Dear Friends, Peace!

ENCOURAGING SPEECH

Many years ago, a collaborator, a wonderful layman, ministering at Saint Agnes in Reading gave me an insight into my life as a priest and moreover as a Christian. He said, "Jim, your job is to speak encouragingly." It is. And so is yours.

You may have heard me on a recent Sunday trying to address this topic. Bear with me. Perhaps I may make my point more clearly. Saint Paul in Ephesians 4:29-32 offers some sage advice about our speech. Let me offer his thoughts using different translations or paraphrases. Paul writes, "Never let evil talk pass your lips." He is referring to "foul language." Especially directed at another person. We are pretty used to that, aren't we? One author offered that the text means that such speech is "rotten." We say that too, don't we? We say it "stinks!" Then Paul gives a gem of a sentence: "Say only the good things people need to hear." I have always liked that line, don't you? The Word of God says that people, all the people, the folks in our lives "need edification." They need to be built up. Paul is saying that we can "give grace to those who hear." Wow! To grace, to bless the other by my speech. Here's another way of saying this: 'Speak to be a benefit to those who hear. When you speak say things that will really help people.' In short, "speak encouragingly". What a lovely goal: in our families, with people we disagree with, with every chance encounter with another human being.

THE OPPOSITE

Then there is the opposite. I learned when preparing for this talk that the Hebrews felt that negative, abusive speech toward another affected God. Saint Paul voices that concept when he writes, "And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God with whom you have been sealed." What a thought! I can make God sad by the negative way I talk to you! Saint James puts it another way, "...the tongue...is a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings who are made in the likeness of God...This need not be so" (James 3:8-10). Thus, Paul bluntly teaches "Get rid of all bitterness, passion and anger, harsh words, slander and malice of every kind" (Ephesians 4:31).

GOD'S FURTHER COUNSEL

God's Word is clear. Here is His ethic for us: "be kind to one another, compassionate, forgiving one another just as God has forgiven you in Christ" (4:32). The Psalmist offers similar and clear advice: "Keep your tongue from evil and your lips from speaking deceit. Turn from evil and do good, seek peace and follow after it (strive for it)" (Psalm 34:14-15).

MEDIA: OUR USE

Today you and I have found ourselves given various forms of media by which we can express ourselves. But because Facebook is not 'face to face', we can tend to say and write what would have been shocking and unacceptable even a few years ago. May I suggest that you and I as Catholics must decide to use every form of our self-expression only to lift people up. Let us say or communicate "only the good things people need to hear," as another translation expresses it, "things that will really help them." And if this thought has hit home for you as it has me, let us follow the advice of Our Blessed Mother Mary in John 2:5: "Do whatever He tells you."

The 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Gospel for this Sunday (Luke 4:21–30) is a summary of Luke's whole Gospel. Jesus tells the Good News of God's favor and kindness toward all people.

- When Jesus told the Good News about himself to those gathered in the synagogue, not everyone listened.
- Listening to others is a way to show love and respect.

• Even some of Jesus' own friends and neighbors rejected His teaching because He was just the son of a carpenter.

• Everyone faces rejection at one time or another. And we all can be deeply hurt by rejection.

• Today's Gospel follows the teachings of the second reading from Corinthians telling us that the greatest virtue we can possess is that of **LOVE**.

Luke's Gospel teaches us to avoid rejecting others or prejudging them.

Jesus is our greatest teacher. He teaches us how to live the way God wants us to live. We listen to him and learn from him. In today's Gospel Jesus challenged the people in his hometown to do something hard. They did not like that! They got mad. But Jesus' words are true.

Sometimes we can be like the people of Nazareth; we do not want to trust Jesus' message because we find his words challenging. We do not want to do what He says. But we can trust His words to us and can rely on His guidance in our lives. They are the words of a trusted friend.




We pray that we will allow Jesus' words to influence us and to change us.
