

Dear friends,



On this fourth Sunday of Lent, we are just past the halfway point and Easter is quickly approaching. Although I look forward to this special season each year, I also seem to struggle once we get underway. The distractions and temptations of our world can be very strong and trying to detach from these worldly things is always a challenge. To remain strong, we cannot do this alone. We must rely on God and recommit ourselves to Him over and over again each day. Lent is a time that can seem like we're walking along a dark path just before dawn and we begin to feel the joyful anticipation of the sun slowly rising over the hill. When we finally arrive at the Easter Vigil Mass and the candles light up the darkness inside

the church, the reality of the Resurrection sinks in and our spirits are lifted!

Last week, we looked at the beautiful story of The Samaritan Woman at the Well from chapter 4 in John's Gospel. I highly encourage you to open your Bible and spend some time with this passage because there are so many layers there. In my homily, I highlighted what happened between the before and after - between the woman walking up the mountain to the well all alone with her sins and struggles and sufferings and then running back down the mountain with joy and zeal to share the Good News with everyone. Two things happened at the well: an encounter and a conversion. Here, I'd like to focus on **encounter**.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC 1373) tells us of the different ways we can encounter Jesus for ourselves: "in his word, in his Church's prayer, 'where two or three are gathered in my name,' in the poor, the sick, and the imprisoned, in the sacraments of which he is the author, in the sacrifice of the Mass, and in the person of the minister. But he is present . . . most especially in the Eucharistic species." God is pursuing each one of us, seeking a relationship. We have so many options to encounter Him, but are we open to it? The woman at the well could have easily ignored Jesus, but she chose to engage Him and she was healed, forever changed.

Since the beginning of his pontificate ten years ago, Pope Francis has consistently promoted a *Culture of Encounter*. Once we encounter Christ, we are called to bring Him out to others just as the woman at the well did. In his encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti*, the pope wrote about the need for kindness in our encounters with others: *"Kindness frees us from the cruelty that at times infects human relationships, from the anxiety that prevents us from thinking of others, from the frantic flurry of activity that forgets that others also have a right to be happy. Often nowadays we find neither the time nor the energy to stop and be kind to others, to say 'excuse me', 'pardon me', 'thank you'. Yet every now and then, miraculously, a kind person appears and is willing to set everything else aside in order to show interest, to give the gift of a smile, to speak a word of encouragement, to listen amid general indifference. If we make a daily effort to do exactly this, we can create a healthy social atmosphere in which misunderstandings can be overcome and conflict forestalled."* 

During our own Kindness Campaign here at St. Elizabeth's, let us keep these words fresh in our minds and in hearts every day. We never know how a small act of kindness will affect the people we encounter.

**R.C.I.A. Program for next year begins in May; sign up now**—Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults: RCIA is designed to welcome adults into our Catholic faith. Preparation is a year-long ongoing process culminating at the Easter Vigil Mass. The goal is to receive the Sacraments of Baptism (for non-Christians), Confirmation, and Holy Eucharist. IS RCIA FOR YOU or SOMEONE YOU KNOW? Do you know someone or are you someone who is interested in becoming Catholic? Are you Catholic but have not yet received all of the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist)? The RCIA is a process of prayer, reflection, and learning that allows for the continual discernment of God's will in our lives. Candidates include: Non-baptized adults who wish to enter the Catholic Church, baptized adult Christians of another denomination (i.e. Lutheran, Anglican, Presbyterian) who wish to continue their Christian faith in the Catholic Church, adult baptized Catholics who have not completed he Sacraments of Initiation (Holy Communion and/or Confirmation) and wish to do so.
