Reading the Signs

Wise men came from the east. They had not had the benefit of the Hebrew Scriptures, but they were wise enough to read the signs and fall in homage before "the glory of the Lord." In their wisdom, they offered gifts which acknowledged Jesus as both king and sacrificial victim.

King Herod, meanwhile, had not learned from his people's Scriptures, and in his lack of wisdom, he became greatly disturbed. He became the enemy of the child, for he refused to accept that *kingship is his, and government and power*.

The contrast between the acceptance by the Gentile wise men and the rejection by the Jewish king underscores the message that Jesus is the "light of all peoples." No one is excluded. The chosen Jews and the foreigners from "the ends of the earth are members of the same body and sharers of the promise."

Those who exclude others from the life of the human family are being unfaithful to the Son "revealed to the nations." Those who accept only the rich and powerful are being unfaithful to the God who shall have pity for the lowly and the poor.

Basic justice demands the establishment of minimum levels of participation in the life of the human community for all persons. The ultimate injustice is for a person or group to be treated actively or abandoned passively as if they were nonmernbers of the human race. To treat people this way is effectively to say that they simply do not count as human beings.

Most Holy Name of Jesus Jan 3 Saint of the Day

Saint Paul tells us in his Letter to the Philippians that Jesus' name is above every other name. It is the name in which we are all saved. Devotion to the Most Holy Name of Jesus is deeply rooted in Christian history.



Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton Jan 4 Saint of the Day

Convert, wife, mother, widow, teacher, religious—Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton did it all. Yet, in many ways, she was an ordinary woman of her time who lived life in an extraordinary way.



Saint John Neumann Jan 5 Saint of the Day

Saint John Neumann was the first member of his community, the Redemptorists, to profess vows in the United States. He did missionary work in Maryland, Virginia, and Ohio, and became the bishop of Philadelphia. Noted for his humility and organizational skills, he helped form the Church in the New World.



Saint André Bessette Jan 6 Saint of the Day

Saint André Bessette was orphaned at 12, and eventually worked in the United States during the Civil War. At 25, he became a Brother of the Holy Cross. Having a deep devotion to Saint Joseph from childhood, Saint André built the Oratory on Mount Royal in his honor. Although sickly most of his life, Saint André lived to be 92.



Saint Raymond of Peñafort Jan 7 Saint of the Day

Saint Raymond of Peñafort was a lawyer who used his talents to both compile legislation for easy access and to write legal treatises on penance for the use of confessors. He was named the Archbishop of Tarragona, but resigned due to sickness within two years. He lived to be 100.



Saint Angela of Foligno Jan 8 Saint of the Day

Saint Angela of Foligno was a wife and mother who had little interest in the spiritual life until about age 40. After her husband and children died, Angela entered the Secular Franciscans, spending the rest of her life in prayer and service.
