night and gathering around the manger of the newborn Jesus along with the shepherds, but in fact they arrived perhaps as much as two years later, which is why Epiphany is celebrated 12 days after Christmas. Although it is often neglected, Epiphany is a day with a long history and many beautiful traditions, one of which is the proclamation of the movable feast days of the upcoming liturgical year.

While a day like Christmas is fixed in our minds and on the calendars on December 25th, many of the important feasts of the Church Year move, based upon the date that Easter is set. Easter changes each year moving to the Sunday after the "Paschal Full Moon," and can fall between March 22 and April 25. In ancient times before calendars were common, most people did not know the dates for the upcoming liturgical year. On Epiphany Sunday, the upcoming dates were "proclaimed" after the gospel, typically chanted by the deacon. This tradition, of course, began much before we had weekly bulletins! The proclamation would take this form:

Know, dear brethren,

that, as we have rejoiced at the Nativity of our Lord Jesus Christ, so by leave of God's mercy we announce to you also the joy of his Resurrection, who is our Savior.

On the **second** day of **March** will fall Ash Wednesday, and the beginning of the fast of the most sacred Lenten season.

On the **seventeenth** day of **April** you will celebrate with joy Easter Day, the Paschal feast of our Lord Jesus Christ.

On the twenty-sixth day of May will be the Ascension of our Lord Jesus Christ.

On the fifth day of June, the feast of Pentecost.

On the **nineteenth** day of **June**, the feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.

On the twenty-seventh day of November, the First Sunday of the Advent of our Lord Jesus Christ, to whom is honor and glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Likewise the pilgrim Church proclaims the Passover of Crist in the feasts of the Holy Mother of God, in the feasts of the Apostles and Saints, and in the commemoration of the faithful departed.







Cathedral Restoration Project

What seemed as a lofty goal only a couple years ago is now being realized beyond expectations in a very tangible way. After spending the past few years planning this project, raising funds, obtaining quotes and renderings in preparation for review by the Diocesan Real Estate and Capital Projects Committee, the Cathedral will be contracting with Swiatek Studios (Rochester, NY) to repair and restore the ceiling and side aisles in the nave of the church beginning in August 2022. As you can see from these renderings, this work will restore the Cathedral to the beauty it deserves as the mother church of the diocese.

The good news, thanks be to God, is that we are able to fund two-thirds of the estimated cost from our savings and Cathedral Restoration Fund, which leaves us needing to raise an additional \$250,000.
