From Deacon Joe MacDonald

Today we read about Saint Stephen. It is significant for me as a deacon because Stephen was a deacon. In fact, he was the very first deacon and the first person to be martyred for the faith. If you drive by many Protestant churches you might see on the sign outside the title or theme of that Sunday's sermon. If I were to give a title to this homily it might read:

"No good deed goes unpunished."

Here we have Stephen, a good, holy, Spirit-filled man, faithfully following Christ. Stephen's life and his death were both imitations of Christ's own life and death. We are told in Acts 6 that he was filled with grace and power. That he had a ministry to the hungry and the he worked many signs and wonders among the people. In coming to know Christ it was as though Stephen had won the lottery. He had everything he needed and would want for nothing ever again. And he shared as a gift that prize with anyone who would listen. It was his longing, his heart's desire, that all might know salvation through their acceptance of Jesus Christ.

He wasn't trying to start an argument with the so-called Synagogue of the Freed-men (the ones who brought him before the Sanhedrin). They were his brother Jews and he wanted to tell them the good news so that they too could walk in true freedom as adopted Children of God, through Christ Jesus. But they didn't want to hear it. Their minds were made up. They had their own agenda.

Let's look at the ways Stephen's life and death were like Christ's:

- Like Christ, Stephen was filled with the Holy Spirit
- Stephen fed the hungry like Jesus fed the 5000
- Stephen, following Christ's example, worked signs and wonders among the people
- Like Jesus he proclaimed the coming of the Kingdom.
- Stephen was brought before the Sanhedrin, as was the Lord
- He was falsely accused and put to death.
- They both asked the Father to forgive their murderers

In every possible way, Stephen followed Christ in life and in death.

Now, Stephen was given a great gift at the moment of his death. It's very unique, as far as we know he is the only one to have this experience. Remember when Jesus was before the Sanhedrin?

The high priest asked Jesus "Are you the Messiah, the son of the Blessed One?"

And Jesus answered, "I am; and you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of the Power and coming with the clouds of heaven."

Stephen is the first to witness that prophecy's fulfillment. But he, filled with the Holy Spirit, looked up intently to heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God, and he said, "Behold, I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God."

Now here is the really cool thing.

Imagine a family, perhaps your family, and a son or daughter or husband or wife has been off at war – gone for a very long time. You may be sitting on the sofa doing a crossword or watching TV. Suddenly that son or daughter who has been away for so long is at the door. What do you do? You stand up, you go to them, offer them your hand or a warm embrace. You welcome them home; feed them; shower them with affection.

This passage from the Acts of the Apostles is the only place you'll see Jesus standing at the right hand of God. Everywhere else, EVERYWHERE, he is seated at God's right hand. Not here. Tonight, Jesus stands to welcome his brother home from battle, ready to take him into his arms, to welcome him into the eternal banquet and to love him beyond our capacity to understand.

Stephen was the first to witness that vision but he is NOT the last to experience its reality. A time will come for each one of us, faithful servants, to come before the Lord. We don't want to meet him sitting down in judgment but standing ready to take us, his brothers and sisters, into his arms having come home from a life of spiritual warfare to receive that good which no eye has seen, what no ear has heard and what has been impossible for us to even conceive of in our minds.

Like Stephen we are filled the Holy Spirit; with grace and power. We have won the lottery! Where are our signs and wonders? Is our invitation to our family and friends to accept Christ on our lips? Are we out there sharing the prize with the people we meet or are we keeping our experience of Christ a closely guarded secret - locked up like our own private treasure? That's not our calling. Our calling is to go out and make disciples. What we receive as a gift we should give as a gift. Invite! Invite! Pray! Pray! Pray! Our calling is to send out the invitation; the RSVP is not up to us. It may be slow in coming but don't despair - God's love is stronger than anyone's stubborn heart.

May 29, 2022 - 7th Sunday of Easter

Unity and diversity can exist together. Our western minds have a grave difficulty seeing unity without conformity. We tend to believe that unless everyone believes the same thing, assents to the same body of truths, styles, and opinions, unity is not possible. Jesus, in today's Gospel, expresses a tenderness and an intimacy that the disciples actually can witness. This same tenderness and love are also reflected in his desire for unity and oneness. Jesus passionately wants all to be one. It is very clear that the success of Jesus' mission and the advance of the Gospel rises or falls with whether this unity is achieved. And it is a unity that is achieved around a person and not particulars.

Our church is extremely divided. These divisions all center on various theologies, philosophies, structures, and styles. We allow these particular concerns and interpretations, valid as many can be, to drive wedges between us and put us at odds with each other. They enrage us and cause us to lash out at other members of the Body of Christ. Differences are bound to exist in any group. We are unique and diverse people. Staunchly clinging to particular agendas and ideologies while waving the "we're right, you're wrong" banner as we forge ahead in battle does little to advance the real mission of Christ. We are perceived as weak, fractioned, self-focused and serving, and lacking empathy and love. How can the work of salvation be accomplished like this? We sacrifice our credibility. For what?

"I am the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end." These words describe exactly who the glorified Christ really is. Jesus wants us to see this glory! Believe this! This is the unifying principle that draws the Body of Christ together as one, not our particular preferences of worship! We give too much power to our preferences, and all too easily forget that the real mission of Christ is much more than that! If we can work at truly loving each other as members of Christ's Body despite the differences that can so quickly divide us, then maybe we'll a bit more convincing to those who do not believe. The Risen Christ comes to us through the Eucharist. It doesn't matter where or how. Gather wherever you can and receive. We cannot substitute Jesus' passion with our own. We are one.







Sharing the Gospel

If pieces are missing from a jigsaw puzzle, you cannot see the whole picture. If keys are missing from a piano, you cannot hear a whole song. When Christians do not work well together, the world cannot see how great and loving God is. Jesus prayed that all of us would stay close to God and to one another. Do your part. Encourage other Christians.

God, I want the world to see how good you are. Help me to be good and loving to all Christians.

Mission for the Week

Plan a service project with children from another Christian church in your area. Collect food for a food pantry, or sing songs to the grandmas and grandpas in a nursing home.

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
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
