From the Desk of Father Jason

Dear Friends,

This weekend we hear the gospel passage of the Wedding Feast at Cana, the first public miracle performed by Jesus and the second Luminous Mystery of the Rosary. Hearing about the wedding feast makes me think of the beautiful weddings that were celebrated at the cathedral this past year. At the end of this column you will see the names of the couples that entered into the covenant of Holy Matrimony and promised to be faithful to each other in good times and in bad, in sickness and in health, to love and to honor each other all the days of their lives. Please pray for these couples and for the engaged who are in the process of preparing for marriage.

With marriage on our minds, let's take a close look at the biblical account of the wedding feast at Cana where we can learn three important lessons: First, Marriage is a sacrament, second, God wants to pour abundant grace upon your marriage, and third, Obedience is the key to receiving grace.

The first lesson from Cana is that marriage is a sacrament. And what is a sacrament? According to the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*: "sacraments are efficacious signs of grace, instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church, by which divine life is dispensed to us" (*CCC*, 1131). God gives us grace in marriage for two purposes: "

By reason of their state in life and of their order, [Christian spouses] have their own special gifts in the People of God." This grace proper to the sacrament of Matrimony is intended to perfect the couple's love and to strengthen their indissoluble unity. By this grace they "help one another to attain holiness in their married life and in welcoming and educating their children." (CCC, 1641)

The second lesson we learn from the Wedding Feast of Cana is that God wants to pour abundant grace upon your marriage. Wine symbolizes joy. Jesus made an overabundance of wine. Six stone jars each holding 20 to 30 gallons. That is 120 to 180 gallons of wine! That's a lot of wine. God desires to pour out His grace even more abundantly upon you.

The third lesson we learn is obedience.

His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you." Now six stone jars were standing there, for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim.

(John 2:5-7)

Mary's words to the servants are still true today. We are to do whatever Jesus tells us. It is through obedience to the commands of God that abundant joy and grace will be poured out into your marriage.


May your marriage be blessed so that you may be a blessing to your children and the world.


BE SAFE





A Few "Notes" from Eric Bermani

Liturgical worship is not an "add on" for a Catholic



Christian. It is the foundation of Catholic identity; expressing our highest purpose. Worship reveals what we truly believe and how we view ourselves in relationship to God, one another and the world into which we are sent to carry

forward the redemptive mission of Jesus Christ. How the Church worships is a prophetic witness to the truth of what she professes. Good worship becomes a dynamic means of drawing the entire human community into the fullness of life in Jesus Christ. It attracts - through beauty to beauty. There is a Latin maxim that addresses the centrality of worship in the life, identity and mission of the Catholic Church: "Lex Orandi, Lex Credendi." The phrase in Latin literally means the law of prayer ("the way we worship") is the law of belief ("what we believe"). It is sometimes expanded as, "lex orandi, lex credendi, lex vivendi", which further deepens the implications of this truth - how we worship reflects what we believe and determines how we will live. The Church has long understood that part of her role as mother and teacher is to watch over worship, for the sake of the faithful and in obedience to the God whom she serves. How we worship not only reveals and guards what we believe but guides us in how we live our Christian faith and fulfill our Christian mission in the world by manifesting the continuing presence of the Risen Jesus Christ.

Marriage is a Sacrament

Catholic Marriage is unique among other marital relationships because it is a sacrament that makes Christ present in our world. The relationship between husband and wife mirrors the relationship of Jesus Christ for his people. In the Catholic tradition, the husband and wife accept a role in God's plan for humanity. They are ambassadors of God's love, and they collaborate with God to keep humanity alive. The vows exchanged by the couple are a sacred pact through which the spouses embrace each other, and together, embrace Jesus as their partner. Through their union with Christ, they participate in the unbreakable pact between God and humanity: the covenant that was sealed in the death and resurrection of Christ.

One of the many benefits of a sacramental marriage is the power of God's grace, which helps couples keep their commitment and find happiness together. Social scientists are finding that couples who recognize God's presence in their relationship experience more satisfaction and are more likely to achieve lifelong marriage.

Couples who choose to bring their marriage into the Church receive many gifts – peace of heart, oneness with the Church, the fullness of the sacraments, and God's special blessing upon their marriage. Three things need to be in place for a true (valid) marriage: capacity, consent, and canonical form. A valid Catholic marriage comes into existence when a man and woman who are capable, give consent to a true marriage, including all the essential properties of marriage, and exchange this consent in the proper form for Catholic weddings.

If you are recently engaged, please call the rectory office to set up an appointment to begin marriage

preparation.

If you were married in a civil ceremony, you may choose to have your marriage "convalidated" in the Church. Convalidation is not simply a "blessing" of an existing union. It requires that a new, free act of consent be

made. If you would like more information on having your marriage sacramentally convalidated, please contact Fr. Jason.




Cathedral Restoration Project
