### From the Desk of Father Jason

Dear Friends,

In the first few days of the new year the Church provides us with a very beautiful feast honoring the Holy Name of Jesus. It was St. John Paul II who reintroduced the feast which is celebrated on January 3<sup>rd</sup>. This feast gives us the opportunity to reflect and to be in awe of this name that saves us.

St. Paul in his Letter to the Philippians wrote, "So that at Jesus' name every knee must bend in the heavens, on the earth and under the earth, and every tongue proclaim to the glory of God the Father: Jesus Christ is Lord" (2:10-11). Just as a name gives identity to a person and also reflects a person's life, the name of Jesus reminds the hearer of who Jesus is and what He has done for us. Keep in mind that the name Jesus means "God Saves". We receive every grace and blessing through the Holy Name of Jesus. Jesus said, "I give you my assurance, whatever you ask the Father, He will give you in my name. Until now you have not asked for anything in my name. Ask and you shall receive, that your joy may be full" (Jn 16:23-24). In summary, St. Paul said, "Whatever you do, whether in speech or in action, do it in the name of the Lord Jesus" (Col 3:17).

This scripture passage inspired a widely practiced custom of bowing one's head at the mention of the name of Jesus. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal, which governs celebrations of the Mass, says in No. 275, "A bow of the head is made when the three Divine Persons are named together and at the names of Jesus, of the Blessed Virgin Mary and of the saint in whose honor Mass is being celebrated."

Practically speaking, kneeling every time the name of Jesus is mentioned is rather difficult, and so Pope Gregory X found a solution. He wrote about it to the Dominican Order in 1274, expressing his desire that some physical gesture be done to honor Jesus' name.

The following portion of his letter was printed in the book *With God: A Book of Prayers and Reflections* by Francis Xavier Lasance:

Recently, during the Council held at Lyons, we deemed it a useful commendation to exhort the faithful to enter the house of God with humility and devotion, and to conduct themselves while there in a becoming manner, so as to merit the divine favor and at the same time give edification. We have also judged it proper to persuade the faithful to demonstrate more reverence for that Name above all names, the only Name in which we claim salvation — the Name of Jesus Christ, who has redeemed us from the bondage of sin. Consequently, in obedience to that apostolic precept, 'In the Name of Jesus let every knee, be bent,' we wish that at the pronouncing of that Name, chiefly at the Holy Sacrifice, every one would bow his head in token that interiorly he bends the knee of his heart.

Pope Gregory wanted everyone to not only honor Jesus' name, but to interiorly submit themselves to God with a simple act of love. The Dominicans took the pope's request seriously and became the foremost promoters of the Holy Name of Jesus in the Catholic Church, preaching about the Holy Name, forming Holy Name Societies, as well as placing altars in their churches dedicated to Jesus' Holy Name.

The custom is a simple one and is meant to reflect an interior desire to honor Jesus, the only name by which we are saved. Actively listening and reacting when we hear the name of Jesus is also a good way of participating more attentively at Holy Mass.

### A Few "Notes" from Eric Bermani

Historically, the Baptism of Jesus, and the wedding feast at



Cana were originally part of the feast of the Epiphany (look closely at the hymn *Songs* of *Thankfulness and Praise* for a synopsis). In the Roman liturgy this connection emerges more clearly in the Liturgy of the Hours than in the festal

Mass. In addition, until the most recent reorganization of the liturgical year, the commemoration of the Baptism of Jesus was associated primarily with the octave day of Epiphany. The General Norms once again brings the commemoration a bit closer to Epiphany, since the "feast of the Baptism of the Lord" is now celebrated on the Sunday after Epiphany. The baptism is the subject of the gospel periscope for the second Sunday after Epiphany in Year A, while the passage on the wedding feast at Cana is used in Year C. At the center of the Proper of the feast is the gospel of the baptism of Jesus, with the three synoptic accounts being read in the first three years of the cycle. The Fathers of the Church assigned a very important place to this event in their theology of salvation. Its significance is to be seen, first, in the revelation of the divine sonship of Christ that is given by the "voice from heaven": "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased" (Mt. 3.17). This event is significant, in addition, because the Holy Spirit, in the form o a dove, descends on Jesus. In their theology, the Fathers saw this descent as the real anointing and appointment of Jesus to His messianic office before His public life begins. At the same time, according to the Fathers, by

receiving the baptism of John, Jesus professes his solidarity with the guilty human race and gives water the power to forgive sins via the sacrament of Baptism. The celebration of the feast of the Baptism of the Lord brings the



Christmas cycle to a close. We make a return now to Ordinary Time as we journey towards Lent.

# **Cathedral Restoration Project**

What seemed as a lofty goal only a couple years ago is now being realized beyond expectations in a very tangible way. After spending the past few years planning this project, the Cathedral will be contracting with Swiatek Studios (Rochester, NY) to repair and restore the ceiling and side aisles in the nave of the church beginning in August 2022. As you can see from these renderings, this work will restore the Cathedral to the beauty it deserves as the mother church of the diocese.

The good news, thanks be to God, is that we are able to fund two-thirds of the estimated cost from our savings and Cathedral Restoration Fund, which leaves us needing to raise an additional \$250,000. Thanks to year-end generosity, we have raised more than \$70,000 towards this remaining balance! Instead of using a typical 'fundraising thermometer', we are calling on our patron saint once again to track our progress. 
