

A reminder that we will have our monthly food drive next weekend where non-perishable food can be brought in directly to food pantry, at that time or Monday thru Wednesday during the day. Our Shelves have been running low lately. All donations are gratefully appreciated. Catholic Charities have provided the following list of other suggestions: **<u>GRAIN GROUP</u>**: Oatmeal, Cream of Wheat, whole grain crackers, all types of pasta, low sugar / high fiber cereal – Cheerios, Raisin Bran, etc., whole grain rice; **<u>PROTEIN GROUP</u>**: canned tuna fish, salmon, chicken bean soup, baked beans, chili, beef stew, Chef Boyardee Ravioli's, dried & canned beans, nuts, peanut butter; <u>**MILK GROUP**</u>: dry milk, evaporated milk, boxed shelf-stable milk; **<u>FRUIT & VEGETABLES</u>**: canned vegetables, vegetable juice, diced tomatoes, tomato juice, tomato sauce, spaghetti sauce, canned fruit, 100% fruit juice, dried fruit, and fruit cups.

St. Stephen |Feast Day December 26

The Acts of the Apostles tells the story of St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr. A man filled with grace and power, he worked great wonders among the people. Some Jews debated with St. Stephen but could not match his wisdom and spirit. Eventually, a charge of blasphemy was brought up against him, and the local population demanded that he be tried and sentenced. He was seized and carried before the Sanhedrin.

Despite the danger he faced, in front of the Sanhedrin and his accusers, St. Stephen gave a long speech about the history of Israel and the blessings that God had bestowed upon His chosen people. He talked about how Israel had become disobedient despite God's abundant mercy. This enraged his accusers, and eventually the crowd dragged him out of the city and stoned him to death.

Even in his final moments, St. Stephen displayed great forgiveness and even asked God not to hold the sins of his attackers against them. Hundreds of years after his death, he is still a role model for us to follow. -©LPi
