

From Deacon Joe MacDonald

Did you know that there is only one Church approved apparition site of the Blessed Mother in the United States? I didn't know about it either until I heard Bishop David Ricken talk about it on Catholic Radio.

She is called the "Our Lady of Good Help" and her shrine is in Champion Wisconsin. Its quite a story too. It about a young woman, Adele Brise, who was born in Belgium and emigrated to America with her parents, to a town that was then known as Robinsonville.

It was in October of 1859, while walking to church, she saw woman standing between two trees. She described the woman as being clothed in white with a yellow sash around her waist. Her head was surrounded by a crown of stars, and she had flowing blonde hair. She was enveloped in light.

My first thought at this point was this: Mary was a first century Jew living in the middle east. Its highly unlikely that she had blond hair. It's a good thing that I wasn't investigating the apparitions because I would have stopped there and said "Nope! Can't be Mary she didn't have blonde hair."

Thankfully those who were conducting the investigation were smarter than I am. It seems that whenever there is an apparition of Mary, she usually appears in a form that is familiar to the visionary. Who knows why this is so? It could be that she just doesn't want to scare anyone away.

Adele did not talk to Mary that first day. Instead, she went home and told her parents about what she had seen to which her mother responded that maybe it was a poor soul in purgatory reaching out for prayers.

Adele saw the lady again and this time when to the parish priest. He advised Adele to ask the lady who she was and what she wanted. The next time Adele saw the lady she did as the priest had instructed. It went like this:

Adele: In the name of God, who are you and what do you wish of me?

Mary: I am the Queen of Heaven, who prays for the conversion of sinners, and I wish you to do the same.

Further, The Blessed Mother asked Adele to teach the children their catechism, how to make the sign of the cross and how to approach the sacraments. Adele was not an educated woman and wondered how she could ever accomplish this task. Mary's last words to her were "That is what I wish you to do. Go and fear nothing. I will help you."

And so, Adele went from house to house. She offered to work in these homes cleaning and cooking among other tasks and her payment was only to be that they allow her to catechize their children. And a remarkable thing happened, because the parents were always within ear shot, they too were catechized, and many people came back to Christ as a result. Her efforts resulted in a boarding school and a third order of sisters to continue the work.


A chapel was built at the site and many local people went there to pray. Many miracles and healings of the body and spirit have been documented.

We have all heard of the Great Chicago Fire of October 8, 1871. That fire took 300 lives and because it was Chicago, another fire, even more devastating, was forgotten. This was the Peshtigo fire in northwestern Wisconsin. The fire burned 1.2 million acres of land and with approximately 2500 killed is the worst wildfire in American History. This fire destroyed everything and everyone in its path. And as it approached the little chapel dedicated to Our Lady of Good Help, many people in the Robinsonville area fled to the site of the shrine to pray the rosary. They brought whole families including children, babies and even pets. With Adele they prayed. They prayed kneeling and they prayed in procession asking Our Lady of Good Help to intercede with her Son, Jesus to save them from the fire. Everything surrounding them was turned to ash but before it reaches the boundary of the shrine their prayers were answered. In the middle of the worst drought in many years, the heavens opened, and the rains poured down extinguishing the fire.

Today this is the first and only Church approved Marian apparition site in the country. It is called the National Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help. If nothing else, it's a very cool story about our Blessed Mother's love for her children. And to another he said, "Follow me." In every moment of every day, in every circumstance and experience, God is calling us. We can easily get distracted and not hear it or simply ignore it, pretending it wasn't even heard. When we do hear it and favorably respond, there are some conditions that must be met. Jesus makes it clear that once we say yes to his invitation, we must stay focused and forge ahead. We cannot keep looking behind or worry about unfinished business. There are some tasks, and discipleship is one, that require our full devotion.

There are many "masters" vying for our attention. We need something or someone to give us direction. Human nature requires it. Our motives and actions reveal what has our allegiance. It is tempting to give ourselves to masters that lure us with intriguing promises. When given the choice between a "master" that promises worldly success, abundant wealth, status, privilege, and security versus a "master" that asks for self-sacrifice, hardship, suffering, ridicule, and death, to whom do we go? While the promise of immediate pleasure is enticing, there is always a catch. For all that secular masters can promise, they always keep us looking behind, checking on ourselves, second guessing choices, calculating options, and being slaves to excessive worry. Our guard can never come down. Only one master really promises life: Jesus Christ. Hearing his call, we either trust him or we don't.

Saying yes to following Christ does come with a risk. But it also comes with the brightness of future hopes and dreams. There is no need to keep looking behind. Sins are forgiven and regrets serve no effective purpose. God is not there. He's moved beyond all that stuff. God is in the today and the tomorrow and what he can continually do with our daily affirmation to follow Him. All we need to do is be obedient. St. Gianna Molla is credited with saying, "The stillness of prayer is the most essential condition for fruitful action. Before all else, the disciple kneels down." Begin with prayer. We will not only hear God's call but find the courage to trust that He will guide us where we need to be. God uses us in the most ordinary of ways through the simple daily expression of our lives.



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Sharing the Gospel

Instead, Jesus chose to walk from town to town, teaching people about God. He gave up having nice things so that he could stay focused on God's work. That's what he asked his disciples to do, too.
